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RIDVAN

Ridvan (pronounced Riz-wan) is a twelve-day festival, the most important one of the Baha'i year. Ridvan, which means "paradise", is the name of the garden in which Baha'u'llah, the Founder of the Baha'i Faith, proclaimed His identity as a Messenger of God. This happened in 1863 as Baha'u'llah was about to be exiled from the city of Baghdad.

The twelve days of Ridvan, April 21 to May 2, commemorated the twelve days that Baha'u'llah spent in the Garden of Ridvan, on an island in The Tigris River. The First, Ninth, and Twelfth Days of Ridvan are considered significant holy days by Baha'is. The First Day (April 21) was the day that Baha'u'llah identified himself as a Messenger of God. On the Ninth Day (April 29), His family joined Him in preparation for the journey into exile. The Twelfth Day (May 2) represents the day that Baha'u'llah and His family were banished from Baghdad to Constantinople.

We extend good wishes to all staff, students and members of the Baha'i community who will be celebrating Ridvan.

READ-A-THON FUNDRAISER!!

We are excited to announce our annual fundraiser will be a Read-a-thon this year! This is a fun event to encourage kids to read and build literacy skills while also raising money for the Legacy School Council. 100% of the proceeds go to the School Council to support our mission of benefiting all students at Legacy. Past fundraising efforts have supported the purchase of additional technology for the school, outdoor recess equipment, literacy initiatives and math manipulatives to name a few.

HOW IT WORKS

- 1. The Read-a-thon will run from April 23 through May 4
- 2. Before it starts, students ask for pledges (either a flat donation or a donation per minute read) from family and friends. Use the Pledge Form to record the pledges. Cash and Cheques payable to Legacy Public School will be accepted.
- 3. Once the Read-a-thon starts, students should read, read, read as much as they can! See below for what reading counts. They can keep track of how many minutes they've read each day on the Reading Tracker; parents must sign the sheet at the end. No guessing or rounding up minutes; please use a clock or timer and be honest, so this can be fair and fun for everyone!
- 4. After the Read-a-thon ends, collect any remaining pledges and turn them in with your Pledge Form and Reading Tracker by Tuesday, May 8, 2018.

WHAT READING COUNTS

- Anything before April 23 and after May 4 does not count.
- Reading during class time, recess or lunch does count!
- Reading to younger students, or being read to by someone else does count!
- Reading aloud to someone else (or a pet or stuffed animal) does count. If that person
 is also participating in the Read-a-thon, it counts for both of you!
- Reading something assigned as homework does count.
- Reading instead of doing your homework or chores does not count.
- · Reading in all languages does count!
- Friday, April 27th is Super Hero Spirit Day; reading on that day has super powers and counts for DOUBLE MINUTES!
- Use the force! Reading on Friday, May 4th, "May the fourth be with you" counts for DOUBLE MINUTES!

READ-A-THON FUNDRAISER!!

PRIZES

To be eligible for a prize, students must turn in a completed Reading Tracker, Pledge Form, and all collected pledges by Tuesday, May 8th.

- Every student who participates gets a Read-a-thon Ballot, and a Legacy Lightning Bolt Bookmark!
- For every \$5 raised, students will be awarded 1 ballot to enter into a draw for the prize of their choice. Ballot boxes and prizes will be on display May 9th & 10th; draws will take place Friday May 11th in our Library!!
- Every student who reads at least the suggested goal for his/her grade (see the Reading Tracker) will be entered into a raffle for one of 3 Indigo gift cards (one to be awarded in each division)!
- The class with the highest average minutes read per student in each division will be awarded a movie party in the library.

Pledges turned in after May 8th will be gratefully accepted but unfortunately will not be eligible for prizes.
