# MMHS T.E.A.M. Program Recognized for "Green Leadership"

The T.E.A.M. Program at Milliken Mills High School has achieved the Green High Schools Award from ECO Canada for their leadership and outstanding effort in bringing environmental education and career awareness to their community with respect to the environment in Markham. This award highlights the important role this group has played in connecting students' environmental learning opportunities to higher education and inspiring the next generation of young environmental professionals. The certificate received recognizes T.E.A.M.'s unique blending of the SHSM and Dual Credit programs in the environment with practical fieldwork. Results have been both meaningful and measurable. T.E.A.M. and their long-time partners, Ontario Streams, led the way with an Adopt-A-Stream Program on Robinson Creek in Markham where activities were undertaken to improve watershed, stream and habitat quality. Students focused on stream mapping, benthic studies, electro-fishing, seine netting, garbage clean-ups, bio-engineering, tree and shrub planting and the construction of a cabled log jam to help control erosion.

The award also considered work done at MMHS. Here T.E.A.M. led in the research, development and implementation of an organic vegetable garden focusing on heritage seeds. As well, students in T.E.A.M. partnered with the Green Inc. Club and guided students from other PAE programs as well as keen students from the D.D. class through an engaging planting process to help create the garden. The harvest was shared in a celebratory salad.

# R.I.D.E. Kick-off & Red Ribbon Campaign Kick-off

On Wednesday, November 27<sup>th</sup>, 2013, Milliken Mills H.S. is excited to be selected as the site to launch the Annual R.I.D.E. Kick-off & Red Ribbon Campaign Kick-off events. Our courses are offered in grades 9-12 and are a popular option for students pursuing various pathways. Students in the grade 9 and 10 classes enjoyed putting their decorative culinary skills to work when they created festive cupcakes to celebrate Halloween.

Our grade 11 fashion class is enthusiastically working on creating pieces for the arts showcase which will take place later in the year. This is the first time we will be involved in the event and the students are excited to highlight their work.

## **Special Education**

Our students participate in activities and programs designed to broaden their life experience and prepare them for the workplace, vocational college, college, university or apprenticeship programs. For some of our students work experience with local employers and within the school, coupled with transit training, helps prepare them to function more independently in the community. Field trips and athletic events such as SNAP and Special Olympics develop physical and social skills, and visits to Colleges and Universities help familiarize our students with the actual campus, programs offered, and services they may wish to access after graduating high school.

Another school year has started and BTS (Behind the Scenes) the Technology Department's film and photography club has begun its 3<sup>rd</sup> year at Milliken. We have just completed a successful Spirit Week photobooth with some great shots of student costumes on Halloween. ## History

The History Department has had a busy but exciting couple of months. On Monday, November 11, the History Department worked with the Music Department to organize the Remembrance Day Observance. Together, with the school, we took some time to remember our brave soldiers of the past and present.

Recently, our grade 11 Law students gained a better understanding of our criminal justice system by participating in a re-enactment of a C.S.I scenario and will soon be taking part in a mock trial.

Our grade 10 students have also been actively involved in the learning of history. Each student adopted a character as we studied the 1920's and 1930's. Throughout the unit they used the historical perspective of the character they adopted to examine the events of the time period. The students enjoyed the authentic learning experience.

Finally, we are planning a trip to the Royal Ontario Museum for our grade 12 History students in the West & the World course and the grade 11 students from World History to the 16th Century. Students will be participating in lessons conducted by the teachers of the Museum and will also have an opportunity to walk through the museum exhibits. This is a great opportunity for students to gain hands-on experience working with artifacts and making connections to their classroom learning.

# **Community Involvement** Hours

As part of the diploma requirements, students must complete a minimum of 40 hours of community involvement activities during their secondary school years. Community involvement is intended to encourage students to develop an understanding of civic responsibility and the role they can play in supporting and strengthening their communities.

Community involvement activities may be completed at any time before graduation, beginning in the summer following grade 8. Students under the age of 18 must plan and select their community involvement activities from the list of approved activities in consultation with their parents/ guardians.

Please note that effective May 1, 2012 changes have been made to both eligible and ineligible community involvement activities, and to the forms associated with these activities. Information regarding these changes is available on the Board's website at www.yrdsb.edu.on.ca/ communityinvolvement. Specifically, students are now covered by the Board's insurance plan for liability losses arising from the completion of 40 hours of community involvement activities only if the new Notification and Completion of Community Involvement Activities Form, which can be downloaded online or obtained from the Guidance Office, is completed and approved by the school prior to the commencement of the volunteer activity.

Grade 12 potential graduates should plan to have their 40 hours of community involvement activities completed, and the form submitted for processing, no later than Tuesday, June 3, 2014.

# **Guidance News**

#### **Post-secondary Information**

Students who are planning to apply to university this year will be able to pick up their confidential PIN Access Letter from the Guidance Office in late November. This letter will contain the school number, student number and personal identification number (PIN) they will need to log on to the university online application. Students should listen for morning announcements informing them when the PINs have arrived, and may come to Guidance during their lunch, spare or before/after school to pick them up. Note - Students will be required to bring ID with them and to keep their PIN in a secure location.

#### Full Disclosure Deadline

According to the Full Disclosure Policy, the last day for a student to drop a semester one grade II or I2 course so that it does not appear on their transcript is **Friday, November 22, 2013**. All grade 11 and 12 courses dropped after this date will appear on the student's transcript with the mark that they achieved at the time the course was dropped. If a grade 12 student wishes to drop a semester one course they should book an appointment with their guidance counsellor as soon as possible to ensure that the course is dropped before this deadline. Students are reminded that they must have 24 credits in order to have a spare and must maintain three courses on their schedule.

# Release of Grades to Universities and Colleges

There will be a release of grades and other identifying information (name, date of birth, home address, telephone number, OEN, student number) for all eligible students in Grade 12 on the dates listed below using secure transmission technology to the Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) and the Ontario College Application Service (OCAS). These data transmissions will be done in support of all upcoming applications to college and university. If you would like more information about the upcoming release of grades, please feel free to contact your child's guidance counsellor.

# School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled from time to time due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Since some busing schedules begin by 7:00 a.m., cancellation decisions must be made by 6:00 a.m. to allow time to communicate this message to bus drivers. Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.

School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology. Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same transportation home.
