DESIGN THINKING AND CLASSROOM REDESIGN PROJECT

Markville History students embarked on an important journey this year as they considered the impact that space has on learning and wellness in modern society. The year started with a Modern Learning Design Challenge where students had the opportunity to design the modern classroom. After submissions were considered changes started to be made almost immediately. We leveraged a lot of student research and started to experiment with changing spaces in the classroom. There were simple changes such as decluttering space, moving furniture and sharing our learning with others. A team of students shared their learning with our staff at a PA day, at regional heads meetings, and YRDSB conferences. We were also able to do site visits to the Google offices in Toronto, and a couple of modern public and private schools to see how modern environments are impacting mental health and general wellness. There was then a long process of researching and finding new types of furniture that we hope will be replicable in other classrooms and other schools.

For instance, our grade 9s embarked upon the study of *Romeo and Juliet* and many had the opportunity to write poems for submission to the Stratford Festival Theatre. To Ms. Millington's great delight, she received an email from Stratford indicating that they thought the poems were "fabulous" and would be read in a production of *As You Like It!* Speaking of Stratford, we were very fortunate to benefit from some funding from our SHSM partners to subsidize a day trip to see *Shakespeare in Love*. We took 176 students and 8 teachers and had a beyond remarkable day. The sun was shining and the play we watched exceeded all expectations - to quote our students, it was "truly magic". It was a day that will long be remembered and we're so grateful to all the students who represented Markville so professionally while expanding their cultural horizons and benefiting from the extraordinary world of Shakespearean Theatre.



Furthermore, our grade 10s demonstrated great critical and creative prowess in organizing, scripting, and filming their *Macbeth* summatives which took many forms: trials, westerns, game shows, musicals, 40s mafia skits, sci-fi films, and group therapy sessions to name a few. Bravo to all! Our senior classes engaged in a multitude of skill building tasks, most notably, the grade 11s produced innovative and insightful satirical media pieces and our grade 12s deepened their philosophical inquiry by looking at key questions of *Hamlet* and *King Lear*. In her final summative for Hamlet, a socratic circle discussion, one of our students expounded upon a key insight that she gleaned from her study:

"Students are faced with a lot of challenges and it can be easy to get down on yourself and feel like you're not doing enough or not achieving enough. I think what most resonated with me about Hamlet was the lens through which we looked at his conflicts. He too feels overburdened; he wants to fix everything but doesn't initially think he is capable. Ultimately, what stuck with me is that he didn't just turn his back on things, he didn't stand idly by. He did what he could and that's really what legacy is about. It's about putting the best of ourselves forward and knowing that we can make an impact, even if it's small scale, and that our kindnesses can really make a difference in the lives of others".

In addition, our Pre-AP and AP level students continue to make great strides and we again had a number of students write the AP English exam – we have every confidence that the results will reflect your keen interpretive skills. In another outside the classroom endeavor, many of our English colleagues along with many committed students worked to complete their second instalment of the Markville Gazette. In April, Ryan Kum earned **a silver medal** for his project on the "*Impact of Silver Nanoparticle Exposure on Intestinal Microbiota"*, Cheryl Cheung and Hawk Yang earned **bronze medals** for their project "*Water You Gonna do with that Lead?*" at the York Regional Science and Technology Fair, which took place at York University. In May, our teams **won Overall Combined Score**, **Overall Physics**, **Overall Chemistry** and placed **third in the Senior Physics** events in this year's Science Olympics at Seneca, also on the York University campus.

Back at Markville, the grade 12 biology students were tracking their sugar intake and learning how high fructose corn syrup metabolizes with the intent that this knowledge would motivate them to control their sweet tooth to prevent long-term health effects.

Meanwhile in Physics, the grade 12 classes showcased their projectile launchers as a culminating task designed to incorporate the broader scope of the course. Their designs, as always, were creative and fun to watch in action. **Great job 12s!**

The junior level classes were very excited as they participated in School Grounds Greening; eco games, designed their own science fairs and learned how their new science knowledge is used outside of the classroom, from guest speakers.

Tariq Kermalli, Kaitlyn Lee, Zoravur Singh and Anson Cheung were awarded a certificate of achievement for being in the top 10% of students who wrote the Michael Smith Science Challenge this year.

Not to be outdone, our senior Biology students placed **41/211** schools across Canada in the U of T National Biology Contest with **Edwin Tse** ranking **top 5%** earning himself a National Biology Scholar Certificate and **William Liu** ranking **top 6%**.

In addition, **Adam Kaufman-Frey** placed in the **top 5%** of the University of Waterloo's Chem13 News contest earning an invitation to participate in a summer research program and a plaque to commemorate his accomplishment.

Four students in Ms. Sharp's Grade 10 Career Studies class entered the Ontario Ministry of Labour's '*It's Your Job'* Prevention contest and they came in **first place**. **Raagavi Ramenthiran**, **Jaclyn Chiu**, **Morgan McKay** and **Jessica Gu** created a two minute public service announcement outlining the negative impact that accumulated stress can have on young workers over time.

