

# Equity, Inclusion, and Dismantling Racism

Every student should have the opportunity to achieve personal excellence, and to feel safe, welcome and valued. Our priority of championing equity and inclusivity has a focus on proactively supporting equitable access to quality education and opportunities for all students, and to challenge the marginalization of students, staff, and families.

At Maple Creek P.S., that work includes:

- the use of Anti-Biased Anti-Racist Word Walls in the classroom
- Revising our classroom libraries using books/texts that support a more equitable and inclusive approach to learning
- Designing learning activities that promote social justice, inclusion, and equity, with a focus on diversity
- Ensuring that students see themselves reflected in their learning environment
- Discussions around equity, inclusion and the importance of being an 'upstander' versus a 'bystander'

### The What and Why of Number Sense

It is important for children to develop number sense as they move through the grades. This simply means that children develop the ability to understand numbers, number relationships, and can use this understanding to solve mathematical problems.

The Ontario curriculum scaffolds the development of number sense for children as they learn to read, represent, compose, decompose, compare, order and estimate numbers. This journey begins in kindergarten where children learn about counting and quantity as they investigate and explore numbers in their everyday lives. The Ontario Mathematics Curriculum supports the development of number sense throughout the grades by carefully scaffolding for each grade.

- Grade 1 Numbers to 50 Try this at home: Together, count a small collection of items.
- Grade 2 Numbers to 200 Try this at home: How many ways can you show 2 dollars using different coins?
- Grade 3 Numbers to 1000 Try this at home: Count by 10s, 20s, 25s or 50s to 1000. To add an extra challenge, start at a number that is not 0.
- Grade 4 Numbers to 10 000 Try this at home: Think about as many situations as you can involving numbers up to 10 000. Discuss what the numbers and units represent.
- Grade 5 Numbers to 100 000 Try this at home: Have a discussion about where you find big numbers. Think about as many situations as you can involving numbers up to 100 000. Discuss what the numbers and units represent.
- Grade 6 Numbers to 1 000 000 Try this at home: Have a discussion about how big is a million. Think about it in terms of number of items, where you can find a million and how much it really is. You may want to check out the book How Much is a Million
- Grade 7 Number to one billion Try this at home: Think about as many situations as you can where you would find a billion. Discuss what the numbers and units represent.
- Grade 8 Very large and very small numbers. Try this at home: Have a discussion about what the smallest number is and what the largest number is. Then do a bit of searching to see if you are right. Discuss how big and small those numbers really are in comparison to everyday items.

### **Celebrating the Many Global Contributions to Mathematics**

Throughout human history, people from many cultures and societies have contributed to the continuously developing understanding of math. As a part of each monthly newsletter, one of these many significant contributions will be shared in celebration of how diverse ways of knowing have shaped our mathematics today.

Did you know that the first known use of zero was about 4000 years ago in the Sumarian culture in Mesopotamia? It was used as a placeholder to indicate the absence of a number. It was later independently developed by the Mayans and even later in India. Arab merchants brought zero from India to the West where after much debate it was accepted as a number.

### YRDSB Student and Family Surveys; Every Student Counts

YRDSB will be inviting all students in Grades 4-12 and students in Grades K-3 to participate in the 2022-23 Every Student Counts Survey in the Spring of 2023. Surveys will be available online and will take approximately 20 minutes to complete. You and your child should have received a letter



from the Board notifying them that the survey will be taking place. The surveys will provide the Board and our schools with valuable information about the learning experiences of students and families this year that are used to inform Board and school planning and to support student achievement and well-being. Students in Grades 4-12 will be given class time to complete the survey at schools. Students in Grades K-3 are encouraged to complete the survey at home with their family. Families who do not want their child(ren) to be sent an invitation to participate in the survey will be given a chance to opt their child out of receiving the survey in the new calendar year. As our first partners in education, we value input from families and encourage parents/guardians to complete the survey. The information provided will be confidential and kept in strict accordance with all relevant legislation. The purpose of the ESCS is to better understand our students' identities as well as their experiences inside of school. ESCS results will be used to inform Board and school improvement planning that aims to:

- identify and eliminate systemic barriers to student success
- create more equitable and inclusive school environments
- improve student achievement and well-beingFindings from the ESCS will be used to develop strategies and realign supports to where they are needed the most. As outlined in the <u>Director's Action Plan</u>, this work will be guided by an anti-oppression framework. Board and staff members will engage in learning to use the data from the ESCS in order to identify, interrupt and eliminate discriminatory practices and systemic barriers from schools and classrooms to continue supporting student achievement and well-being.
