## LITERACY

Markville SS's teachers and the Literacy team are presenting Grade 10 students with a series of weekly lessons connected to building students' Literacy skills. These lessons will involve teaching strategies and formulas for long writing tasks including writing a news report and a series of opinion paragraphs.

On Wednesday, February 26<sup>th</sup> during Period 1, all Grade 10 classes participated in a Literacy Blitz activity that gave students the opportunity to practise their news report writing and participate in peer / self-evaluations of their writing. Students also reviewed strategies covered in the previous Literacy Blitz activity around organizing their news reports.

#### WINTER PARKING LOT SAFETY

Our first 2 inclement weather days have brought a significant amount of snow to our parking lot. As always, we still encourage our students to walk to and from school, dressed appropriately for the weather. If a student must get a ride, please take extra care to ensure their safety as well as the safety of other drivers, students, and staff. Drop offs can occur anywhere in the loop once you have pulled over safely to the curb; the student then can walk around the loop and not have to cross any traffic on their way into the school.

We thank those parents and guardians who have been changing their habits when it comes to picking up students at the end of the day. The loop is for immediate drop offs and pick-ups only – parking is not permitted at any time within the loop. It is a designated fire route and the fine for parking can be quite expensive. Parking while remaining in your vehicle whether it is running or not is still considered parking. Parents and guardians are strongly encouraged to enter the parking section to wait for students at the end of the day. Once the students have actually left the building, you may then enter the pick-up loop to collect them. School staff have no authority over tickets issued by the City of Markham. Please note, bylaw officers may conduct enforcement at school zones by recording license plates, without stepping out of their vehicle, and mail Penalty Notices to the registered owners of improperly parked vehicles.

#### LIBRARY LEARNING COMMONS

In case you missed all the tweets about our adventure with the ever humble Rubik's Cube, we thought we would share here. For those of you who follow us on Twitter (@msscommons), thank you and we hope you have enjoyed our February 'cube journey'.

Let's start with 'the what'. This Markville library initiative was based on the Rubik's Brand Ltd. You <u>CAN Do the Rubik's Cube Program</u>. Their mission is simple: teach kids 8-18 how to solve the Rubik's Cube. Why did we do this? There is the obvious: While the Cube may have been introduced to the world in 1974, it still holds a tremendous appeal. The YCDRC Program told us it helps develop not only math skills but self-esteem would be boosted because of the pride the student would feel once solving the cube. How could we resist?

Time to confess. The website was right. It did. Math geeks were loving it! Students did feel pride (and we have the photos to prove it!) But we quickly learned this program was benefiting our students in so many other ways.

- It was a shared activity. Students would take a break and solve a few cubes and place them in the growing mosaic. Students dropped by all day long. They did a little. They did a lot. But they did it together.
- It was a way to make a new friend. Students who didn't know each other would work side by side, helping each other. Or just work quietly side by side.
- It was peer to peer learning. Initially, library staff would be involved and explaining how to build the mosaic but that quickly stopped as students started explaining to each other. As educators, we know the value of such a dynamic.



- It was an activity that allowed everyone to feel success; a sense of accomplishment. Everyone from the cube wizards to the students who had never picked up the cube before and perhaps were a little more than intimidated, all had a moment of personal success. They did it. Whether it was one side of the cube or spinning it ferociously to solve, all had a moment of glory.
- It was a non-device moment in our students' lives. We must remind our students that being creative without batteries is possible and fun. It's too easy to lecture and nag. We learned the importance of the adults taking the lead and creating those opportunities.
- Students are stressed. The mosaic building allowed students to participate for 5 minutes to an hour after school. Providing opportunities for students to be calm and focused on play is a good thing.
- The art of conversation is not lost. Personally this was my favourite benefit of the Cube program. I've already told you about the peer to peer learning that occurred but I also want to highlight that students would often chit chat; that is the quiet conversing of the mundane and every day. How wonderful. Thank you Professor Erno Rubik.