After winning the provincial competition, their entry was submitted to the national contest put on by the Canadian Centre for Occupational Health and Safety- where they came in **2nd place**. In total, these students were awarded \$3500 and the Markville guidance department was also awarded \$3500.





The students received their award from Mr. Michael Chan, MPP for Markham-Unionville, and were congratulated by Mr. J. Philip Parappally, Director of Education for YRDSB, Mr. Billy Pang, School Trustee for Markham Wards 2, 3 & 6, and Ms. Obadia, Principal of Markville SS.

Here is a message from the students explaining their award winning entry:

Mental health is vital to our everyday lives and can, at times, carry more significance than physical health; however, unlike physical illnesses, mental illnesses have been surrounded by a destructive stigma for many years. Recent studies have shown that 1 in 4 Canadian workers have described their day-to-day lives as highly stressful and 1 in 5 employees have mental health issues. With this in mind, we set out to create a video addressing the reality of psychological health and stress as a whole and spread awareness on this equally important issue. Although this is such a widespread issue, mental health is often overlooked.

Our video highlights the negative effects accumulated stress can have on mental health. It follows the very routine life of a girl whose added workload and responsibilities from school and her part-time job become overwhelming. Although this was originally made for a project in our Careers course, Ms. Sharp encouraged us to submit the video, entitled "**Breakdown**", into the "It's Your Job" government video contest. We ended up winning 1st place in the provincial Ministry of Labour contest and 2nd place in the national contest held by the Canadian Centre for Occupational Health and Safety, winning \$3,500 altogether and a matched amount for the school. We would like to thank Ms. Sharp and numerous other teachers and peers in this school for their continuous support. With their encouragement, we have been able to spread the word concerning mental health and hopefully take one more step towards releasing the stigma that surrounds it.

The **Computer Engineering** class had a great year where we introduced students to Micro-controller such as Arduino, Computer Architecture and Electronic components. By acquiring these essential skills, students were able to build a PCB board of their choice. Through our labs, experiments, and individual projects, students are applying mathematics, science knowledge, and problem solving in the electronic designing process. The **Woodworking** classes have been studying the broad range of career opportunities available in the manufacturing sector. They have also been planning and fabricating various projects centred on furniture and household design.

Markville students participated in the annual University of Waterloo Math contests this spring achieving outstanding results again this year.

In the Grade 9 contests, Pascal and Fryer, Markville placed **6th** and **5th** respectively in York Region, **24th** and **14th** in Ontario, **43rd** and **21st** in Canada.

In the Grade 10 contests, Cayley and Galois, Markville placed **8th** and **6th** respectively in York Region, **35th** and **20th** in Ontario, **70th** and **37th** in Canada.

In the Grade 11 contests, Fermat and Hypatia, Markville placed **9th** and **4th** respectively in York Region, **30**th and **10**th in Ontario, **60th** and an amazing **14th** in Canada.



In the Euclid contest, for Grade 12 students, Markville placed **5th** in York Region, **16th** out of **721** schools in Ontario and **22nd** out of **1499** schools that participated in Canada.

It is important to note that Markville's performance is measured against an average of **1266** schools that participated in the Pascal/Cayley/Fermat contests and an average of **441** schools that participated in the Fryer/Galois/Hypatia contests in Canada.

Co-operative Education honours all destinations. Whether your plan is to attend University, College or an Apprenticeship program, a rich learning experience is available to you through Co-op. This opportunity is provided to Grade 11 and 12 students allowing them to test drive a career. This helps students to determine their education and career path, while earning 2-4 high school credits.

Here are some testimonials from some of our students this semester

My Co-op placement at Diaz Law Barristers and Solicitors was a life changing experience that I will never forget. Walking in to work, day after day, I was able to learn and grasp a sense of what the reality of being at work is like. My interaction and communication skills have vastly improved ever since I began working at my placement because I had to greet and welcome clients on a daily basis. In addition, the lawyers and employees at Diaz Law are always willing to explain how tasks must be done in a very concise and clear manner. Furthermore, they are very supportive of the Cooperative Education Program and they see the value in having high students experience what a legal profession could be like once entering the field of law. From this Co-op experience, it made me more aware of the various



employability skills which will definitely benefit me in the future. In conclusion, I definitely learned a lot about myself and my personality traits in a workplace.



During my Co-op, I worked as a game designer and programmer at a local game development company located in Markham called Clipwire Games. I was given tasks such as designing and balancing game characters in terms of their damage, appearance, and abilities for levels. SHSM Program

Markville offers Specialist High Skills Majors programs in FIVE economic sectors: Arts and Culture, Business, Environment, Health and Wellness, and Information and Communications Technology. Our program continues to flourish with 156 registered students. Students in the SHSM programs get to focus their senior high school years in an economic sector. Through this program we are able to visit post-secondary programs, listen to industry experts about trends in the workplace and receive valuable experience in the form of workshops and certifications.

Here is a small samples of some of the opportunities our SHSM students were able to participate in this year.

SHSM Students undergo Innovation, Creativity and Entrepreneurship (ICE) training at Durham Flight Centre. They gained valuable insight in how to approach problem solving by presenting to business executives – in this case marketing flight programs to the youth market.
