Kindergarten Registration

We are pleased to announce that you can register your child for <u>Kindergarten ONLINE</u>.

Kindergarten registration has begun for the 2019-20 school year. Children born in 2015 are eligible for Year 1 kindergarten this

September 2019. Children born in 2014 and are currently attending public school are eligible for Year 2 kindergarten in September 2019.

Documents that are required for registration are as follows:

Proof of child's age - Birth Certificate, if born in Canada.

- Passport, Permanent Resident Card of the child and parents if child is born outside of Canada.

- Town of Markham Tax Bill/Utility Bill

If you rent:


- ♦ Landlord/Tennant Lease Agreement

<u>Titan Student Equity Team</u>

It has been a busy month for the Titan Student Equity Team here at Markham Gateway. This month, students designed and created an interactive bulletin board to commemorate Black History Month. The bulletin board hosted faces of famous Black Canadians as well as other important and influential black leaders and change makers from around the globe. Students were challenged to "Guess Who" and then were able to read and learn about the impact of the people showcased. As well, this month students created and shared Black History Month announcements each morning, in order to grow our capacity as a school and to develop our understanding with respect to current and previous important contributions from the black community. Also new this year, a group of grade eight students wrote and performed spoken word poetry at our monthly assembly. The poem, titled "I am Black," was performed by Jahlia, Janani, Sabinaya, and Varshana, and it challenged students and staff to explore their own identities and how they could become allies to the black community and makers of change in important areas such as fighting racism and discrimination. All classes were also involved in colouring a quilt piece for our school freedom quilt mosaic art display, which was designed and implemented by Sarah M. A big thank you to all students and staff who participated, and we look forward to what the Titan Student Equity Team will be up to next month!



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<u>Math Games</u>

Using games to support your child at home to reinforce math concepts they are learning in class can be fun for the whole family! Games provide children with opportunities to explore mathematical concepts such as number concepts, patterns and relationships. It also allows them to use models and strategies they are familiar with (e.g., arrays, ten frames, skip counting). Some math games are commercially available but most can be played with common household objects. In fact, most games that are not considered "math" games have many math concepts already in them. Try highlighting some of those concepts as you are playing.

MATH GAMES TO PLAY AT HOME:

Math games can be a wonderful source for developing mathematical reasoning while practicing basic facts. These games can be purchased at your local toy store (Toys R Us, Mastermind, Walmart, etc.). Friday night family games night?

Set: A card game of logic and visual perception that can be enjoyed by the whole family (ages 6 to adult). Adults, be forewarned that it can be humbling to play this game with young-sters.

Tangos: A game that focuses on spatial relationships and that challenges the whole family, young and old alike.

Mastermind: A game of logic enjoyed by both children and adults. Look for a version of Mastermind for younger children ages 6 and up.

Cribbage: A wonderful card game played on a pegged board that develops skill in adding series of small numbers. The game is enjoyable for children of all ages.

Dominoes: A game of strategy and numbers that children as young as 4 years of age can play as a number recognition game. Yet the regular game of dominoes is challenging for adults as well.

Mancala: A challenging African stone game of logic for adults that can be adapted to meet the needs of children ages 5 and up.

Equate: A game for reinforcing computation with whole numbers, decimals, and fractions. I haven't played this yet, but my nieces and nephews tell me it is challenging and fun.

Checkers/Chess: Great games for developing skill with logical reasoning.
