### Winter Weather & Recess

All students are expected to go outside for recess except in extreme conditions (e.g., cold, windy, icy conditions, etc.). Please be sure that your child is dressed appropriately for the weather: boots, snow pants, mitts, a hat and scarf are all essential items for our wintery weather. Students should also have a change of clothes (including socks and pants) in case their clothing gets wet. **Please be sure to label your child's clothes and accessories**, as our lost & found tends to overflow in the winter months.

Please note: If a child is healthy enough to come to school, then the child will be sent outside for recess. If parents feel a child should not be outside for recess, it may be best to keep him/her at home to prevent the spread of the illness.

### French Immersion Information Sessions and Registrations

Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools on January 18, 2018 at 7 p.m. Please visit YRDSB's website in January 2018 (<a href="http://www.yrdsb.ca/Programs/fi/Pages/Program-Locations.aspx">http://www.yrdsb.ca/Programs/fi/Pages/Program-Locations.aspx</a>) to find the FI program location for your elementary school location. FI registration will begin January 19, 2018. Parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2018, and wishing to enrol in the FI Program, can visit or call the school office and request an Office Index Card - short version. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to the designated FI program location to register between January 19 and February 9, 2018. This eliminates the need to provide duplicate enrollment information or to pre-register.

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. Space requirements at some schools may mean that siblings are in different schools for primary dual track French Immersion programs due to differing grade structures. Like any of our schools across the Board, changes to school boundaries, and/or the accommodation model for the French Immersion program may need to be considered when new schools open, a school experiences enrolment growth, and program changes occur. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools.



Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108

### Health Connections – Head Lice

With the winter weather here, lice are eagerly searching for warm places to stay alive. We are asking all families to be vigilant throughout the course of the year by checking your child's hair for nits (eggs) or live lice. Children with live lice must remain at home. Treatment involves not only the child's hair, but also other family members, bedding, clothing, hair accessories, etc. More information is available through <a href="Public Health">Public Health</a>. Families are reminded to continue to check for lice and nits even after treatment has been applied. Continued combing using a specialized comb for the removal of nits is the only way to prevent a recurrence or the spread of lice.



# BUS CANCELLATIONS DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER

### **SCHOOLS REMAIN OPEN**

During an Inclement Weather Day, the school is open and alternate programming may be provided depending on the number of students in attendance on this day.

### PIZZA/PITA LUNCH & KIDS' KITCHEN

If Pizza or Pita Lunches are scheduled on an Inclement Weather Day they will be *cancelled and rescheduled*.

All Kids' Kitchen orders will be delivered, unless cancelled by phone **before 8:00AM** on the day of delivery.

### **DROP OFF/PICK UP**

Students who come to school on a Snow Day may be dropped off and picked up through the parking lot loop. Pick up will begin at 2:00 pm. Please pick up your child by 2:20 pm.

### **School Bus Cancellation Notice**

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be region-wide meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not
  operate.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to
  and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not
  operate in the afternoon. Therefore, students transported to school by parents will require the same
  transportation home.

### **OHIP+**

Beginning January 1, 2018, the province will provide free prescription drug coverage for children and youth aged 24 and under, regardless of family income.

Under OHIP+, over four million Ontario children and youth will have access to over 4,400 medications and other drug products. This will help many families access medications their children need to stay healthy at no cost – no co-payment or annual deductible.

Enrollment in OHIP+ will be automatic, based on age. There are no upfront costs for eligible medications. Those who are eligible for OHIP+ will only need their health card number and a valid prescription from their doctor or nurse practitioner when they visit their pharmacist.

# Celebrating Our Diversity January's Holidays and Observances

January 1 – <b>Temple Day</b> has become a day for Canadian Buddhists to attend a special service in the local temple.	January 6 – <b>Epiphany</b> (Western Calendar) is the 12 <sup>th</sup> day of Christmas and the end of the Christmas season. It comes from a Greek word referring to the baptism of Jesus and the arrival in Bethlehem of the Three Wise Men who came to worship Jesus. The Armenian Orthodox Church celebrates the nativity of Jesus on this day.  January 7 – <b>Christmas</b> (Eastern Calendar) Some Orthodox churches celebrate the birth of Jesus on this day.  The Julian (Eastern) calendar is currently 13 days behind the Gregorian (Western) calendar. In York Region, this is often referred to as "Ukrainian Christmas".  January 19 – <b>Epiphany</b> (Eastern Calendar) The Eastern Church associates the date with the baptism of Jesus by John and the miracle of Cana in which Jesus turned water into wine. This day is also known as Theophany in Orthodox churches.

January 14 – Makar Sankranti, is also known as Lohri, Thai Pongal and Til Sankranti. It marks the winter solstice and is primarily a rice harvest festival.  January 22 - Vasant Panchami is particularly celebrated in Northern India. This festival marks the advent of spring. Also known as Shri Panchami, it is a celebration commonly associated with Shri or Lakshmi (Goddess of Wealth). It is also commonly linked with the Goddess of Learning, Saraswati.	January 5 – Birthday of Guru Gobind Singh Ji. The tenth guru (1666-1708 C.E.) was the final master who created the Sikh Brotherhood, the Khalsa.  January 13 – Maghi commemorates the forgiveness shown by Guru Gobind Singh to forty deserters who returned to fight the Mughal army and sacrificed their lives under the leadership of a brave Khalsa woman named Maee Bhaago.
