Message from the Vice Principal

Where would we be without technology?

Technological advances made within the last decade are simply amazing! Perhaps even more astonishing is the speed and pace at which these changes are occurring. This rapid change often puts parents at a disadvantage in terms of their technological knowhow in relation to their children. Although computers are indispensable and the internet has become an essential tool for the acquisition of information, it can also be very dangerous and needs to be monitored. Cyber bullying is using electronic communication tools to antagonize and intimidate others. Many students have their own email addresses and participate in Instant Messaging or visit chat rooms. These internet sites may provide the opportunity for cyber bullying. The York Region District School Board has all students sign a contract for computer use at school. It is equally important that your children are monitored at home.



Signs to watch for...

Signs of cyber bullying victims are often similar to signs of other forms of bullying, in addition to the following: A child may:

- * Spend long hours on the computer
- * Close programs on their computer when you enter the room
- * Be secretive about Internet activities
- * Exhibit behavioural changes such as sudden disinterest in computer or cell phone
- * Always be doing homework on the Internet, but actually in chat groups and getting behind with school work
- Be secretive about who they are talking to and may have unexplained pictures on the computer

Prevention and Control for Parents

- * Have clear household rules guiding Internet use (i.e. not to be used unless parent is present to supervise)
- Keep the computer in a supervised area (i.e. not in the child's bedroom)
- * Know what kids are doing on-line through discussion or checking Internet history
- * Talk to your child about using good manners when communicating electronically and cyber bullying
- Encourage children to come to you if they suspect they are being cyber bullied
- * Report incidents of bullying to Internet Service Providers (ISP), school officials (if applicable), or police if harassment persists
- * Investigate purchasing an Internet Filtering program
- * Learn how to access the history of used sites on your computer. Ask your children if they know what to do if they come across something inappropriate or disturbing while on the computer? The safety of our students is a responsibility we share together as a community

Internet Safety

It was brought to our attention at our last School Council meeting that there were concerns about the internet filters on school computers. As with all concerns that are brought to our attention we acted on them in a timely manner to ensure a solution. Content filters in all YRDSB schools are managed by the IT department at the Board so we notified them of the issue. They worked diligently with the school and after meetings with network providers, updated content filters have been implemented at Little Rouge and all schools in YRDSB.

Throughout the year, our teachers spend time educating children about the appropriate use of technology so that they become responsible digital citizens. As well, staff supervise their classes to ensure that student use of the web, as with any educational tool, is appropriate. Finally, as you are aware, we have an appropriate use of technology policy and if students are using technology inappropriately, they are subject to consequences. Recently staff reviewed internet expectations with their classes and our Junior/Intermediate classes participated in assemblies to reinforce the importance of responsible technology use.

We hope that parents will continue to partner with us on this topic as we support and reinforce responsible technology use both at school and at home. Please see Mr. Valentim's Vice-Principal message on cyberbullying and internet safety at home. In addition, we are hosting an Internet Safety presentation for parents by Steven Chapelle on Wednesday, March 9th at 6:30. We hope you are able to join us!

KISS-AND-GO

The traffic flow through the school's parking lot is quite substantial before and after school and we need to be very concerned about safety of the children entering and exiting cars and those walking to or from the building. Parents



driving cars are asked to drop off/ pick students up in the kiss-and-go area only of the parking lot and to proceed with extreme caution through this area. Please have students exit the car on the side with the curb – not into the parking lot. When entering or exiting the kiss-and-go area please be careful to watch for students or staff who are walking by or supervising this area. We do not want anyone to be injured. Please do not enter the bus loop to drop off/pick up students. It is strictly to be used by school buses only.

Please <u>DO NOT PARK</u> in the bus loop and the kiss-and-go loop as these are designated fire routes. If you need to get out of your car, you must park your car in a parking spot. There are additional parking spots located on the road in front of the school as well.

The City of Markham parking enforcement could be making visits to the school area and we do not want any of our families being ticketed for parking illegally in the kiss-and-go and bus loops. As mentioned earlier, these are designated fire routes and the fine for stopping or parking in these loops is \$200. In addition, no one should be parking in the handicapped parking spots in the parking lot unless they have a permit. The fine for parking in a handicapped spot without a permit is \$350.

Your cooperation in these matters will ensure the safe arrival and departure of all our students, staff and parents.

New Ontario Driving Rules for Jan. 1 Include <u>Full</u> Pedestrian Crossing

The excerpt below is courtesy of one of our parents regarding new laws on crossing guard / full crossing expectations. It is important to share as this new law seriously increases fines and demerit points for crossing prior to the walk area being completely clear. Much more importantly, rushing through the cross walk prior to all pedestrians being completely clear could result in a serious accident – perhaps even a fatality.

Thank-you for always respecting the safety of our children.



