Guidance News

Course Selection and the Individual Pathways Plan

Students at Milliken Mills High School will choose their courses online for the 2015/16 school year using Career Cruising, an interactive guidance and pathways planning website designed to help students develop an Individual Pathways Plan (IPP).

Students can access the Career Cruising website at www.careercruising.com (username is yorkregion and password is 50900). Once on this site, students will need to log in to the "My IPP" feature using their YRDSB district assigned Career Cruising account. The username for students is YORK-123456789, where 123456789 is the student's 9 digit ID number. When logging in for the first time, the password will be the student's birth date using the format mmddyyyy. The system will then prompt the student to create a new password.

The Individual Pathways Plan is a web-based career exploration and education planning tool. It allows students to assess their interests and skills, explore careers, investigate education options and develop a career plan. The IPP is a Ministry requirement and it is expected that students will log on and complete their grade level activities. The activities within the IPP are intended to help your child map out his/her initial post-secondary destination (i.e., apprenticeship, college, university, workplace or community living) and plan ahead for course selection.



Students must submit their online course selection and Course Request Sign Off Sheets, as well as complete their Individual Pathways Plan, no later than Monday, February 23, 2015.

Release of Grades to Universities and Colleges

There will be a release of grades and other identifying information (name, date of birth, home address, telephone number, OEN, student number) for all eligible students in Grade 12 on the dates listed below using secure transmission technology to the Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) and the Ontario College Application Service (OCAS). These data transmissions will be done in support of all upcoming post-secondary applications to college and university.

Grade 12 students who have applied to College and/or University are reminded to check their marks online on the OCAS and OUAC websites. Students should check their marks for accuracy and report any errors to their Guidance Counsellor ASAP.

Marks for Continuing Education Courses

Graduating students who have successfully completed an Independent Learning course (ILC), or a night school course taken with a Board of Education other than the YRDSB, must submit an original copy of their final report card to Mrs. Morrison in the Guidance Office. Students who have completed a course through private school are responsible for ensuring that a final report card is mailed directly from the institution to the Milliken Mills High School Guidance Department. It is important that this documentation is received as soon as possible so that final grade(s) for completed course(s) can be entered onto student transcripts in time for the mark transfer to OCAS and OUAC next week.

Additional Admission Criteria for College/University

Both university and college-bound students are reminded to check whether the program(s) that they have applied to have additional admission criteria such as tests, portfolios, interviews or auditions. Students need to make sure that they meet the deadlines for any additional admission criteria, including due dates for supplementary application forms.

Community Involvement Activities

Students are reminded that their volunteer activities must be approved by the Guidance Department before they begin volunteering. Approved volunteer activities are covered by the Board's insurance plan for liability losses only if the Notification and Completion of Community Involvement Activities Form is properly completed and submitted to Guidance. This form can be downloaded at <u>www.yrdsb.ca</u> or picked up from the Guidance Office.

Grade 12 potential graduates are reminded that completing 40 hours of community involvement activities is a diploma requirement that must be met in order to graduate. Students who need assistance in finding eligible community involvement opportunities should check the bulletin board in the atrium for new postings and/or speak with their guidance counsellor. The deadline to submit completed community involvement hours to the Guidance Office is Tuesday, June 2, 2015.

Take The Biodiversity Challenge - 2015 Envirothon

Students in Milliken's T.E.A.M. Program in the Personalized Alternative Education Department (PAE), have registered to represent the school in the **York Region Envirothon Biodiversity Challenge** to be held in April. Students will get outside and explore nature, hands-on in two teams of five. **T.E.A.M.** students will take part in an interactive, curriculum-based event, testing both their theoretical and applied learning about forests, soils, wildlife, aquatic ecosystems and urban and community forestry. They will be competing to earn a chance to represent Milliken and York Region at the Ontario Envirothon Championship in May, 2015. In order to prepare for this challenge, T.E.A.M. students have enrolled in a **Dual Credit**, (a grade 12 high school credit as well as an Ontario College credit wrapped into one) which will focus predominantly on natural resources through the lenses of identification and sustainability. Good luck to T.E.A.M. students and staff as they take on this worthy challenge!

Student Services Department

The Student Services Department has been actively working to support our students' transition to post-secondary programs. We visited George Brown College Waterfront Campus and The Apprenticeship Centre's (General Carpentry, Floor Covering installers, and Drywall Finishers) during first semester. Students had an opportunity to tour these facilities and discover more about programs and pathways available to them. We also attended a seminar about supports available for students with learning disabilities in post-secondary programs. Our students were inspired by these experiences.

During semester 2, we are planning a trip to another college or university. We are also inviting speakers to come into our school from various professions to discuss their educational backgrounds, career paths and daily lives with our students. The Student Services Department invites all our students to join us for these opportunities.



In other news, our community class students recently had an opportunity to attend a SNAP Basketball event. They had time to socialize and play basketball with community class students from other schools. A good time was had by all. Our students are looking forward to future Special Olympics and SNAP sporting events this semester.

Literacy at Milliken Mills School High

In Grade 10, students take the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, (OSSLT) which measures if they are meeting the minimum standard for literacy across all subjects up to the end of Grade 9. Our students completed a practice booklet in November and had the opportunity to participate in the After School Literacy course in first semester. We are continuing to offer a great deal of support for our students in preparation of the test which will be written on March 26th, 2015. There will be an After School Literacy course running on Mondays and Thursdays from February 9th to March 12th. There is no charge for this course and it is an excellent opportunity for students to practice their literacy skills. Additionally, students can sign up for extra practice sessions during lunch throughout February and March.

Milliken Mills High School is proud to be one of the schools taking part in the OSSLT field test on February 25th, 2015. Students from across the province will be writing an OSSLT test in both booklet form and online. This is a great opportunity for our students to practice the test prior to writing the full test on March 26th. Students are also encouraged to visit www.EQAO.com for additional practice and support.

After a successful winter concert and well-deserved break for exams, the music department is again gearing up for second semester. Despite a change of dates to the winter concert, the ensembles performed extremely well. Congratulations to all of our Milliken musicians.
