	School social worker: Joyce Leung
	Comes to the school about 1x per week
	 Social worker and attendance councilor Registered social worker (assigned 5-6 schools per year) Provides support to students K to 12 experiencing mental health issues that impact their health and well-being and their success in school May include Advocacy Attendance intervention Support looks different based on student Collaborative support; relies heavily on school team to support students Broad range of support – connects families with services available in the community Engaging with social work is a voluntary service (consent by student and family) Under 12 requires consent of parent and guardian over 12 parental consent it encouraged, but if health & safety compromised it could be waived (approved by supervisor) To access her support – Principal or Vice Principal engages (anonymous) through social worker Supports with attendance issues Situations where student is not attending or disengaged, supports student and family to improve attendance and engagement Attendance does NOT require consent; mandated by law If parents want more information, they can type: "YRDSB social worker" in search engine to find a public-facing website
	Questions:
	 If a parent wanted support, how would they get it? Parent would contact P or VP – and P or VP would connect for consultation. They would determine best support for student. Conversation with parents first (they would likely confer with P) Joyce would determine if appropriate case to take on – and then would contact parent Details that are confidential are shared parent or child to social worker. If parent spoke to teacher about it – they would refer to P and P would refer to Joyce
	Do you feel like you're meeting the needs by engaging once per week? Are your sessions keeping up with the need? Is there a backlog?
	 Support with students is short-term. Not providing support the entire school year short term looks different depending on

	 what providing at this point – meeting needs. Making use of the community partners (community agencies) who do provide mental health services. Liaison with broader community support. 		
	What specific trends have you observed in the past year compared to years prior?		
	 Impacts after virtual learning and the impacts of the pandemic. Unique needs at each school. Mental health – broad range – anxiety to depression to bullying to grief. General trends. Not unique to post pandemic, but perhaps augmented due to the affects of covid and being in-person 		
	What are you seeing at LWPS that is different from other schools?		
	 Not specific to LWPS – every student need is different (not our school) has a student with a lot of grief and loss due to death of a family member – just so happens that at this school they're experiencing other cases of grief this year. 		
Are there areas that we could support/promote/educate/focus on for the school without b trust or crossing lines?			
	 Something that has come up – at the schools – bullying and students not being nice. Peer conflict. Cyber bullying. Students not being nice during recess. Has been supporting students through this. Perhaps an area to focus on.
