ATTENDANCE REPORT

There is a positive relationship between regular attendance and success in school. Students at LSS are required to attend regularly, to be punctual, and to participate in all scheduled classes.

VALID ABSENCES include illness, bereavement or family emergency.

AUTHORIZED ABSENCES include dentist/doctor appointments, driver's test, and court appearances.

EXCUSED ABSENCES refer to field trips and school sanctioned events. Students are still considered to be at school.

EXTENDED ABSENCES of four days or more require the completion of a "Special Leave" form at least one week in advance of the leave. This form may be obtained from the Main Office. A parent/guardian signature is required. It is the student's responsibility to catch up on all work missed.

DO NOT plan absences or family vacations during culminating and exam periods as the evaluations CANNOT be rescheduled.

Absent for One or More Classes	Phone with valid reason indicating the time of absence or send a note with the student
Leaving Before the End of the Day	Student signs out in attendance office with a note from the parent/guardian
In the Event of an Emergency	Contact the office as soon as possible.

For safety reasons, students who have signed out must leave the building as they will not be directly supervised.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS TURNING 18

Under the Education Act, parents/guardians have a right to access their child's Ontario Student Record if the child is under 18.

If the student is 18 or over, the Board/school must follow the privacy provisions of the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act regarding the disclosure of personal information about the student to their parents/guardians.

Students 18 or over must provide written permission by signing the <u>Consent for Information Sharing</u> form to allow parents/guardians to continue to access school-related information about the student. This includes academic progress, attendance and behaviour.

Students can also obtain the form from the school office.

PREPARING FOR THE EQAO

Dear Parent or Guardian,

Your child will be writing the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) on **April 10**th **2018**. Additional information about the actual day will be sent to you at a later date. As part of our effort to ensure that your child is prepared and confident for the OSSLT, we have prepared this practice booklet which will be used over the month of March, in your child's regular classes. We hope to be able to familiarize students with strategies to be successful for the test, as well as provide them with some experience with the types of questions they will encounter on the test.

ADAPTING THE SNAP® PROGRAM FOR BLACK AND AFRICAN CANADIAN KIDS ...

WHAT IS THE SNAP® PROGRAM?

The SNAP® Program is a gender-sensitive, evidence-based early intervention program that teaches children with disruptive behaviour problems, and their parents, how to stop and think before they act and make better choices "in the moment". Developed by the Child Development Institute (CDI), the Program helps children between the ages of 6 and 11 to learn self-regulation, self-control and problem-solving skills. Children who enter the program may have engaged in aggressive, anti-social behaviour, and / or have come into contact with authority figures at school or in the community. SNAP® is a multi-faceted program designed to assist middle years children and their families, including working with their school and community to help keep kids in school and out of trouble, SNAP® is not recommended for children on the Autism Spectrum or with significant developmental delays.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

Service providers, advocates, educators, social workers, parents and anyone else who has had experience with Black children aged 6 to 11 who have demonstrated or experienced challenges with self-regulation and/or disruptive behaviour.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN?

We will share an overview of the SNAP® Program. You will share your experience and knowledge about Black children age 6 to 11 and provide your input into how the program materials could be adapted from a cultural identity and anti-Black racism lens. Dinner will be provided


