
The following are the answers to questions that some or many student have inquired through student council:





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

Co-op Opportunities are available in all Pathways



• Available to Grade 11 and 12 students

• Students can earn between **2 - 4 credits**

- They **DO** count towards students compulsory credits and toward the calculation of students Honour Roll Average
- Co-op credits **DO NOT** count as one of the 6 U/M credits to get into University

What a typical work day looks like...


