## **COVID-19 Protocol Reminders**

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In order to continue to keep everyone safe at Markville, it is important that we all follow the COVID-19 protocol as developed by the YRDSB in conjunction with York Region Public Health. We greatly appreciate our students' and their families' cooperation with masking requirements:

- Household and non-household close contacts of a COVID-19 case or symptomatic individual (even if not required to isolate as per the requirements in the screening tool) must self-monitor and wear a well-fitted mask (type non-specified) for 10 days (from last exposure) in school and child care settings.
- This includes avoiding activities such as high-contact sports and playing wind instruments where masking and/or physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- Under current <u>federal travel requirements</u>, individuals returning from international travel (even if exempt from quarantine) must wear a wellfitted mask (type non-specified) at all times when in public spaces (including schools).

The Michael Smith Science Challenge is a bilingual national competition written by students in Grade 10 Science or lower. It emphasizes logical thinking and covers material in the Science curriculum common to all provinces. #### SUMMER SCHOOL OPTIONS AND REGISTRATION PROCESS

In-Person Learning – Secondary Summer School

Offered at nine locations: Aurora HS, Keswick HS, Langstaff SS, *Markham District HS, Milliken Mills HS, Pierre Elliott Trudeau HS (these three are the closest to MSS)*, Richmond Green SS, Tommy Douglas SS, and Westmount CI. Students are required to attend daily from 8:45 a.m. to 3:33 p.m. with scheduled breaks and a lunch period.

Acceleration <u>full-credit</u> courses: Wednesday, July 6 to Friday, July 29 Credit Upgrading courses: July 6 to July 18 (S1) & July 19 to July 29 (S2)

• For students who were successful in obtaining the credit and seeking additional support

#### **Reinforcement courses: July 6 to July 18 (S1) & July 19 to July 29 (S2)**

• For students who were previously unsuccessful in obtaining the credit and have been recommended by staff for reinforcement

# **Civics & Careers** Acceleration half-credit courses: July 6 to July 18 (S1) & July 19 to July 29

• Students interested in taking both Civics and Careers must select one course from each session (i.e. CHV2O5 (S1) & GLC2O6 (S2) or GLC2O5 (S1) & CHV2O6 (S2)) Remote Learning – International Languages

Remote learning classes will occur in a virtual environment, *synchronously*. Students are required to attend daily from **8:45 a.m. to 3:33 p.m**., with scheduled breaks and a lunch period.

Acceleration full-credit courses: Wednesday, July 6 to Friday, July 29 Languages offered: Farsi, Simplified Mandarin, Spanish

Online Learning - Secondary Summer School

Online Learning courses are specifically designed to be taught in a fully online format in an asynchronous model. Students are able to access course content at any time with daily check-in opportunities with their teacher.

Acceleration full-credit courses, 18 days: Monday, July 4 to Wednesday, July 27 Civics & Careers Acceleration half-credit courses: July 4 to July 13 (S1) & July 14 to July 27 (S2)

• Students interested in taking both Civics and Careers <u>must select one course from</u> <u>each session</u> (i.e. CHV2O5 (S1) & GLC2O6 (S2) or GLC2O5 (S1) & CHV2O6 (S2))

\*Students must sign up for In-Person or Online learning summer school through myBlueprint (Continuing Ed tab in your high school pathway planner).

\*Students MUST fill in the Google Form below to ensure that Guidance has all information, as well as Guardian permission. Confirmation of permission via this form replaces submitting a sign-off sheet.

\*Only one 4-week course OR a max of two 2-week courses can be taken during summer. Special exceptions for graduating students only (Dual Credit).

\*If for some reason a student is unable to complete summer school and it is a compulsory course, it is the student's responsibility to connect with Guidance at the beginning of the new school year to ensure they have the course added back to their timetable - all efforts to do so will be made. Information on how to do that will be sent to students at that time.

#### POST-SECONDARY INFORMATION

Reminder that students accepting an offer from **OCAS** (Ontario Colleges), must accept by **May 1st**. **OUAC** (Ontario Universities) must accept by **June 1st**. The upload to OCAS and OUAC has occurred - students have been asked to confirm that all courses are visible and accurate, and to speak to Private schools about uploading midterm marks, or ensure that Guidance has access to TDSB/Catholic midterm grades. At this time, Semester 2 Midterm marks are visible to Post-Secondary institutions. **Full Disclosure**, where a course remains on a transcript, is **May 9th**. Happy weekend! Your Guidance Team~

# WHAT WE DO

# WHY

- 25 years of Black Youth Helpline (BYH) experience has proved informing. We must Intervene on behalf of youth with complex needs before severe problems arise.
- Needed are primary prevention approaches including a focus on parents and schools at the earliest possible point.
- A significant body of literature underline that suspensions and dismissals from schools are 3-4 times higher for vulnerable children.
- The word "drop-out" is often a misnomer. Repeated suspensions and dismissals fuel school failure and push students out of schools (Wilson, 2014). "We need to comprehend fully why schools fail some youths and conversely, why some students are failing school" (Dei, 1996).
- By helping youth, parents and schools succeed we increase the chances for productive futures for Canada's children.

## **Background Information**

The Public Property Assessment Network Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 is being awarded through the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA) to one recipient in the OPSBA Central East Region for three school years – 2019-20, 2020-21, and 2021-22. Scholarship recipients are students of strong character, who care deeply about their communities and furthering their own learning.

## Who Can Apply?

#### Eligible students must be:

A Canadian citizen or permanent resident

- In good standing academically and non-academically with your high school
- Attending college, university or an apprenticeship program within Ontario in 2022
- Graduating from a secondary school within one of the eligible school boards or school authority

Selection Criteria will consider, but is not limited to:

- Community involvement such as volunteering, athletics, and extra-curricular activities Initiative to solve problems around you with the involvement and support of others Social identity, socio-economic status or other factors unique to each student's achievements and the opportunities available to them
- Receipt of other major awards or scholarships

### **Application Process**

Applicants are asked to explain in a **maximum** of 300 words their suitability for the Public Property Assessment Network Scholarship based on the established criteria.

All applications must be accompanied by **two letters of reference**, one of which must be from the current principal on school letterhead and contain a statement confirming eligibility requirements. Letters of reference *shall not exceed two pages in length*.

To ensure a fair selection process, any additional materials/letters and/or submissions beyond the word limit will **not be taken into consideration**.
