
Le caractère compte! Character matters!

Eco-Litterless Schools/Waste-Free and Boomerang Lunch

In keeping with our commitment to teach our students about the importance of protecting our environment we have adopted a waste-free boomerang lunch initiative. A litterless/waste-free lunch contains no throwaway packaging or food leftovers. Lunches are packed in servings that will be completely eaten. You can help by ensuring that all food and drinks are packed in reusable containers in a reusable lunch bag or box. With this type of lunch, food items can be bought in larger quantities. The packaging can be left at home for reuse or recycling. Waste-free lunches are not only a wise environmental choice; they are less expensive as well. With Boomerang Lunch programs, whatever comes to school for lunch and snacks and is not consumed, will go back home.

Let's all work together to be an Eco-Friendly School.

PLEASE REPORT TO THE OFFICE

The Board has a Visitor's Policy that requires ALL visitors to report to the office upon entering a school. Parents must also report to the office before meeting or **Visitors** picking up Welcome: their children in order to sign them out. We request that parents not go directly to the classroom. Please meet your child/ren in the front foyer or at the main office.

Allergies



There are students in our school who have life-threatening allergies to nuts and/or other products which can cause an anaphylactic reaction. Anaphylaxis is an allergic reaction that is so severe that it can cause death. The throat closes and the child cannot breathe. This allergic condition differs from any other allergic reactions in that it is life-threatening. Even contact with trace amounts of the nut

allergen (through ingestion or touch) can trigger this type of reaction. The ONLY way to ensure a safe environment is to avoid bringing nut and nut products onto the school premises. To do this, we need everyone's cooperation. Isolating students with anaphylaxis from the rest of the student population during lunch time does not solve the concern because upon their return to class a reaction is possible. For example, since children tend to play in such close proximity to each other, contact from someone's sticky peanut butter covered fingers is possible. As well, peanut butter or crumbs from cookies or chocolate bars, etc., can be left on rugs, desks, chairs, books or other school equipment, no matter how hard we try to clean these areas. When the child returns to class, a severe reaction is possible.

The child who suffers an anaphylactic reaction must be administered an EpiPen® and transferred immediately to the local hospital. If the ambulance is delayed, a second EpiPen® must be administered. Avoidance is the key in preventing the occurrence of these reactions.

It is for this reason that we ask for your co-operation in refraining from sending peanut products and by-products to school. We hope that you will be able to support us in this regard to reduce the risk factor.

Please check the ingredients label on any food you may send with your child for lunch or snack. Ensure that peanuts/tree nuts are not listed in the ingredients. Also ensure that there is no warning of "may contain traces of peanuts/treenuts" or "manufactured in a facility that handles peanuts/tree nuts". The warning may vary between manufacturers but they will identify if there is a risk that the food product contains nuts. Examples of tree nuts are almonds, pecans, walnuts, cashews, etc. If there is no warning on the ingredients label and no peanut/tree nuts listed, then you may send the food item for your child.

We respectfully ask that children wash their hands thoroughly before arriving to school to ensure that he/she is not bringing any trace amounts of the allergen to the classroom and common areas such as library, playground and washrooms.

Your support in this important matter is deeply appreciated and critical to ensure the safety of all of our students.

Together we can ensure a safe environment for all.

Students' health and medical info

If your child needs to take medication during school hours, we ask that you obtain the necessary forms from the school office. For legal and safety reasons, written permission is required for ALL medication including inhalers, Aspirin, Tylenol, Epi-pens etc. Medication must be kept secure in the office (except



for Epi-pens, where one will remain in the office and one is to be with the child at all times). Please ensure that all medication is brought directly to the office.

