How to support your 2SLGBTQ+ child



What to do when your child comes out to you Tips for parents/guardians



Coming out is often a task that requires an immense amount of bravery, vulnerability, and honesty. While it can come as a shock and can be disorienting, it is also an act of trust and an invitation to get to know your child's authentic self. Here are some suggestions on how to react in a way that will support your child.



DOs

- Tell your LGBTQ12S child that you love and accept them for who they are
- ASK your child if and how you can share their LGBTQ12S identity to other people
- Welcome your child's partner and LGBTQI2S friends get to know them and understand that they are important and supportive to your child
- Support your child's gender expression by using their correct pronouns, name, and affirming that they can dress however they want and style their hair however they want.
- Advocate for your child in the face of homophobia, biphobia or transphobia from other people
- Educate yourself on LGBTQ12S issues, and (if applicable) encourage LGBTQ12S acceptance at your religious institutions
- Believe your child can have a happy life as an
 LGRTQI2S adult

DON'Ts

- Tell your child that it is "just a phase"
- · Try to change your child's identity
- Blame your child's LGBTQI2S friends for influencing your child to identify this way
- Ignore their request to use a different name and/or pronouns
- Reject your child based on something they cannot change
- Allow homophobia, biphobia or transphobia to occur in the conversations around you, whether your child is present or not
- Prevent your child from participating in LGBTQI2S groups or events
- · Police how they want to dress or style their hair
- Use religion as an excuse to reject your child
- · Avoid talking about your child's identity
- Out your child without their permission

Dutch Heritage Month

Ontario is home to about 500,000 Dutch Canadians. Since the early 1800s, the Dutch Canadian community has made and continues to make significant contributions to the growth and prosperity of the Province of Ontario.

By proclaiming the month of May as Dutch Heritage Month, the Province of Ontario recognizes the important contributions that Dutch Canadians have made to the economic, political, social and cultural fabric of Ontario's society. May is a historically significant month for the Dutch Canadian community.

On May 5, 1945, the Canadian forces were instrumental in the liberation of the Netherlands from occupation during World War II. The Netherlands celebrates its independence and liberty, along with the heroic efforts of the Canadian forces, with events that are usually opened by the Prime Minister, who starts the festivities from a different province every year. A team of around 5000 runners carries a flame to 200 municipalities all throughout the Netherlands, which marks the official beginning of all events, with free festivals happening in over 14 cities in the country.

Bevrijdingsdag or **Liberation Day**, is celebrated in Canada with two minutes of still silence to reflect upon the significance and meaning of our Freedom and those who fought for it.

The Come Up summer program 2023 – School Newsletter

The York Region District School Board is pleased to announce The Come Up summer program 2023. This program offers self-identifying Black students who are entering grade 10 in September 2023 with an opportunity to earn a history credit. Students will explore the history of Black and/or African peoples in Canada. Students will explore historical developments and events in the countries of origin of Canada's diverse Black/African population, the factors that influenced voluntary and forced migration to Canada, and their contributions to Canadian identity and heritage. It will also feature various speakers from the Black community. Each activity/workshop will use an identity affirming approach with emphasis on student engagement to build positive self-esteem for Black students. Students will have the option to use this credit to fulfill the grade 10 compulsory history credit.

Students will earn/receive the following:

- Swag bags including t-shirts and resources;
- Free lunch (Mondays and Wednesdays); and
- Grade 10 compulsory history high school credit;

2023 Summer Program

Program overview

The Come Up summer program is a unique in-person course offered to self-identifying Black students in the York Region District School Board. It also includes guest speakers, field trips, lunch and swag.

Students entering grade 9 will earn a Civics and Careers (GLC2O/CHV2O) credit.

Students entering Grade 10 will earn a Black History (CHE3O) credit. This credit can be used to fulfill the grade 10 compulsory history credit.

Eligibility (must meet all criteria)

- Are you entering Grade 9 or 10 in September 2023?
- Do you self-identify as Black?
- Are you a YRDSB Student?
- Are you interested in earning a high school credit?
