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Let it Snow

With the winter season upon us, people of all ages are looking forward to the joys of snow. Most children rank throwing snow high on the list of fun winter activities. We have instructed all of our students that for SAFETY REASONS throwing snow IS FORBIDDEN. There may be times where a teacher may supervise a snow activity such as snow/ice sculpture building if conditions are appropriate; however, with the exception

of these activities, and the making of snowmen or snow forts, SNOW MUST STAY OUT OF HANDS AND ON THE GROUND at all times. Students have beenmade aware of possible consequences; injury to a student could result in suspension even for a first incident. We appreciate your support in all matters relating to your child(ren)'s safety. Please take time with your child to review this policy.

Important Reminders

Please ensure your child comes to school dressed for winter weather. This includes a warm coat, snow pants, winter boots, hat, mitts/gloves and scarf/neck warmer. A second pair of socks and mitts/gloves are strongly recommended for those who like to play in the snow. Students are outside for 20 minutes during morning recess and 40 minutes during lunch recess and must be dressed appropriately.

If you need assistance accessing winter clothing for your child, please contact the office or Mrs. Anderson. We will do our best to help out. Students should have a pair of indoor shoes at school. For safety purposes, shoes must be worn inside at all times.

Information Sessions

Information sessions for Grade 1 entry into the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools that have a Grade 1 program on January 16, 2020 at 7 p.m.

Please visit YRDSB's website in January 2020 <u>http://www.yrdsb.ca/Programs/fi/Pages/Program-Locations.aspx</u> to find the FI program location for your elementary school location.

Registration

FI registration will begin on January 17, 2020. Parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2020, and wishing to enrol in the FI Program, can visit or call their home school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. This Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to the designated FI program location to register, between January 17 and February 7, 2020. Registration during this period is not first come, first served.

Late Registrations

Late registrations are those submitted after February 7, 2020. Late registrations will be treated on a first- come, first-served basis and will be considered subsequent to registrations received during the registration period should overflow be necessary.

Accommodation Plan

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. Space requirements at some schools may mean that siblings are in different schools for primary dual track French Immersion programs due to differing grade structures. Like any of our schools across the Board, changes to school boundaries, and/or the accommodation model for the French Immersion program may need to be considered when new schools open, a school experiences enrolment growth, and program changes occur. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools.

Please note: Some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision. Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108.





Winter Weather

With winter weather already here, we want to share a few important reminders.

Dress for the weather

Students should come dressed appropriately for the weather and for outdoor play. Students can stay warm by wearing layers of loose-fitting clothing, a hat, scarf, jackets, snow pants and mit-tens or gloves. Students may also want to bring extra pants and socks in case they get wet.

<u>Recess</u>

If students are well enough to come to school, they are expected to go outside for recess. Our students benefit from spending time outside and being active. We monitor weather conditions throughout the day. If there are extreme weather conditions, we may consider a shortened or indoor recess.

Bus or School Cancellations

When an **extreme cold** or **inclement weather** day is declared, school transportation (including buses and taxis) is cancelled in the morning and afternoon. Schools will remain open. Please notify the school if your child will not be attending school on those days. Students will not be penalized for missing school on these days.

There may be rare instances when **emergency weather events** occur and we need to close all schools and Board locations. Please take the time to make plans in the event of an emergency school closure. Information about transportation cancellations and Board closures will be shared through local media, <u>Board</u> and school website and on <u>twitter @YRDSB</u>.

Our process for extreme cold, inclement weather and emergency weather days are outlined in the Board's <u>Severe Weather policy</u>, which has been recently updated and is available for public comment. Seeking feedback from staff and community members, including parents/guardians, is an important part of the review process. All <u>policies available for comment</u> are sent to school council chairs and are posted on the Board website, along with information about how to provide feedback.

Protecting Your Family from Respiratory Illnesses

Cold and flu season is here and York Region Public Health would like to pro-vide you with information on protecting yourself and your family from com-mon respiratory illnesses, such

as influenza, enterovirus and rhinovirus.

