What is the Dual Credit program?

Dual Credit courses allow Gr. 11 and 12 high school students to take college courses that count towards both the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) or SHSM OSSD and a college certificate, diploma, or degree. Students may earn up to a maximum of four elective credits through college-delivered dual credit courses that count towards their OSSD or SHSM OSSD.

Benefits of the Dual Credit Program:

- Earn secondary school AND college credits simultaneously
- Fully funded - tuition and course materials at no cost to to students.
- Explore different pathways options

How to Register for Summer School Dual Credit:

1. Discuss this option with your Guidance Counselor. Priority will be given to Grade 12 students requiring one or two credits to graduate. Other applicants will be considered but placed on a waiting list.
2. Visit bit.ly/yrdbssummerdc to apply for your Summer School Dual Credit course
3. Look for an email sent to your GAPPS account from a YRDSB Dual Credit teacher that will confirm your enrolment in the course and provide next steps. Check email frequently.

Social Psychology: Propaganda and Persuasion [Ministry Code: HDQ4T College Code: PSY560]

Retailers, marketers, advertisers, the broadcasting industry, the military, public speakers and educators have long understood the principles of social influence. As that knowledge, along with communication technology, has increased, so has the amount of influence that screams for our attention daily. This subject will outline the major tools and theories of social influence by demonstrating how the theories actually work in real life. It will also help us see beyond persuasion strategies in order to make more objective decisions and assert greater control over our own behaviour. **SHSM sectors: Health & Wellness, Non-Profit, Sports**

What In The World Is Going On? [Ministry Code: JFE4T College Code: CUL493]

News stories confront us with people, places, issues, and crises from around the world. An understanding of background issues helps us make informed judgements. This course focuses on the main news stories of the day and looks for your critical interpretations. **SHSM Sectors: Justice, Community and Emergency Services**



Video Game [Ministry Code: GCB4T College Code: GNED226]

In this general education course, students are introduced to the historical evolution and impact of video games. This class explores the origins and evolution of games, as well as the key historical figures that have been so influential to this industry. It also explores the impact video games have had on society as they become more firmly entrenched in our lives and our culture. **SHSM Sectors: Justice, Community and Emergency Services**

Growing Up Digital [Ministry Code: JGE4T College Code: GNED190]

Youth in Canada today are the first, and second, generations to grow up in a digital world and they are transforming our culture and institutions. This course looks at the Internet and its role in shaping recent history, our identity and society. It examines the impact of digital media that empowers our youth to communicate, learn, play, shop and work differently from previous generations. It also provides analytical tools to anticipate and act on what lies ahead in the future. **SHSM Sectors: Arts & Culture, Business, ICT**

Culinary Skills Fundamentals - [Ministry Code: TUI4T College Code: ICAM101]

This course will develop the student's fundamental culinary skills through a series of professor-led demonstrations and practical labs in which students learn both practical and theoretical skill sets. In the lab students will implement a work plan and recreate dishes as demonstration. The students will be evaluated on both participation in the demonstration and kitchen lab. By successfully completing this course students will be able to develop work plans, practice culinary techniques, apply basic methods of preparation, work in a timely manner and present and taste food products, in preparation for successful employment in today's food service industry. **SHSM Sectors: Hospitality and Tourism**

Baking & Pastry Arts Skills - [Ministry Code: TUE4T College Code: CMBK102]

This course is designed to develop essential baking and pastry skills on the entry level. Through demonstration and skill development exercises the learner applies basic production principles and gains confidence working in the pastry environment. During the course students will produce a variety of pastries as well as develop the necessary skills required for the baking and pastry industry. **SHSM Sectors: Hospitality and Tourism**



Applied Psychology for Student Success - [Ministry Code: JBC4T College Code: GPSY100]

Applied Psychology for Students Success is intended to assist in the successful transition to a post-secondary environment. Through exercises, workshops, projects, and discussions, students will explore their own academic and personal challenges and strengths and develop strategies for meeting the academic expectations of post-secondary institutions.

Colour Theory & Trends - [Ministry Code: TXF4T College Code: COSM105]

This course explores the principles of colour theory as it applies to the cosmetic industry. Students will recognize colour variations in hue, value and intensity and appropriately identify colour descriptors and codes as related to colour science. Students will learn how to compile an effective, professional and creative visual presentation manual. Correct colour terminology will be used to identify colour relationships and palettes. Students will also learn the mechanics of body proportions as related to trends and styles of dressing. Students will learn how to apply fashion trends and fits appropriately for all male and female body types in order to advise clients.

Animation Art 1 - [Ministry Code: AFR4T College Code: ANMN100]

This course is designed to give students a firm foundation in the traditional principles of animation (squash and stretch timing, spacing etc.) and the processes by which professional animators would approach an animation problem. Of equal importance is the establishment of an efficient 3D animation workflow, covering topics such as animation planning, rotoscoping, inter-application pipelines and animation tools, UI and editing. **SHSM Sectors: Arts & Culture, ICT**

General Carpentry Safety [Ministry Code: TSE4T College Code: CARP100]

Health and Safety is a course designed to familiarize the student with rules and regulations practiced in the Construction industry, as outlined in the Ontario Occupational Health and Safety Act, the Workers Compensation Act, the Environmental Act and WHMIS. This course will also explore the various life safety postings and required equipment on today's busy construction site. Remediation and environmental considerations will also be presented and examined.
