





FRW COVID-19 Workplace Health & Safety Protocol

FRW will abide by all government protocols, including physic ing the size of events.

COVID-19 spreads from person to person, most commonly through respiratory droplets during close interactions (i.e., within 2 metres). COVID-19 can be spread by individuals who have mild symptoms, or who have not yet or who may never develop symptoms (Government of Canada).

- FRW staff and volunteers will maintain a physical distance of at least 2 metres (6 feet) at all times. If not possible, then FRW staff and volunteers will wear nonmedical masks.
- FRW staff and volunteers will wash or sanitize hands at the beginning and end of work activities. FRW staff will provide access to hand sanitizer and soap.
- FRW staff and volunteers will wear gloves when working together in the field.
- FRW staff will sanitize all equipment (shovels, trowels) before and after use.
 FRW staff and volunteers will arrive at the work site / office through independent
- means of transportation.
- \bullet FRW will limit the number of staff and volunteers working and interacting at the same time to an appropriate number as per applicable government guidelines. (A maximum of 5 participants, including staff, are allowed per event as of January 2021). • FRW staff and volunteers are required to stay home if feeling ill or if showing symp toms of COVID-19.
- FRW will develop sick day policies and work at home policies to enable employees to stay home and in self-isolation when ill, to undergo COVID-19 testing and to care for children of someone who is ill.
- FRW will post signage to discourage anyone who is ill from entering our office.
 A maximum of two people will be allowed in FRW's small office if both are well and wearing non-medical masks which fully cover their mouth and nose
- \bullet FRW will reinforce general practices to maintain physical distancing, such as distance greetings and NO handshakes.

FRW staff will be required to review and agree to this protocol, and pledge to implement this protocol when working with each other and volunteers, to protect the health and wellbeing of all FRW staff and volunteers.

Screening:

FRW will ask staff and volunteers if they are ill (coughing or sneezing) or have any symptoms of COVID-19 before they commit to a volunteer shift. FRW participants will complete the Event Intake and Health Assessment Form prior to joining a session. A screening poster will be printed and shared at events, and FRW staff will complete an on-site participant health screening using the poster. Anyone who answers yes to a screening question or who is exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19, has traveled in the last 14 days or has had close contact with a confirmed case will not be permitted to participate.

Symptoms of COVID-19

Those who are infected with COVID-19 may have little to no symptoms. You may not know you have symptoms of COVID-19 because they are similar to a cold or flu. Symptoms have included: cough, fever, difficulty breathing, pneumonia in both lungs Symptoms may take up to 14 days to appear after exposure to COVID-19. This is the longest known incubation period for this disease.