Respiratory illnesses can spread quickly from person-to-person when some-one who is ill U U coughs, sneezes or touches common surfaces such as taps, toys, light switches and doorknobs with unclean hands.

You can prevent you and your family from getting and spreading respiratory illness by:

1. Keeping healthy by eating healthy foods, being physically active and ensuring your immunizations are up to-date, including the seasonal flu shot

2. Avoiding close contact with people who are sick

3. Washing your hands often with soap and water or using alcohol-based hand sanitizer when soap and water are not available

- 4. Coughing and sneezing into your sleeve or a tissue, not your hand, and throwing away used tissues
- 5. Avoiding touching your face
- 6. Cleaning and disinfecting common surfaces
- 7. Staying home when you are sick

Symptoms of respiratory illness vary and can include: headache, chills, cough, fever (over 38 degrees Celsius or 100 degrees Fahrenheit), muscle aches and fatigue, running nose, sneezing, sore throat, wa-tery eyes and loss of appetite. Children may have other symptoms such as ear aches, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

If you have a respiratory condition such as asthma, you can develop a more serious illness when you catch a cold. If you or your child are sick and do not improve, contact your health care provider.

Hand washing

Children share many items throughout the school day and at home including books, puzzles, computers, water bottles and sports equipment. Sharing can spread germs that can cause sickness, especially during cold and flu season. Correct hand washing is the best way to prevent the spread of infection.

To help keep the people in your home healthy, follow these simple steps:

Encourage children to sneeze into the bend of their arm rather than into their hands.

Make time for hand washing, especially before eating, after using the bathroom, blowing your nose, sneezing, handling garbage, playing outdoors or visiting someone who is sick. Wash your hands whenever they look or feel dirty.

School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;



• A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries which prevents the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.

• When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.

• Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.

Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same transportation home.

Message from Our Trustee

One of our top priorities as a school board is creating an environment that enables our students to focus on learning and be successful. That means creating environments where students are safe and feel safe, where all of our students know that they are welcome and supported, and where they see their identities reflected, valued and celebrated.

Championing Equity and Inclusivity

Championing Equity and Inclusivity is one of the priorities outlined in the <u>Board of Trustees' Multi-Year Strategic Plan</u>. We are fortunate to live in one of the most diverse regions of Canada, and welcome students, staff and families with a broad range of identities and experiences. There has been much work underway at the Board in the past few months to ensure we are providing all of our students with a safe, equitable and inclusive learning environment, including: Providing Board-wide training for over 12,000 school staff on anti-Black racism.

Bringing together over 250 students and staff at our annual <u>SpeakOut conference</u> for the 2SLGBTQ+ community. Acknowledging <u>Treaties Recognition Week</u>, and learning about the importance of treaties and treaty relationships in Canada from First Nations community members.

• Hosting a labour market information night for parents to learn about current and future career opportunities and employment trends.

Bringing together hundreds of members of the education community for three days of learning focused on Indigenous Education and Equity at our world-renowned <u>Quest conference</u>.

This is in addition to the ongoing work taking place in our schools. It is also important that our families know and feel that they are a valued, respected and important part of our school community. We recently held regional school council forums that brought together school council members from across the region to learn and share together on important topics such as engaging families, vaping and more. It was wonderful to see so many family members there.

The Board of Trustees was also pleased to receive and commit to taking action on the recommendations in response to the Anti-Black Racism, Antisemitism, Classism and Islamophobia community consultations.

Winter Months

With the winter weather already upon us, I also want to remind families that school transportation may be cancelled on <u>extreme cold or inclement weather days</u>, and there may be rare occasions when emergency weather conditions result in school closures. To ensure families are aware, last month, we tested a new system to send text messages to families in emergency situations only. Information about transportation cancellations and school closures will also be available on Board and school websites, Board social media channels and local media.

Many of our students and families will be celebrating days of significance and holidays in the coming weeks and months, and I wish you all the very best for the season. I hope everyone has a safe and happy winter break and we look forward to welcoming students back in January.