Student Transportation



The majority of students at Michaëlle Jean P.S. arrive to school via school bus. It is our priority to ensure the safe arrival of all students. You can support them by

- 1. Ensuring that your child knows his/her bus route number and the name of the stop where he/she boards and gets off the bus
- 2. Ensuring that your child arrives at the bus stop on time in the morning
- 3. Talking to your child about safety on the bus, including staying seated, no throwing objects out of the window or in the bus, no loud conversations.
- 4. Ensuring that if your child will not be riding the bus on a particular day or if your plans for pick-up change, your child's teacher is informed in writing that day and the office in informed

Did you know that students' busing eligibility changes throughout their school career? Your son/daughter's eligibility to ride the school bus may change according to their grade and distance from home to school. Below are the provisions for eligibility identified in the Board's Transportation Policy #680:

• All YRDSB students in Grades JK-3 who live within 1.2 km of their school are not eligible for transportation • All YRDSB students in Grades 4-8 who live within 1.6 km of their school are not eligible for transportation • All YRDSB students in Grades 9-12 who live within a transit served area are not eligible for transportation.

Scent Sensitivities

Some children and adults also suffer from allergies to scents and perfumes. When exposed to such scents, it can become difficult for these people to breath easily. We ask that all children and adults entering the school refrain from wearing or using scented products (e.g., hand sanitizers, body sprays and perfumes, etc.) when coming to the school. Although the scent may not be strong for you, it can be very strong to those with sensitivities.

We appreciate your understanding.

As we are an Eco-Friendly school, once again this year we will be sending as much correspondence home electronically as we possibly can. If you have not already provided us with your email address(es), or if you wish to remove/update your existing email address(es), please forward a reply via email to michaelle.jean.ps@yrdsb.ca indicating your child/ren's name as well as the new email addresses you would like us to keep on file.

Freedom of information and protection of privacy

Activities throughout the school year may require the use of student names, age, grade, etc. These would be used when displaying student work, during student performances or recognizing student achievements, at the school and board level. We recognize that these practices may be contrary to the wishes of some parents. In these instances, parents are welcome to discuss any restrictions they require with the school Principal.

It is the policy of the York Region School Board to report on the safe arrival of our stu-



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Head lice

Head lice are tiny insects that live on the scalp, where they lay eggs. Head lice do not spread disease. It's not your fault if you or your child has head lice.

Having head lice does not mean you are not clean.

What do head lice look like?

Lice have 3 stages – the egg (nit), the nymph and the adult.

- Nits are whitish-grey, tan or yellow ovals, about the size of a grain of sand. They stick to the hair close to the scalp and can look like dandruff. Nits hatch into nymphs in 9 to 10 days.
- Nymphs are baby lice. They look like adult lice but smaller.

Adult lice are hard to see since they are about the size of a sesame seed. Adult lice can live for up to 30 days on a person's head, but they die within 2 days away from the

scalp.

How do they spread?

Head lice spread easily, especially where people are in close contact. They are very common among school-aged children or children in child care.

- Head lice spread through direct hair-to-hair contact or indirectly by sharing hats, combs, hairbrushes and headphones.
- Head lice don't fly or hop, but crawl very quickly.

The head lice that live on people are different from the kind that live on cats or dogs. People cannot get head lice from animals.

How do you know you have head lice?

One of the first signs of head lice is an itchy scalp, but it's possible to have head lice without any symptoms. Most itchy scalps are not from head lice. If your child has an itchy scalp or was exposed to head lice, check his hair right away. Check again once a week for 2 weeks in case you missed them.

How do I check for head lice?

Look carefully through the hair for live lice and nits. If you only find nits, your child may not have head lice. Usually children have no more than 10 to 20 live lice.

- Because lice are so small, good lighting is important. A magnifying glass may help.
- Head lice move fast and are hard to see. You may just see movement rather than the actual lice. Lice are usually found very close to the scalp, at the bottom of the neck and behind the ears.

To look for nits, part hair in small sections, moving from one side of the head to the other. Look close to the scalp. If you only find nits and no lice, check again every day for 1 week to make sure that you did not miss any live lice.

How can I treat head lice?

Do not treat anyone with a head lice product unless you find live lice in their hair. If someone in the house has lice, check all family members.

