

Message From Our Trustee



With report cards coming home, this is a good time of year to review your child's progress and to set goals for the rest of the school year.

As trustees, our goals are set out in the Board <u>Multi-Year Plan</u>. In the coming months, trustees will be reviewing and updating this plan. This process will include opportunities for public input, and trustees will be out in the communities talking about this. More in-

formation will be shared about this in the spring.

Developing and reviewing the Multi-Year Plan is just one of our responsibilities as publicly elected officials. Trustee responsibilities also include hiring the Director of Education, setting <u>Board policies</u> and the <u>annual budget</u>, and communicating with the public.

This is a good time to learn more about the <u>role of trustees</u> with the next <u>municipal election</u> taking place later this year on October 22, 2018. York Region District School Board has <u>12 trustees</u>, elected by ratepayers. As a trustee, listening and communicating with families is an important part of my role. Students, families and members of the public are welcome to attend and observe any public Board, Advisory or Board Committee meetings and to share their views with us on policy and Board governance.

As we move into the second half of the year, I hope that you are seeing evidence of your child's learning and progress, and finding opportunities to get involved in their learning and the life of the school.

School Cash Online

All YRDSB schools are now using School Cash Online as an online payment system. School Cash Online is an easy, safe and convenient way for families to pay online for extracurricular items or events, including yearbooks and field trips. It helps to reduce paper and the amount of cash/cheques handled by parents and students.



Pay for student items online

Families may make payments using School Cash Online, or by cash or cheque.

You can<u>register for School Cash Online</u> at any time. There is also a button on our school website. Once you are registered, you will be notified of any new items available for your child.

Confidential Information (Students Turning 18)



Under the Education Act, parents/guardians have a right to access their child's Ontario Student Record if the child is under 18.

If the student is 18 or over, the Board/school must follow the privacy provisions of the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act regarding the disclosure of personal information about the student to their parents/guardians.

Students 18 or over must provide written permission by signing the <u>Consent for Information Sharing</u> form to allow parents/guardians to continue to access school-related information about the student. This includes academic progress, attendance and behaviour.

Students can also obtain the form from the school office.

Greetings from the Learning Commons



The month seems to have flown by because of all the modern learning happening in the "Commons"/Carrefour d'apprentissage! Here are some examples of how the space is benefiting all of our learners, with the accompanying photos:

Mme Mason and her Grade 7 students have been using the Green Screens and the *Doink* app on the Ipads to bring their dramatic creations to life. Students in Mme Hampton's Grade 2 class have used Lego bricks to build scenes inspired by books they read. Grade 3 students in Mme

McGraw's class constructed 3D mazes. Then, they wrote, tested and modified the code needed to enable the Abeilles-robots (Bee Bots) to successfully travel through the labyrinth.





Our students were also treated to the *Power of One*, an "anti-bullying" themed, theatrical performance in the gym on January 24th. The actors explained to the audience that they would be acting out skits that would show the negative effects of different types of bullying, the roles that people play that make bullying possible, and what each child can do to prevent bullying from happening in their school. Student volunteers were selected to assist the actors, during the Primary presentation and the Junior/Intermediate presentation. This presented the message to the audience that together we can continue to make our school a welcoming place.

Punctuality Counts!



Punctuality is an important life-skill valued by school, employers in the workforce, and society. The morning entry bell rings at 7:55 a.m. and classes begin sharp at 8:05 a.m. Students who walk to school or who are driven to school **must** be in class before the start of the National Anthem. Otherwise, they are marked as late and this is recorded on their report card.

Dressing for Cold Weather

We ask that children are appropriately dressed for the weather including a warm hat, gloves, scarves, coats, snowpants and boots at this time of the year. We send the students out for either the full or shortened recess in the cold winter weather. We keep a close eye on all weather conditions, including wind chill before making our decisions. When conditions necessitate, we may decide that the students remain inside for recess.



We are aware that during the winter we will see changing temperatures, however, it is best to be prepared for the coldest weather conditions. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

Bus Information—Inclement Weather



The cold weather season is just around the corner. We would like all parents to be aware of the following bad weather procedures followed by the York Region District School Board. If the road conditions force the cancellation of the school buses, local radio stations will be notified as

soon as possible, normally no later than 6:30 a.m. During severe weather conditions, please tune in to one of the radio stations listed below for up-to-date

information. Remember that buses are cancelled in the morning then the buses will not be operating in the afternoon. Therefore, if you drive your children to school in the morning you must also be able to provide transportation for them after school at 2:35 p.m. Radio stations that will be notified of bus cancellations are: CFTR 680, CKEY 590, CFRB 1010, CHFI 98.1 and CKAN 1480. You have the right, as a parent, to keep your child(ren) at home in severe weather conditions; however, the school will probably be opened even though transportation has been cancelled.

French Immersion Information Sessions and Registrations

We are still taking Grade 1 French Immersion registration until February 9th, 2018

Our Board has recently completed a year-long <u>review</u> of the French as a Second Language (FSL) programs, including Core French and French Immersion (FI). One of the outcomes of this review was a long-term FI accommodation plan for students across York Region. YRDSB's FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. Students may begin the French Immersion program in one location, but continue in a different location. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools. The new accommodation plan will provide consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol.

Please note that some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision.

You can use the <u>School Locator</u> beginning in January 2018 to locate YRDSB schools offering the FI program for your address for the 2018-19 school year. Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools on January 18, 2018 at 7 p.m. Registration will take place January 19 to February 9, 2018.
