PRO Grant 101:



Parents Reaching Out Grant (PRO Grant)

Background and Purpose

- The Ministry of Education's Parents Reaching Out (PRO) Grant program provides funding to school boards to support projects for parents and families that focus on improving access and opportunities to participate and engage fully in their children's learning.
- These grants will support families in school communities in identifying barriers and opportunities to strengthen parent-family engagement in their local communities and enable more parents-caregivers to support their child's learning and well-being.
- All YRDSB schools are eligible to submit ONE project proposal.



Making a PRO Grant Application

Criteria - Considerations

- Purpose: Clarity, details provided, aligned with Ministry commitments/YRDSB priorities
- Outcomes: Specific results you hope to be achieved and measurable impact of project
- Budget: provides specific breakdown of expenses, connects directly with the description, meets spending guidelines of PRO Grant/YRDSB procurement policies, procedures and practices
- Partners: Schools may partner and pool their allocations with other schools and community agencies

Ineligible Project Costs

- Payment to school board staff/volunteers including salaries, honoraria or gifts
- Purchase of goods and services that the Ministry currently provides funding
- Entertainment activities such as barbecues, fun fairs, volunteer teas, movie nights, etc;
- Refreshment cost over 10%
- Prizes or incentives for parents or students
- Fundraising events

PRO Grant Areas of Focus in YRDSB

- Supporting identity affirming, culturally responsive and healing centered mental health strategies
- Engaging parent and community voices, in particular those voices of historically marginalized groups
- Knowledge building for parents on the opportunities for students in a de-streamed classroom and/or a comprehensive literacy program

2024-25 PRO Grant Project Timelines

After connecting with School Council and perhaps Community Partners, the school administrator will complete the 2024-25 PROGrant Application Form on behalf of those involved in planning the event, initiative, project

Schools & School Councils will first review criteria (outlined in an October PRO Grant Memo) and then complete the application for a project with a maximum allocation of \$800.00 per school

Mid October 2024 Board memo_to Administrators, EOAA, SOAA, SOs inviting application for the PRO Grant program	School Administrators to complete and submit an application for review and approval at their earliest convenience to ensure the funds can be used this school year
PRO Grant approvals to be communicated to School Principal cc: EOAA or SOAA weekly upon receipt of application	Leadership Development & Engagement team to review, and provide ongoing: approval notification by email as applications are received
Project Completion Date By Friday, June 20, 2025	Any exceptions reach out to leadership.development.engagement@yrdsb.ca
Submission of the 2024-25 PROGrant Report of Actual Costs. Due upon completion of the PROGrant Project.	ACTUAL expenses are due to be reported as soon as possible after the school's PRO Grant project is completed and while the expense details are most easily accessible (fresh on your mind).

All expenses need to be represented in the school's PRO-Grant budget line.

- No Amazon purchases! memo
- PCards **ANY TRANSACTION OVER \$300, THAT CAN BE PURCHASED THROUGH ONE OF OUR VENDORS, SHOULD BE PLACED ON A PO.
- Always ensure you follow all board policies and procedures on procurement and purchases.
- Employee Expenses If there are any employee expenses, use the <u>Quarterly Expense Report</u> form.
- Scan and store all invoices, receipts and keep electronic copy in assigned folders
- ALL purchases and expenses for PROGrant are to come from the account that has the allocation in budget number 15-4150-1-XXX-022 for Elementary schools
