



Land Acknowledgement

We affirm that we are all treaty people and acknowledge that the York Region District School Board is located on the lands of two treaties. 





School Parking Lot





Please note the stop signs and "no parking" signs within our parking lot.

Bus loop is for buses and taxis only. The parking spaces in front of the daycare are only for daycare families.

Large parking lot for both staff and student vehicles. To avoid congestion in the morning and after school, vehicles are not permitted to idle in the lanes between the parked cars. If there isn't a parking spot, please drop off/pick up your child off school property. Alternate areas to drop off/pick up students are Pickering Crescent, the Plaza, or Magna Centre.

Online learning graduation requirement

Beginning with students that entered Grade 9 in the 2020-21 school year, students must earn at least two online learning credits to get their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

The online learning graduation requirement also applies to adult learners that will be entering the Ontario secondary school system starting in 2023-24 school year.

What do you need to graduate from high school?

18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in science
- 1 credit in Canadian history
- 1 credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in the arts
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

In addition, students must complete:

- 12 optional credits[†]
- 40 hours of community involvement activities
- / the provincial literacy requirement

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1:

- English or French as a second language**
- a Native language
- a classical or international language
- social sciences and the humanities
- Canadian and world studies
- guidance and career education
- cooperative education***

Group 2:

- health and physical education
- the arts
- business studies
- French as a second language**
- · cooperative education***

Group 3:

- science (Grade 11 or 12)
- technological education
- French as a second language**
- computer studies
- cooperative education***
- * A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.
- ** In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.
- *** A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.
- [†] The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

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Community Involvement Hours



40 hours of community involvement activities = OSSD Requirement

- must be in service of the community or individuals in the community who are not able to perform the activity for themselves
- cannot be in service of a for-profit-business performing duties that would otherwise be performed by employees
- Students may start earning hours after their grade 8 graduation Hours need pre-approval by Guidance before the student begins!

Homeroom: Your school will have a specific time for HR and announcements. Periods: Classes are 75 minutes in length. The start time for each period is determined by your school.

Course code and section: You will have 4 courses each semester from grades 9-11. A spare may be granted in Grade 12.

Name of teacher and classroom

Lunch: Your lunch period will be determined by your school's schedule. Lunch time, length and format will vary between schools.

After-school programming: Some courses, such as band or choir, can be scheduled after the regular school day.

STUDENT COUNCIL




Student Council is a committee of students who are key organizers of major events within the school. There are 20+ students from all grades, led by a President and Vice-President who earn their placement through a voting process in May.

COVID-19 Protocols - Daily Screening

On a daily basis, students and their parents are responsible to review and adhere to the COVID-19 include:

Fever

New or Worsening Cough

Shortness of Breath

Sore Throat or Difficulty Swallowing

Altered Taste or Smell

Nausea, Vomiting, Diarrhea, Abdominal Pain

Runny Nose, Nasal Congestion

If your child is feeling unwell or if your child has any of the symptoms of COVID-19, please keep your child at home, inform the school of your child's absence and we suggest testing FOr COVID-19.

The use of a mask is not an acceptable measure to attend or remain at school for those who are symptomatic.

If your child is choosing to wear a mask:

Students are expected to provide their own face covering;

Masks are not to be shared;

Masks can be non-medical or cloth.

Hand Washing Sanitizing

Students are to wash hands using soap and water or use hand sanitizer immediately before:

- leaving home,
- leaving the classroom,
- eating, touching one's face
- leaving school.

Students are to wash hands or use hand sanitizer immediately after:

- arriving at school/entering the classroom,
- finishing lunch,
- touching shared objects,
- using the bathroom,
- coughing, sneezing, and blowing one's nose,
- arriving at home.

A hand sanitizing station will be placed in the front lobby of the school and in classrooms. It is recommended that students not bring their own hand sanitizer to school for issues of quality, fragrance and management of potential hazards.

TIPS

- Encourage your teen to become independent.
- **Communicate** frequently with your teen about school, social events, and peers.
- Friends will be new; get to know them.
- **Bullying** can be prevented. Watch for symptoms that your teen may be a victim of bullying. Be aware of signs such as withdrawal, a drop in grades, physical signs, or needing extra money or supplies.
