Dramatic Arts



The second semester has been a busy one for Markville Drama students.

In April, Toronto Second City actor Cary West visited Markville and conducted an interactive workshop on character creation for senior drama students and SHSM arts students. Cary's comedic approach to character helped students prepare for the upcoming spring drama production.

The month of May saw the Drama Club and the Senior Drama Class join forces once again for this year's major drama production, <u>Curse of the Cobra's Kiss</u> by Craig Sodaro. Members of the talented senior drama class spent many long hours rehearsing the production and presented it to the Markville community on May 14 and 15. The show was also performed for over five hundred grade seven students as part of the Markville Grade Seven Transition Days. The comedy murder mystery contained many surprising plot twists and had several of the characters interacting with the audience.

Student written and student directed productions were also created this semester. For two days in June, the students in the Grade 9 Drama Class performed original productions based on their favourite music. Students created plays based on the ideas/themes in a song. All performances ended with a high energy lip dub version set to the music. Along with creating the pieces, students were also responsible for designing props, sets, costumes, lighting, and sound.

Senior drama students explored the origins of comedy in the Ancient Greek Comedy Unit. Their original scripts were performed in the style of the period, but were also parodies of our contemporary society.

Drama trips included students travelling to the Second City Theatre in Toronto to view the play <u>Zombie</u> <u>Boot Camp: Night of the Learning Dread</u>, which explored the issues of human rights and diversity. This show was not only made up of various scripted scenes, but also explored the use of improvisation in theatre. One of our lucky students had the opportunity to participate in the action on stage with the performers.

This year's Stratford Experience saw our students participating in a guided tour of the Stratford Festival's prop and costume warehouse. Hundreds of costumes and props were on display and students also had the opportunity to try on costumes worn by actors from past Stratford Festival productions. Following our drama picnic on the banks of the Avon River, we attended a performance of <u>Alice Through the Looking Glass</u>. Students were impressed with the use of colour, innovative staging, and energetic performances, as this story was brought to life by the talented actors of the Stratford ensemble.








Geography Department

This year the Geography Department at Markville Secondary School included Leah Percy, Mary Faizi and Sandy Wong. This year, we were happy to offer Grade 12 World Issues, Grade 12 Environment and Resource Management, Grade 11 Travel and Tourism, and Academic, Applied, Gifted and ELL Grade 9 Issues in Canadian Geography courses. All Geography students benefitted greatly this year from working in a fully integrated 1:1 environment where



The heart of the Geography program at M.S.S. remains the Grade 9 Issues in Canadian Geography course. The applied course consisted of a number of hands-on assignments, simulations and digital activities, which assisted with developing students' Geo and digital-literacy skills. The Academic and Gifted courses concentrated on debating, discussing and deconstructing various geographic issues in Canada and saw students creating digital tourism posters, presenting on environmental issues, debating and creating documentary films to create awareness about a variety of geographic world issues. Students in first semester enjoyed a field trip to Kortright Conservation Centre, where they explored local river systems and participated in a Geo-Cashing competition.

All Geography students this semester welcomed leaders from Me To We and Free The Children, who presented an assembly on global food security. Learning about this issue from people who have actually worked in the field was a highlight for many. The Grade 12 World Issues students, and a select group of Grade 9 students, also participated in a full-day leadership workshop, which included learning about a variety of global issues and creating action plans for making a difference locally and globally. All Geography students did an AMAZING job fundraising, in a friendly inter-class competition, to support our Adopt-A-Village program in Haiti. Together, we raised close to \$2000!

The Gifted program in Grade 9 Geography, under the guidance of Ms. Percy, provided rich opportunities for both digital and hands-on learning, research, discussion and exploration of geographic topics and issues. This semester, students in the Gifted program created their own case studies, made their own unit summary multi-media presentations, debated and participated in Town Hall meetings, simulations and focus groups about the Northern Gateway Pipeline project, among other activities.

Congratulations to Ms. Percy's second semester Gifted Geography students for winning the inter-class competition and raising more than \$300! We continue our commitment to using technology to improve student learning and engagement - daily plans, worksheets and digital tools are all available on our course Moodle websites. All the Geography classrooms are now equipped with LCD projectors, Apple TV, and a shared set of iPad minis. The computer lab in one of our classrooms has afforded increased opportunities for digital learning, inquiry-based and student-led research projects and the chance to create and develop assignments using digital tools.

And finally, the Geography Department's Young Activist Club (YAC) had an incredibly busy and productive year raising awareness about a wide variety of local and global issues including violence against women, global poverty, and education in Haiti among others. They organized their annual global village gift shop, held a 30-Hour Tech Famine to raise money for alternative income programs in Haiti, developed curriculum materials to be sent to an education camp in Haiti, raised awareness about gender inequality through Empowerment Week and capped off the year with the YAC movie night and raffle. ESL Department



This year, Markville's English Language Learners have been busy with a number of activities. The advanced students created websites related to their career interests while the beginning level learned all about Canadian celebrations, and another class created YouTube videos showing a variety of symbols represented in their songs.
