
Students 18 Years of Age and Older

When students turn 18 years of age, the way the school interacts with students and their families changes. Legally, 18 year olds are adults and have entered the "age of majority." As an adult, students must provide consent to have parents access information and receive information from the school. Therefore, when a student turns 18 parents will no longer receive communication from the school; including attendance reports, mark updates and phone calls/emails from teachers. 



The scholarship includes yearly funding, networking, access, internship and the potential for employment opportunities.



\$5K ANNUAL COMMITMENT

Scholarship recipients will be awarded \$5,000/per year (3-4 years depending on the Computer Science program. Maximum \$20,000 per recipient over a 4 years program).

Applications for new recipients will recur every 4 years (3 years if one city has a recipient who graduate from their program).

HOW DOES THIS WORK?

A step in the right direction for a more inclusive and diverse future. Big picture thinking with a strategy and support in place.

HOW DO WE DO THAT?

Application Process: work with leaders in the community to establish the Rightsline Scholarship. Pilot 2021: Newmarket African Caribbean Canadian Association (NACCA)

The application process is collaborative and geography-specific. Computer Science programs are an important criteria when selecting the recipient of the Rightsline Scholarship. We want to encourage students to apply into this ever-growing industry which has ample employment opportunities.

Paid Internship/Co-Op: Support in securing summer internship/co-op in the field of Technology. Depending on the program the recipient would work either with Rightsline or leverage their network to help in the search.

Mentorship and support: Quarterly mentoring session with CEO and executive leadership team throughout the program and quarterly mentoring session with Leaders in the field ((Technology/Entertainment) industries.

Networking: We believe in the power of a network and we want to support the recipient along the way. Upon graduation, we would like to continue to mentor and assist in finding a full-time role. The recipient will have the opportunity to come on board in a full-time capacity.

Corporate Training: Navigating a career can be a challenge. Rightline would like to provide corporate training, feedback and insights giving the recipient the experience in performance appraisals, growth opportunities and leadership skills.


