It serves as a central part of the early discussions between home and school" (Elementary Report Cards, YRDSB). Ongoing discussions are occurring between parents and teachers to ensure the children are receiving the next steps that home and school can collaboratively work on to improve student learning. Parents can extend the learning in the classroom by reading together at home, discussing the success criteria for homework assignments, and demonstrating an interest in their child's learning. Please set aside time to review the report card with your child. Complete page 3 and 4 together, establishing areas for improvement and setting attainable goals for term 2. If you have any questions or concerns about your child's report card, please speak with the teacher. We thank you for your continued support with your child's learning and special events at Pierre Berton PS. We look forward to working together with you in Term 2.



For nearly thirty years on the shores of a private lake in the Haliburton Highlands, Camp White Pine is host to a unique yearly camp for York Region District School Board students. Arts Camp is an intensive one week immersion in performance-based and product-generating art programs and experiences. To ensure the student experience is memorable, dynamic and fun, teachers, local and regional artists as well as student

counsellors plan and facilitate amazing art programs and support a unique, inclusive environment for campers. 250 students ranging from Grade 7 to Grade 12 from across York Region attend morning and afternoon artsbased programs augmented by other daily workshops and activities. Student Achievement

Inspiring Your Child to Learn and Love Math

This is the second installment of PBPS's "Math Session". In November, we identified clear math milestones kindergarten students had to meet before graduating kindergarten and strategies that parents can use to become partners in the math learning journey of their child.

In this installment, we will be looking at what concepts primary students need to be focusing on and developing in math and list some strategies that parents can use to help them through the learning process.

In the primary grades your child will learn the following in mathematics:

Stable Order

This means that a child needs to know that when counting the counting sequence is always consistent. Counting is always 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and NOT 1, 2, 3, 5, 4.

Movement is Magnitude

This means that a child understands that when moving up the counting sequence, the quantity increases, and when moving down or backwards in the sequence the quantity decreases.

Cardinality

This means that a child understands that after a set of numbers has been counted, the last number represents the number of objects in that set.

Subitizing

This means that a child is able to recognize the number of objects at a glance, without having to count all the objects

Early Number Concept	Teaching Strategy
Stable Order	Have the child practice their counting in different situations. For
	example, how many white cars do you see on the road? How
	many people in the room? How many toys in your toy box?
Movement is	Have the child put a group of toys together in a specified area,
Magnitude	count up to the total and them have them take that same number
	of toys and moved them to another specified area.
Cardinality	Have child put a group of toys together, count them and tell you
	how many there are in total.
Subitizing	Using a dice, have the child roll it and identify the number they
	have rolled without counting the dots.

Incorporating math into everyday activities will make learning math fun and it's an easy way for you and your child to spend quality time together. More importantly, family math time will help with reducing the level of anxiety that students feel when engaged in mathematics.

Student Achievement

Kindergarten Communication of Learning

On February 16th you will be Kindergarten parents will be receiving their child's Communication of Learning. The Kindergarten Communication of Learning reports are intended to provide parents with descriptions, written in plain language and including anecdotal comments, about their child's strengths and growth in relation to the overall expectations within each of the four frames of The Kindergarten Program. Next steps in the child's learning are also indicated, to inform parents of the educators' plans for supporting the child's new learning at school and to assist them in supporting their child's learning at home. The Kindergarten Communication of Learning reports are issued at the end of the second and third reporting periods. The report issued at the end of the second reporting period reflects the child's growth in learning in relation to the overall expectations introduced and developed from September to January/February of the school year. The report issued at the end of the third reporting period reflects the child's growth in learning in relation to the overall expectations introduced or further developed from January/February to June of the school year. Please note that the Kindergarten Program now refers to Year 1 and Year 2 instead of the previous Junior Kindergarten and Senior Kindergarten. It is important to remember that the Kindergarten program is a 2 year program and that expectations will be report on throughout the 2 year period.

In Kindergarten, the learning expectations are now organized into four "frames", or broad areas of learning: Belonging and Contributing, Self-Regulation and Well-Being, Demonstrating Literacy and Mathematics Behaviours, and Problem Solving and Innovating. The Communication of Learning will focus on specific expectations that are outlined within these Four Frames.

Four Frames for Learning

What children learn in connection with *all four frames* lays the foundation for developing traits and attitudes they will need to become active, contributing, responsible citizens and healthy, engaged individuals who take responsibility for their own and others' well-being.

Belonging and Contributing

The learning encompassed by this frame relates to the child's early development of the attributes and attitudes that inform citizenship, through his or her sense of personal connectedness to various communities.

Demonstrating Literacy and Mathematics Behaviours

What children learn in connection with this frame develops their capacity to think critically, to understand and respect many different perspectives, and to process various kinds of information.

Self-Regulation and Well-Being

What children learn in connection with this frame allows them to focus, to learn, to respect themselves and others, and to promote well-being in themselves and others.

Problem Solving and Innovating

The learning encompassed by this frame supports collaborative problem solving and bringing innovative ideas to relationships with others.

Students are invited to create, build and discover using Lego, Kinex, and blocks. They have also begun to explore the world of coding; creating art, animation, robotics and even their own games. Students have been introduced to the online program *Scratch*. Students learn to think creatively, reason systematically, and work collaboratively.

By learning how to access their accounts, students will be able to use Google apps to support their learning in the classroom and at home. In particular, we will be focusing on learning how to use Google Read and Write. This is a toolbar that can be uploaded to any Google account and provide endless literacy opportunities. This amazing toolbar is able to convert speech to text, allow you highlight and focus on key points in a reading, and read text back to you. We are hoping that through our teaching, it will support all our students understand online information, summarize readings and build writing confidence.
