Grade 11 French was full of fun and work this semester! Students presented on people of influence, created and filmed news broadcast videos and presented on directors and producers known globally. They explored current events, and investigated social issues. They travelled to the **AGO** and then presented on art that inspired them. Students improved their speaking abilities and honed their writing skills. They read *Petit Nicolas* and *Fantôme de l'Opéra* and compared the written masterpiece to the film versions. They enjoyed a great French Food day with treats from many francophone countries. The students worked very hard and it showed in their final project: creating a magazine online and a formal presentation to share their discoveries with the class!! **Bravo! C'était amusant!**

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TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

This year, there have been some big changes in Markville's Tech Department staff. In Sept, 2015, we welcomed a new Computer Robotics / Engineering teacher, Simon Huang. His specialty in engineering is broadening the projects available to our students in the grade 11 and grade 12 Robotics / Engineering courses.





Students and parents can continue to access Markville Tech's YouTube channel 24/7 through their iPhones, iPads, Blackberry's and other smart phones as well as their laptops and home computers. The channel boasts student music videos, commercials and video tutorials as well as full-length clay animations and short films. We are excited to be able to offer this component as a public platform to continue to explore and share the amazing course work our students are able to accomplish.

This semester **Communication Technology** students put out some real world projects, such as creating the holiday cards for the school's administrative team. More than 200 examples of student work were delivered to members of the school community. The students worked exceptionally hard to make this delivery a great success.

The **Tech. Design** class is just wrapping up their 3D playground assignments. Starting with concept of "Discovery and Safety" the students have conceptualized, drawn, and modelled their own playground design for children 6 -11yrs of age. These playgrounds have been a huge success – look for these future designs to be popping up in a park near you!





The students enrolled in the Grade 9 **Integrated Technologies** course have been busy completing various projects both designing and creating Photoshop computer work, drafting, orthographic drawing, and building small cars that are powered by mouse traps and crafting acrylic holders for their iPods. The students rotate through each area experiencing different technology teachers and the specialization they offer. Look for their Egg Drop and Mouse Trap car videos on our YouTube channel!

The **Woodworking** classes have been studying the broad range of career opportunities available in the manufacturing sector and their educational requirements. They have been planning and fabricating various projects centred on furniture and household design.



Just a reminder that students wishing to receive a **Certificate of Endorsement** in Technological Education on their Ontario Graduation Diploma need to select additional Tech courses in grades 10, 11 and 12 to acquire a **minimum total of six**. This Certificate of Endorsement is a ministry document that is recognized by

college and university entrance programs.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Another semester has come and gone in Markville Science and our students were busy working on scientific thinking, investigation, and literacy skills. In addition to our in-class learning, many of our

courses enhanced curriculum with outof-school field trips and guest speakers. Grade 9s observed the sun with an Astronomer and thought about how humans would survive on Mars. Grade 10s experienced a light and optics workshop and watched an IMAX film on the human body at the Ontario Science Centre. The grade 9 and 10 science classes participated in a science fair, which allowed the students to branch out and investigate areas of personal interest. In physics courses, grade 12 students built devices to safely transport water to a target and the grade 11s used their collective knowledge to build original Rube Goldberg Machines. Not to be outdone, our grade 12 Biology students extracted DNA from fruit while some of our grade 10 students attended the "Coping with Climate Change" workshop given by W.O.W. This experience included an exciting Cap and Trade game to examine one way in which humans are trying to mitigate climate change through political and legal tools.



Next semester, eligible students are invited to participate in the University of Toronto National Biology Competition, the University of Waterloo Chem 13 News Contest, the University of Waterloo's Avogadro Chemistry Contest, as well as the OAPT and SIN contests. We will also be sending teams of students to defend last year's titles at the YRDSB Science Olympics in March!



In extracurricular news, the Science Club students were enthralled with the wonder of liquid nitrogen, joined the 3D printing club for a presentation, and assisted the Eco Club with the annual TD Shoreline clean up.

The Eco Club students saved the world a little by participating in habitat restoration at the Rouge National Urban Park this past semester and are working hard to earn platinum status through Ecoschools Certification.
