Our character focus for the month of March is perseverance. It is important as parents, that we remember that our children need to struggle and learn from their mistakes. While it is natural to want to protect them, it is equally essential to their growth and development that they learn how to keep trying when a task becomes difficult. As well, fostering this attitude among our students will help them to develop their growth mind-set, a belief that skills and abilities can be developed over time, as a result of hard work. Perseverance and growth mind-set go hand-in-hand, since students need to develop resiliency and recognize that they will achieve their goals if they keep trying. Here are some tips:

- When your child says, "I can't do this!" you can respond with "You can't do it, yet. Keep trying, you'll get there!"
- Don't express your perceived inability to your child (e.g., "I was never good at math."), instead phrase it in a way that shows your own determination to figure it out (e.g., "Math is difficult, but I figured it out.")
- Talk to your child about their own accomplishments or those of specific athletes, musicians, authors, etc., that they admire. For example, Michael Jordan didn't quit when he was cut from his grade 11 basketball team. He persevered and the rest is history. We can achieve these great accomplishments by practising, over and over again.

We are looking forward to another month of learning and growing.

School can be a wonderful time in the life of a child. It is a time for learning and for developing friendships. Children begin to develop lifelong habits and skills. Getting to class on time and avoiding absences are critical, if your child is to get the most out of school.

What can you, as a parent, do to help ensure your child's regular attendance?

Getting to school – every day and on time – is very important. Learning occurs daily, right from the start of class at 8:00 am (remember our announcements begin around 9:53 am). By establishing routines early on (i.e. by being punctual and responsible) children acquire positive habits about school attendance. Some other things to consider:



- If children are late arriving to school, they miss important social time with their peers before school begins.
- Students who are late often feel embarrassed or self-conscious.
- Late arrivals disrupt the routine of the classroom.
- A last-minute rush can be stressful for the child, and get him/her to school in the wrong frame of mind.
- Missing even five or ten minutes of the day can make it harder for a student to understand the material being taught.
- Frequent absenteeism leads to gaps in a child's skills and knowledge base and can cause the child to fall behind peers and decrease selfesteem.

FOSTERING RESPONSIBILITY AND INDEPENDENCE IN OUR CHILDREN

As we teach our students to be independent and responsible we need to ensure that they are included, and for older students, responsible, for the preparation of:

- The preparation of their lunches,
- pre-arranging transportation for after school,
- making sure all their homework is accounted for,
- ensuring you have looked at/signed their agenda,
- putting their musical instrument with their backpack,
- gathering all other items necessary to bring to school the next day

If they have forgotten something at home please ask yourself "will they still learn without that item". This helps create a more independent child allowing them to remember items necessary for the day ahead. If it is absolutely vital to the learning environment they are allowed to call home and ask for it.
