School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements. Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast. Please note the following:

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.

2020-2021 Inclement Weather Procedures during the Pandemic

The 2020-2021 school year, the following Inclement Weather Days Procedures for Elementary will come into effect. This year, due to the COVID-19 global pandemic, our Inclement Weather Day Procedure has been adjusted based on direction from York Region Public Health.

All elementary schools will be closed to students.

Schools will remain open to all school staff only.

All student learning will be remote.

Teachers in elementary will provide asynchronous learning by posting/sharing age, grade, learning appropriate activities and/or assignments aligned with current student learning, while being available to students through the day as per their schedule. Student attendance will be recorded centrally.

Child Care Centres may remain open at the discretion of the operator.

Bus services are cancelled due to inclement weather.

The school closures will be announced through the following: local media outlets, the Student Transportation Services website, School Transportation Hotline: 1-877-330- 3001, the Board's website and Twitter account and on the Board and school's voicemail recording. Parents please make sure that you have alternate childcare arrangements planned for inclement weather days when schools are closed to students.

Winter Weather

It's winter, it's cold, and my children can't be outside, my children will get sick! Many families believe walking to school in the winter and playing outside in the cold weather months leads to children getting sick. In fact according to many health and children's play experts, viruses that cause colds and the flu are spread indoors. The indoor circulation of germs and bacteria is much more harmful to your children than being outside. Being outside more often allows children to develop a stronger immune system and a resistance to allergies. Walking to school and playing outside in the winter gives children the opportunity to develop and strengthen their overall muscular system. If walking to school everyday is a challenge, choose two or three days a week to try and make a

With winter weather already here, we want to share a few important reminders.

Dress for the weather

Students should come dressed appropriately for the weather and for outdoor play. Students can stay warm by wearing layers of loose-fitting clothing, a hat, scarf, jackets, snow pants and mittens or gloves. Students may also want to bring extra pants and socks in case they get wet.

Recess



Promoting Real-life Math Connections At-Home

With the winter break approaching, there are many opportunities to discuss money and financial literacy with your child. Financial literacy involves all aspects of money such as budgeting, saving, investing, debt management, retirement planning, insurance and taxes. "Children need to be financially literate to make informed choices in a complex and fast-changing financial world. With an understanding of the implications of their decisions and with the necessary problem-solving and critical thinking skills, students will be better equipped to function in today's financial environment." (The Ontario Working Group on Financial Literacy, 2010)

Did you know?

- Although 95% of teenagers in 2008 understood what a budget is, only 21% of them used one and were able to stick to it.
- 54% of teenagers indicated that they would not pay their credit card off in full each month.
- 39% of teenagers ranked "how to save money" as the most important topic to learn about. The topic that ranked second (for 20% of students) was "how to use a bank account". Teenagers said they wanted to learn about money through interactive means.



Ex. 1, 2, 3, 7

This is an example because 1, 2, 3, 2+2=4, 2+3=5, 3+3=6, 7, 7+1=8, 7+2=9, 7+3=10).



This month as a school we looked at developing a growth mindset, what it means to have a growth mindset and how to engage in positivity.


Classes worked together to complete a Growth Mindset/Positivity choice board. We encourage you to talk with your child about their Growth Mindset and think about how you can engage in a Growth

With the onset of winter we need to be aware of our carbon footprint. To lessen energy consumption during the winter season and stay warm we recommend the following actions in our homes and schools:

- 1. Keep heat in by ensuring exterior windows and doors are kept closed.
- 2. Ensure that all weather stripping is in place around doors and windows.
- 3. The use of personal heaters is discouraged
- 4. Ensure that all heating and cooling vents and radiators are clear of obstructions.
- 5. Wear fall/winter appropriate clothing to work in layers to keep warm and comfortable.
- 6. Use your blinds to assist with heating and cooling classrooms and offices.



Bus Loop

Our school bus loop is only for our school busses or board transportation vehicles. Please use the Kiss and Ride at all times of the day, including lunch or if your child is late for school.

We want to ensure the safety of all of our students. We ask your cooperation in this matter.

We are also asking our families to arrive prior to 8: 25 am in the morning to alleviate the last minute rush.