Last year, Ontario's Ministry of Transportation introduced a series of new laws that included harsher fines for texting and driving, among other behaviours, in its "Making Ontario Roads Safer Act." Now, as of Jan. 1, 2016, those fines include staying put while people cross the street — at least, at particularly demarcated zones. According to the Ministry of Transportation, all drivers (including cyclists) must now stop and yield the whole roadway at pedestrian crossovers, as well as school crossings that have a crossing guard carrying a stop sign. So that means you can't just wait until

people have cleared enough space to allow you to zoom through in these areas — you have to wait until they've fully reached the other side. Failure to do so could mean **fines from \$150 to \$500 and three demerit points, or double that in Community Safety Zones**, which are marked and found near schools and public areas.



School Crossing (a crossing guard must be present for the new law to apply)

The Ministry tweeted an image in case people are confused (which, of course, will get you another fine if you're a driver looking at it on your phone in the car): Wait for pedestrians to cross the entire roadway.

Kindergarten Registration for September 2016

Kindergarten Registration Commenced on January 15, 2016

Kindergarten registration commenced on January 15, 2016 for the 2016-17 school year. Registration forms are available on YRDSB's website: www.yrdsb.edu.on.ca. Children who turn four or five years old during 2016, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten.

A Kindergarten Information session for JK's and their parents will be held on Thursday, May 12th, 6:00-7:30 pm. For more information please visit the YRDSB website or contact your local school.

Medical Information:

It's very important that the school be informed if your child has a medical condition.

If your child currently has a medical condition that you have not informed us about, please contact the office immediately. There are required forms that must be completed so that in the event of an emergency, all school staff will be prepared to take the necessary action.

Lunch Assistant Positions

If you are interested in working as a Lunch Assistant at our school, please contact the school office at 905-202-5960. We currently need people for occasional backup.

These are paid positions and require one hour a day, over our lunch hour which is from 12:50-1:50 pm.

Report Cards

Report cards will be sent home on February 18th. Regular communication between the home and school is necessary to improve student achievement and Report Cards provide us with the opportunity to communicate information about your children's learning. When reviewing your child's report card, pay close attention to the front page which reports on Learning Skills and Work Habits. Learning Skills and Work Habits are extremely important for success in and out of school. Although they are assessed on an ongoing basis and reported on at each reporting period, they are not used in determining the grades for the various subject areas. We do, however, know that there is a strong correlation between how well developed a student's learning skills are and how well he/she does in class. Thus, our teachers explicitly teach the learning skills to their students. The six skills/habits are briefly summarized below.

- Responsibility is shown when students fulfill commitments, complete and submit assignments and manage their own behaviour.
- <u>Organization</u> involves devising and following a coherent plan for completing work, prioritizing tasks, managing time, and effectively choosing and using resources.
- <u>Independent Work</u> involves completing a task with minimal teacher direction and/or peer support, following instructions, and revising work as necessary.
- <u>Collaboration</u> involves skills such as active listening, helping others to build and consolidate learning, giving and receiving quality feedback, and managing disagreements.
- <u>Initiative</u> is acting on new ideas and opportunities for learning with a sense of curiosity and the willingness to take risks.
- <u>Self-Regulation</u> involves students monitoring their behaviour and learning, such as attention skills, working memory, and thinking strategies.

As always, we encourage you to discuss concerns and questions related to your children's academic progress, the development of their learning skills, and their social/emotional well-being with the teacher at any time.

More On Report Cards - A Parent Guide to Assessment, Evaluation, and Reporting of Elementary Students

ELEMENTARY REPORT CARDS

The Elementary Provincial Report Card in February and June will contain letter grades/percentage marks. For students in Grades 1 to 6, student achievement will be reported as a letter grade (A, B, C, etc.) with a plus or minus sign as required and comments will indicate what the students have learned, strengths and next steps. For all students in Grades 7 and 8, student achievement will be reported as a percentage mark, along with descriptive comments about what the students have learned, their strengths and next steps. All students from Gr 1-8 will have comments related to how they are doing with regards to the development of their Learning Skills. This information will be on the front page of the report card.

HOW IS MY CHILD GRADED?

Your child is assessed on demonstrated achievement in relation to Ontario Curriculum Expectations. The expectations for each grade can be found on the Ministry's website. Teachers use assessment and evaluation strategies that address both what students learn and how well they learn.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

When a student's achievement is based on expectations modified (i.e. changed) from the grade level curriculum expectations to support English language learning needs, teachers will indicate this by checking the "ESL/ELD" boxes on the provincial report cards for the appropriate subject(s)/strand(s).

STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Reporting depends on the contents of each student's Individual Education Plan (e.g. alternative, modified or accommodations only). If the program is modified i.e. expectations have been changed, the IEP box will be checked. Additional information detailing the reporting requirements is available from the school.