Head lice can be treated in a variety of ways: Insecticides

Insecticides are chemicals that kill insects. In Canada, 2 insecticides are approved to treat head lice:

Head lice Cont'd

• permethrin (Nix creme rinse or Kwellada-P creme rinse)

Pyrethrin and permethrin are safe when used on humans over two months old. You do not need a prescription. Over time, head lice have become resistant to some of the chemicals used to kill them. So some products may be less effective

How to apply insecticides:

- Follow package directions carefully.
- Don't leave the shampoo or rinse in the hair longer than directed.
- Rinse hair with cool water after the treatment. It's best to rinse over a sink, not in the bath or shower, so that other body parts don't come in contact with the product.
- Repeat the treatment after 7 to 10 days, in case new lice hatched from the nits.

These treatments can sometimes make the scalp itchy or can leave a mild burning feeling. If your child is scratching after treatment, it does not necessarily mean the lice are back.

Non-insecticides

• Isopropyl myristate/cyclomethicone (Resultz) is approved for use in Canada, but it should only be used in children 4 years of age and older. It dehydrates the lice and they die. Apply to a dry scalp and rinse with warm water after 10 minutes. Repeat after 1 week.

Silicone oil dimeticone (NYDA) is effective against live lice, nymphs and nits. It is **not recommended for children under 2 years old**. A second treatment is recommended after 8 to 10 days.

Benzyl alcohol lotion 5% (Ulesfia) is effective against live lice but a second treatment is recommended after 9 days.

These products are usually more expensive than insecticides. It is not known for sure whether they work better.

Other treatments

• Some people suggest home remedies such as mayonnaise, petroleum jelly, olive oil, vinegar or margarine. Although these products may make it hard for lice to breathe, they probably won't kill them. There is little evidence that wet combing (removing lice by combing wet hair with a fine-tooth comb) works all on its own.

There is no evidence that products such as tea tree oil or aromatherapy work to treat head lice.

Ivermectin is a drug that can be taken by mouth or used as a cream, but it is not approved for use in Canada.

Never use gasoline or kerosene. These products can be extremely dangerous.

Do I need to disinfect the house if someone has head lice?

Because head lice don't live long off the scalp, there is no need for extra cleaning.

However, you do need to get rid of lice or nits from items that touch the head such as hats, pillowcases, combs and brushes:

Wash items in hot water and dry them in a hot dryer for at least 15 min; or store the items in an airtight plastic bag for 2 weeks. Use a Ziploc-type bag that is airtight. A regular shopping bag often has little holes.

Should children with head lice stay home from school?

Children with head lice should be treated and then attend school or child care as usual. 'No-nit' policies that keep children with head lice or nits after treatment away from school are not necessary because:

Head lice are common among young children. Many days of school would be missed if children had to stay home. People are often wrong when they think a child has head lice. It would be unfortunate to see children missing school when they don't really have lice.

• Making children stay at home will not get rid of head lice. Often, other children in the class have lice but don't have any symptoms. Without treatment, they will continue to spread lice.

Volunteering at Michaëlle Jean Public School



Volunteers are a big part of our success at Michaëlle Jean P.S. We value the time that you are able to give us to help support student learning.

All volunteers are required to comply with the YRDSB Policy and Procedure #280 Volunteers in Our Schools and are required to:

*submit a Police Vulnerable Sector Check (PVSC) completed within the last six months (requirement for new volunteers) OR sign the Annual Offence Declaration (returning volunteers who have a PVSC on file at MJPS)

*sign a Confidentiality Agreement

The PVSC would be necessary for volunteer tasks such as accompanying students on class field trips and athletic events, working one-on-one with students to support reading, for example, transporting students to events, and engaging in parent-led clubs where no school staff is present.

Exceptions to this guideline may be made at the Principal's discretion where:

the volunteer is always in the presence of school staff;

the volunteer is **never** alone with students and is not in a position of trust or responsibility the volunteer does not access student washrooms or change rooms

Volunteers, on the other hand, who offer to distribute hot lunches, to help with School Council fundraising initiatives or to work under the direction of a school staff member (Library helper, classroom support tasks), would be asked only to complete an Annual Offence Declaration form and Confidentiality Agreement.

If you wish to volunteer at the school, and intend to obtain a PVSC, you must first request a letter from the school that states that the position is a "volunteer non-paid position". You may speak directly with our office staff to obtain this letter.
