#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

#### Dear Families.

It is hard to believe that September is coming to an end! Life at Markville is again busy with students and teachers in classes, teaching, learning, and participating in a safe manner. I am so proud of our students! They arrive every morning, keeping physical distance, sanitizing their hands, and keeping each other and everyone safe.

Now that we are more familiar with what our days look like, I would like to share with you some of the similarities and differences between our virtual classrooms of last spring and today's virtual and in-person classrooms, specifically related to teaching and learning, attendance and participation, and assessment and evaluation.

- Model of Teaching and Learning
  - in the spring, students were taught and learned remotely
  - now, some students have selected to learn through the hybrid model (a combination of face-to-face and remote learning), while others have opted to attend Virtual School (fully remote learning)
- 2. Teaching and Learning Style
  - in the spring, all courses were taught mostly asynchronously (recorded lessons and/or independent work)
  - now teaching and learning in online courses is done synchronously (live teaching and learning)
- 3. Attendance and Participation
  - in the spring, students learned from home
  - now students are expected to attend every morning for 150 minutes of
  - face-to-face instruction
  - in the spring there was flexibility accessing materials and participating in class
  - throughout the day
  - now students are expected to attend live, in real time when classes are
  - scheduled

- in the spring, attendance was not taken
- now attendance is taken daily in both face-to-face and online classes
- 4. Assessment and Evaluation
  - In the spring, all marks were relative to the mark achieved on March 13 (final
  - marks could only be the same or higher than the one on March 13)
  - now assessment and evaluation are ongoing, and part of the mid-term and final
  - mark (similar to the process we had prior to the pandemic)

I hope this description may answer some of your queries regarding the learning happening in classes, both in the building and from home. If you have any questions regarding Virtual School, I encourage you to contact your children's teachers there. ## **Safety Protocols**

## **End of School Day Reminder**

When students are leaving school after their face-to-face class in the morning, students need to **leave school property or be picked up** at that time.

It is important students continue to follow the social distancing guidelines even when class is over. We understand they are excited to be with their friends, but it is still critical we continue to stress with them the importance of all social distancing protocols.

Students are reminded to continue to wear their mask and follow social distancing protocols while waiting for transportation.



### **Practices & Policies**

The purpose of **Study Hall** is to provide a space for students who do not have consistent access to broadband and Wi-Fi at home and are in school that day for their in-person morning class. During both the lunch period (for those remaining for Study Hall) and **Study Hall** itself, students will not have in-person access to their own classroom teachers.

Students who choose to stay must be working on afternoon online courses and using their own technology. Students will be supervised by a staff member to ensure safety and will focus on participants' adherence to all Public Health requirements.

#### During **Study Hall**, students must:


- ❖ Pre-book on **Appointment Manager** found on Teach Assist. Cohort A can book on September 28, 30 and Friday October 2. Cohort B can book on Tuesday, September 29 and Thursday October 1. Students can only book for the day they attend for their inperson morning class.
- ❖ Teach Assist will not allow bookings on the day of **Study Hall**. Bookings must be made at least one day in advance.
- Sign in at the Information Desk upon entering for Attendance purposes. Please note a log of students who attend **Study Hall** will be maintained for contact tracing purposes.
- ❖ Be respectful of the learning needs of all participants engaging in online classes
- ❖ Understand this is a space for individual learning and not group study
- ❖ Bring their own technology including earphones. An appropriate volume should be used while focusing on their learning, preferably microphone-enabled earphones to reduce noise during interactive activities with the online class.
- Bring their own lunch from home and maintain a clean and healthy environment; there will be no food service in the cafeteria, leaving school to buy lunch, or having food delivered.
- ❖ Understand they cannot leave the school to get lunch and then come to **Study Hall**. Students must arrive by 11:00. Students will not be allowed to enter **Study Hall** if they are late, therefore, transportation home will need to be arranged.
- Remain in the library to eat lunch to attend Study Hall (11:00 a.m. 2:50 p.m.). Students will be expected to leave the building at 2:50 p.m.
- Comply with the washroom break protocols (log in/out, be escorted by staff, use only designated washroom, etc.)
- ♦ Wear a mask at all times (except when eating lunch; practice hand hygiene before/after eating)
- ❖ Maintain a 2-meter distance
- ❖ Sit in the assigned seat in an area with students from their morning class (if any)
- Use a separate entrance and exit (1 door to enter the library; 1 door to exit the library)



## **Rotation 2 Begins September 28th**

What does this mean? Rotation 2 means our daily timetable will now shift moving Period 2 to the period 1 time slot. Additionally, the Period 1 class will now move to the period 2 virtual time slot. Let's review: Period 2 classes will now meet for face to face learning from 8:20AM to 10:50AM. Students with a scheduled period 1 will now meet virtually from 12:20PM to 1:10PM.

# COHORT LEARNING & ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

#### **Face to Face and Virtual Learners**



Our current school year is a 'new normal'. We are no longer in an emergency response mode as we were last spring. Additionally, we have a new language for this school year. We now need to use terms like 'cohorts' to refer to our classroom groupings, 'rotations' to refer to our new timetable shifts, 'face to face' or F2F learning for those times our students are here in the building with us from 8:20AM to 10:50AM, and, of course, 'virtual' learning to describe our afternoon online classes.

But some things have remained the same. Most importantly, our expectations that our students are attending classes every day and that they are engaged in the learning process every day. So, what does this look like in our 'new normal'? This means that if Cohort A is attending for 'face to face' learning, Cohort B is likewise attending but online at the same time. The teacher will still provide learning opportunities for the non-attending Cohort and the teacher will still take attendance during the set period time slot of 8:20AM to 10:50AM. It is important to note that the work assigned to the non-attending cohort is not 'extra' or 'optional'; rather it is a part of the course expectation.



We understand this is a new process and it can be confusing. We appreciate the challenges. Our goals remain the same: To ensure our students are attending all classes and engaged in the learning process.

## **COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

**Earning Volunteer Hours** 

As always, all students are expected to earn a minimum of 40 hours of community service as a part of the requirements for an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

It is important to remember there are a number of Ministry guidelines. We encourage you to visit the website to learn more about this important graduation requirement. Further, it is important to know there are a number of activities that will not be accepted or qualify for these 40 hours. For example, did you know that if a student volunteers during the regular school day those hours are ineligible? Learn more: What Do I Need to Graduate?



COVID-19 school screening You must screen for COVID-19 every day before going to school. Answer the following questions to help you decide if you should or should not go to school today. You can fill this out on behalf of a student.

Using this tool is optional and is not tracked or enforced. If your school board or public health unit has another screening process, you can use that instead. This screening cannot diagnose you. If you have medical questions, consult a health care provider or your local public health unit. Listen to the advice of your local public health unit first, as their advice overrules the advice in this screening.


## **Tech Tip**