ACHIEVEMENT CHART:

The curriculum expectations are assessed using the categories identified on the Achievement Chart: Knowledge and Understanding, Communication, Organization, Application. Student work is evaluated using the following Levels of Achievement:

Level 4	80% - 100%	Α	Student work exceeds the provincial standards, while still at grade level. Student has demonstrated a thorough and complete understanding of the required knowledge and skills.
Level 3	70% - 79%	В	Student work has met the provincial standards. Student has demonstrated an understanding of most of the required knowledge and skills.
Level 2	60% - 69%	С	Student work is approaching the provincial standards. Student has demonstrated an understanding of some of the required knowledge and skills.
Level 1	50% - 59%	D	Student work falls below the provincial standards. Student has demonstrated an understanding of few of the required skills and knowledge.
R	Below 50%	R	Student has not demonstrated an understanding of the required skills and knowledge. Student will require remediation to improve.

SCHOOL BUS CANCELLATION NOTICE DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER

School bus service may be cancelled from time to time due to inclement weather and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements. Since busing schedules begin by 7:00 a.m. or earlier, all cancellation decisions must be made by 6:00 a.m. to ensure the safety of our students. Cancellation decisions are made by the Board and will only be made after thorough consultation with school bus companies servicing York Region.



Please note: If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore students transported to school by parents in the morning will need to be picked up by parents at the end of the school day.



Combined Grade Classrooms

As you are aware, many schools in York Region and across the province have combined grade classrooms. A combined or split grade class contains students from two consecutive grades, for example, a grade 7/8 split class is comprised of students from grade 7 and 8. A large number of classes in York Region this year were combined grade classrooms.

Why do combined classrooms exist?

Frequently, combined grade organizations are the result of there being a cumbersome number of students at particular grade levels. Sometimes, there are too many students to form one class, but not enough students to form two classes. In these situations, students from two different grade levels are grouped together to form a combined class. Smaller schools are particularly challenged because of lower overall enrolment. In these cases, students may be in combined grades for several years in a row.

Why was my child chosen for the combined class?

When the school principal and staff consider students for a combined class, the following criteria may be considered:

A balance according to gender Work habits, maturity, cooperation A balance of ability, interests and talent Social and behavioural considerations ESL or Special Education needs Learning styles of the student

Are there any benefits to my child in a combined class?

Educational research supports many benefits for students in combined classes, including:

The development of independent learning skills Students learn from each other The enhancement of social/emotional development Leadership opportunities for students

Are there any disadvantages to a combined class?

No. An effective teacher and supportive parents provide a positive learning environment for children in any classroom organization. When student achievement is examined, the educational research has determined that there is no significant difference between single and combined or multi-grade classes.

Will my child be prepared for the next grade if he/she is in a combined class?

Yes. At the beginning of each school year, teachers use a variety of methods to assess the needs of each student regardless of the composition of the class. Using the Ontario Curriculum in each subject as a basis, the program is planned to meet the needs and abilities of all students in the class and to prepare students for the next grade.

Is the achievement of students in a combined grade comparable to children in a straight grade?

Educational literature shows that children in combined grade groupings function at a level that is comparable to children in a straight grade. Student achievement is not compromised. In addition, the research suggests that multi-age grouping is associated with a more positive self-concept and an enhanced attitude towards learning.

Although we do not yet have our student numbers or staffing for 2016-2017, we know that Little Rouge P.S. will have a number of combined grade classrooms for the next school year.

Dress Warmly for Outdoor Play

As you know, our students are provided with nutrition breaks from 10:40-11:10 a.m. (recess) and 12:50-1:50 p.m. (lunch). Part of this break time is allocated for fresh air/exercise. It is important to the health and well-being of each student that they be able to release their energy through outdoor activity. Students need to come to school dressed to play outside during recesses (hat, scarf, gloves/mittens, boots, etc.).

Being physically active during winter is an essential part of a healthy lifestyle. This includes remaining outside for 30 minutes at both morning and lunch recess. With severe weather conditions, reduced outdoor recesses or indoor recesses may take place. This decision is made on a day by day basis and would typically occur, according to school board policy, at about the -20 °C mark (with wind chill). Please ensure that your child(ren) come to school with extra clothes as it is eas-

ier to take off a layer if they get too hot than it is to put on a layer they may not have if they get cold. Also, please pack extra socks, mittens and pants so your child will have something to change into if they should happen to get wet.







Throwing of Snowballs is Not Allowed

In order to promote a safe and respectful environment on our school playground, students have been told that the throwing of snowballs is prohibited. Students are aware that snowballs may contain pieces of ice and rock and that they can cause injury to others or damage school property. Student safety is a priority at Little Rouge. Parents are asked to discuss the importance of keeping the snow on the ground and to remind students of our safe schools policy.

Ensuring the safety of your child(ren) is our priority. *PLEASE REPORT ABSENCES DAILY*.


