Health & Safety

It's your head – use it!

Head injuries are the leading cause of serious injury and death to kids on wheels. Wearing a properly fitted, certified helmet can reduce the risk of serious head injury by 85 per cent. Children and youth under 18 years of age are required by law to wear a helmet when bicycling. Helmets must fit properly to protect your child in the event of a crash.

Remember the 2V1 Shake, Shake, Shake rule:

- **2:** The helmet should cover the top of your child's head and sit two finger widths above his or her eyebrows. A helmet that is too big will not provide proper protection
- V: Adjust the side straps so they form a V-shape under your child's ears
- 1: Only one finger should fit between your child's chin and the fastened straps
- Shake, Shake, Shake: Have your child shake his or her head up and down and side to side to make sure the helmet is snug

Bus Loop & Kiss and Ride Safety

In an effort to make **kiss and ride** drop-off and pick-up as orderly and safe as possible we ask that drivers respect the following guidelines:

- 1. Have your child(ren) enter and exit the vehicle from the **curb side of the loop** (exit from the **RIGHT** side of the vehicle **ONLY**).
- 2. The Kiss & Ride area is a **single lane** only. Cars should enter single file and not drive past vehicles ahead.
- 3. Never leave your car parked or unattended in the Kiss & Ride.

In addition, our **school bus loop** at the front of the school is off limits to any cars, especially between the times of:

8:15 – 8:45 AM 3:00 – 3:30 PM

We need to keep the bus loop clear of any cars at the above times so that buses can safely drop off/pick up students. As this is also our fire route, cars must not stop or park in the bus loop during the day.

We realize that drop-off and pick-up can be challenging and therefore we would like to provide some alternative transportation suggestions:

- ✓ Choose an active means to get to school such as walk or bike.
- ✓ Carpool. Arrange to help each other out with pick-up and drop-off.
- ✓ Discuss pick-up and drop-off routines with your children and be flexible with solutions.
- \checkmark Park a block away and walk the last block to school with your child(ren).
