ALERTS

Warm weather brings with it enjoyable activities, but hot weather can also cause stress to our bodies. Heat related stress can also be brought on by higher ambient temperatures and humidity levels. When ambient temperatures climb over 35 degrees Celsius and high humidity combine to make it feel higher, the body's ability to cool itself becomes increasingly difficult.

During hot, humid weather, our school office tracks temperatures and humidex levels hourly. If the temperature combined with humidity is above 35 degrees

Celcius we will ensure the following:

- rescheduling activities to another time or day,
- encourage students and staff to make use of shady areas
- · keep blinds closed,
- allow students to have frequent access to water
- ensure all classrooms have fans
- If necessary, classes can work in the cooler hallways, the library or even the gym.

FIRST NATIONS PRESENTATIONS

On Thursday our Inclusivity and Equity Team arranged for students in Kindergarten to grade 8 to learn more about the history of our land and indigenous ways of knowing. They invited Chad Solomon who is a member of the Henvey Inlet Ojibway First Nation in Ontario to speak to our students. His grandfather Art Solomon was a Traditional Healer and Justice Activist. Chad created the company Little Spirit Bear Productions that publishes the humorous adventure comic strip RABBIT and BEAR PAWS. Rabbit and Bear Paws is set in colonized 18 th Century North America. We follow the story of two mischievous Ojibwa brothers as they play pranks and have amazing adventures using a traditional Ojibwa medicine that transforms them into animals for a short time. He educates children all over Ontario of what it means to walk a good path through life, through understanding of the Seven Grandfather Teachings of Courage, Respect, Humility, Honesty, Truth, Love, and Wisdom.

Our grade 5 students have been learning about land treaties and opened the presentation with a Land Acknowledgment.

"We would like to start by acknowledging that we are on the traditional territories of the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishinaabe peoples, whose presence here continues to this day. We also would like to acknowledge this is the treaty lands of the First Nations of the Williams Treaty and thank them and other Indigenous peoples for sharing this land with us. We would like to acknowledge the Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation as our closest community and partners in education."

A territorial or **land acknowledgement** is an act of reconciliation that involves making a statement recognizing the traditional territory of the Indigenous people who called the **land** home before the arrival of settlers, and in many cases still do call it home.

The learning will continue this month as students engage in activities focused on an awareness and a greater understanding of indigenous ways of knowing.

These activities are supported by our Ontario Ministry of Education through a student SPEAK UP GRANT focused on Creating Awareness of Human Rights through Indigenous Perspectives
