New(er) Courses

GPP3O1 - Leadership and Peer Support (Grade 11 course)

True belonging doesn't require us to change who we are. It requires us to be who we are. ~Brené Brown

This course focuses on the development of critical interpersonal skills and promotes student participation in both school and community life. Students will develop skills in communication, interpersonal relations, teamwork, and conflict management; and apply those skills in leadership and/or peer support roles. Students will examine group dynamics and learn the value of diversity within groups and communities.

New(er) Courses

HPC3O1 - Raising Healthy Children (Grade 11 course)

This course will focus on the skills and knowledge parents and caregivers need when raising children. This course will also focus on the importance of maternal health, pregnancy, birth, and the early years of child development (birth to six years old). Through both study and practical experience, students will learn what the developmental needs of children are and how to best meet them. Students will also learn about the importance of communication and how to best communicate to help in socializing children and teaching them. Students in this course will also learn how to best meet the behavioural needs of children and will learn how to prepare those children for school and relationships. Students will also learn how to guide children in their early behaviour and will learn about their importance in this skill. Students will develop their research skills through investigations related to parenting and child rearing.

New(er) Courses

IDC4O1 - History through Film (Grade 12 course)

History through Film is a course about understanding world History. While Hollywood movies skew the past to meet the demands of drama, spectacle, and interest – and documentary films are often no better- film can also propel a fuller imaginative grasp of a historical period. The course's goal, is to bring critical intelligence to film as a medium for understanding and presenting the past. By the end of the course, students should be able to assess the different approaches taken to present past historical events by film-makers, to defend their own point of view on given films, and most importantly to explain the advantages and disadvantages of film as a way to present and understand history.

Prerequisites for Grade 11 & 12 Courses

Example: Grade 12 Accounting (BAT4M1) requires Grade 11 College/University Accounting (BAF3M1)

• Use PATHWAY to plan ahead. You can pick your Grade 11 & 12 courses now – you will only be submitting your Grade 11 course selections

Looking Ahead: University Requirements

- Six Grade 12 'U' or 'M' courses
- •Most programs have 75% + admission averages.
- Co-op credits do not count in university admission requirements or admission averages

Looking Ahead: College Admission Guidelines


- •High school diploma with 12 "C" English
- Additional requirements interview, portfolio, etc.
- "C" &/or "M" type courses used for admission;
- Math and Science required for most Technology programs
- Applied degree programs have Gr 12 U and M courses as prerequisites (similar to University requirements)




My Pathway Planner: Dashboard

 On your Dashboard, select High School to access your course planner




My Pathway Planner: Choosing Courses

My Pathway Planner: If you are selecting Repertoire

- If you are interested in repertoire, select the courses you would like for next year <u>before</u> selecting Repertoire.
- If you have 8 other classes, click on the + course at the bottom of the column to add Repertoire



Repertoire MUST be added as your last credit

Summer School

- Reinforcement 2 weeks for students who did not pass a course, AND are approved by the credit recovery team
- Acceleration 4 weeks for students who have never taken the course before, or who did not pass a course and did not meet the criteria for credit recovery (not available for grade 9 courses)
- Fill in "Interested in Summer School?" on My Pathway Planner in order to indicate interest in Summer School



My Pathway Planner: Summer School

In February:

- pick a replacement elective course for the course you would like to take at summer school
- complete the Summer School Intention Form (located in the course selection resources tab)
- Please note this is only indicating intention, you are not actually signing up for summer school



In the spring:

 you will need to officially register for summer school through Continuing Education on My Pathway Planner

Community Involvement

- 40 community hours are needed to graduate
- Prior to doing an activity, ensure that it is <u>eligible</u>. Check the <u>Google Site</u> and have it pre-approved through Guidance
- Check <u>YRDSB Community Involvement</u> for eligibility and form
- Opportunities have been extended this year to include 10 hours of paid work and household duties

- Course selections submitted late may mean you may not get your choice of class(es)
