Naw Ruz (New Year)

Usually occurs on March 21st. This is the first day of the Zoroastrian and Persian year. Naw Ruz is also observed/ celebrated by many other faith and cultural groups around the world.

Late? Please arrive at school 5 minutes earlier.



We continue to have large numbers of late students in the front hall every morning. If each of these late students would leave 5 to 10 minutes earlier this would reduce our lates by nearly 90 % each morning. A child

is late to school if they are not in their classrooms by 8 a.m. Students who are still in the halls at 8:05 a.m. are late to school! Therefore, we are asking that parents help us make sure our students arrive at school by 7:50 am. If students are at school before the bell rings they will then be able to line up quickly at the rear of the school and come inside with their peers so that they are ready to start the instructional day when the bell rings at 8:00 am. This avoids late students who can be disruptive to other classes, their class and themselves. The school day officially starts at 8:00 a.m. So, we are looking for your support in getting your child(ren) out the door 5 to 10 minutes earlier and making sure we set them up for a successful day. If your child(ren) are late for school, please instruct them to go to the office for a Late Slip. Thank you!

March Holidays and Observances

BAHA'I FAITH	BUDDHISM
March 2 - 20 The 19-Day Fast is observed every year from March 2 until March 20. During this time those who are physically able, abstain from food and drink from sun- rise until sunset each day. March 21 -Naw Ruz (Baha'i New Year). Baha'is cel- ebrate New Year on the first day of spring. Work and academic studies are suspended on this day. This date is also celebrated as a cultural event or faith day by many faith groups throughout the world .	March 20 - Spring Ohigon is a special time to listen to the teaching of the Buddha and to meditate on the perfection of enlightenment. This day is of particular importance for Jodo Shinshu Buddhists.
CHRISTIANITY	HINDUISM
 March 6 - Ash Wednesday (Western Calendar) is the beginning of Lent, the forty day period (excluding Sundays) of prayer, repentance and self-denial that pre- cedes Easter. It is a reminder of the days Jesus spent alone in the wilderness. March 11- First day of Lent (Eastern Calendar), which is the great fast, is the last six weeks of a ten week period before Easter. This day is also known as Clean Monday. Some Eastern Churches may start Lent a week before on March 4. 	 March 4- Mahashivaratri (or Shivaratri, "Great Shiva Night") is a special night of prayer. Devotees sing the praises of Shiva, one of the major Hindu deities. March 21-Holi is a colourful spring festival observed widely in Hindu communities around the world. The myths, customs and rituals associated with Holi vary considerably from place to place.
JUDAISM	SIKHISM
March 21- Purim celebrates the victory over an oppressive ruler by Queen Esther and her Uncle Mordecai.	March 14 - Sikh New Year's Day is the first day of the new Nanakshahi solar calendar. This is year 550 of the new era.
ZOROASTRIANISM	ZOROASTRIANISM
March 17-Ghambar Hamaspathmaedem celebrates the creation of human beings. March 21-Naw Ruz (New Year's Day) in Fasli calen- dars. This is the first day of the Zoroastrian and Persian year. It is a time of religious observance preceded by ten days of remembrance of the dead. It symbolizes the re- newal of the world after winter. Irrespective of their reli- gion, many Iranians celebrate this day. Naw Ruz is also observed/celebrated by many other faith and cultural groups around the world. This celebration may also fall on March 20 based on the time of sunrise	March 28-Birthday of Prophet Zarathustra, the founder of the Zoroastrian faith.
