

# **OUAC** (Ontario University Application Centre) and COLLEGE DEADLINE REMINDER

available at the door.

The holiday break is a great time to work on University and College applications. Many programs now ask for supplementary information and the time off from school is a great opportunity to get this done!

The deadline to submit initial applications to <u>OUAC</u> is January 16, 2019. The processing fee allows students to choose 3 programs to apply to. Additional programs can be applied to at an additional cost. Offers may begin at any point after an application has been submitted. Each university schedule is different. The latest date that a student can expect an offer, deferral, or refusal of admission is May 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019. The earliest date that any deposits may be required is June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019.

The deadline to apply for college programs in Ontario is February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019 for equal consideration. Students must make an account at <u>ontariocolleges.ca</u> before applying. Applications are being accepted now. The processing fee for colleges includes applications to 5 programs. There is a maximum of three programs at any one college. The deadline to accept an offer from a college is May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019 and the earliest date that a college can require any kind of deposit for residence or tuition is on June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2019.


### **DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT**

#### SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Markville Science department has had an exciting start to the school year. Of course our students are involved in the usual in-class learning of curriculum expectations and learning skills. However, the Science program at Markville is enhanced by the many extra-curricular opportunities and beyond-theclassroom activities we offer. The Grade 9s visited the Ontario Science Centre, and are excited to participate in the STEM it UP! Living Space collaborative inquiry. Our Grade 9 teachers are working with Let's Talk Science and Fair Chance Learning to introduce our students to concepts of computational thinking and coding with micro-bits. They bring experiential learning into the classroom as our Grade 9s will connect with Dr. David Saint-Jacques on his mission to the International Space Station. Our Grade 10s were thoroughly engaged by a guest speaker from the York Environmental Stewardship who addressed "How to Change the World: Education to inform Conservation and Resilience with Climate Change." Through the use of the library's Breakout EDU boxes, our Grade 11 Chemistry students used their critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity skills to solve puzzles and unlock clues. They also experienced the Get to Know H<sub>2</sub>O program presented by the city of Markham. In our Grade 11 Physics course, students built their own motors, and heard from Dr. Hossam Gaber who spoke on energy storage technologies for sustainable infrastructures. Our Grade 12 Biology students engaged in a discussion with guest speakers on how modern farming and agricultural practices contribute to present-day health concerns. They learned about the latest meat and plantbased food science technologies.







In addition, teachers and students have organized numerous extended-learning opportunities through HOSA (currently training for the SLC) and Eco-Club (building 'milk mats', conducting waste audits, and continuing the work to maintain our Platinum standing). Next semester, students are invited to participate in UBC's Michael Smith Challenge, the University of Toronto's National Biology Competition, the University of Waterloo's Chem 13 News Contest and Avogadro Chemistry Contest, as well as the OAPT and SIN contests. We will also be sending teams of students to compete in the Design Build Challenge at the York Region Skills Competition, and the YRDSB Science Olympics in May!

#### PHYSICS CLUB

Markville's Physics Club students have been conducting fun activities with liquid nitrogen, super conductor levitation, angular momentum conservation demos, and preparation for the Sir Isaac Newton Contest.
