It is important that during the holiday season and all throughout the year, that we help children to understand what it means to be fortunate. Donating some time to a Food Bank or making a food, toy or clothing donation to a local agency helps children to be appreciative of our blessings: good health, loving families, safe homes, the first snow fall, and the list could go on and on.

The Holiday Season is a perfect time to begin new family traditions, such as taking time at the dinner table to share what or who you appreciate, or having children keep an appreciation journal to record their thoughts at the end of each day. What **ZONE** Are You In?

(Adapted from: *The Zones of Regulation* by Leah M. Kuypers)

In the last two months, many students at Redstone have had the opportunity to participate in the curriculum called the Zones of Regulation with Mrs. Dawn. The goal of the curriculum is to teach children about self-regulation and how to strengthen their self-regulation skills. Self-regulation can go by many names, such as self-control, self-management, and impulse control. Self-regulation is an essential skill in life, and in all learning environments. Children who can regulate their own emotions and attention are better ready to learn and thrive.

The Zones of Regulation groups all the ways that we feel and act into four coloured "Zones".

Blue Zone—when your body is running slowly, such as when you are tired, sick, sad or bored.
Green Zone—when you are ready to learn or "good to go." You feel happy, calm and focused.
Yellow Zone—when you feel your engine running high, such as when you are frustrated, overwhelmed, silly, wiggly, excited, worried, anxious, or surprised.
Red Zone—when you have lost control of your emotions and you need to stop, you have extreme feelings such as terror,



uncontrolled anger, aggression, or elation.

The curriculum includes lessons and learning activities are designed to help the students recognize when they are in the different zones as well as learn how to use strategies to change or stay in the zone they are in. In addition to addressing self-regulation, the students will gain an increased vocabulary of emotional terms, skills in reading other people's facial expressions, perspective about how others see and react to their behavior, insight into events that trigger their behavior, calming and alerting strategies, and problem solving skills.

It is important to note that everyone experiences all of the zones—the Red and Yellow Zones **are not** the "bad" or "naughty" zones. All of the zones are expected at one time or another. The Zones of Regulation is intended to be neutral and not communicate judgment. If you use the Zones of Regulation vocabulary at home, please use neutral language. For example, "I notice you are in the Blue Zone. What is your plan for moving to the Green Zone?" Or "The Yellow Zone is great for the playground, but right now we are getting ready for dinner. Can you tell me what Zone would be a better match for getting ready for dinner?" "You are in the Red Zone. It is hard to solve problems when you are in the Red Zone. Do you need help getting calmer, so you can be in the Green Zone?".

Kindergarten Registration Commences on January 19, 2018

Kindergarten registration will commence on January 19, 2018 for the 2018-19 school year. Registration forms are available on YRDSB's website: www.yrdsb.ca. Children who turn four or five years old during 2018, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten. A kindergarten information session for parents is being planned for this spring. For more information, please visit the YRDSB website or contact your local school.

French Immersion Information Sessions and Registrations

Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools on January 18, 2018 at 7 p.m. Please visit YRDSB's website in January 2018 (http://www.yrdsb.ca/Programs/fi/Pages/Program-Locations.aspx) to find the FI program location for your elementary school location. FI registration will begin January 19, 2018. Parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2018, and wishing to enrol in the FI Program, can visit or call the school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to the designated FI program location to register between January 19 and February 9, 2018. This eliminates the need to provide duplicate enrollment information or to pre-register.

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. Space requirements at some schools may mean that siblings are in different schools for primary dual track French Immersion programs due to differing grade structures. Like any of our schools across the Board, changes to school boundaries, and/or the accommodation model for the French Immersion program may need to be considered when new schools open, a school experiences enrolment growth, and program changes occur. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools.

Please note: Some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision. Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108


As we enter the holiday season, I am once again impressed by the generosity of our school communities and our students' commitment to helping others.

Health Connections - Head Lice

We have had a few cases of head lice at Redstone. We are asking all families to be vigilant throughout the course of the year by checking your child's hair for nits (eggs) or live lice. Children with live lice must remain at home. Treatment involves not only the child's hair, but also other family members, bedding, clothing, hair accessories, etc. More information is available through <u>Public Health</u>. Families are reminded to continue to check for lice and nits even after treatment has been applied. Continued combing using a specialized comb for the removal of nits is the only way to prevent a recurrence or the spread of lice.



OHIP+

Beginning January 1, 2018, the province will provide free prescription drug coverage for children and youth aged 24 and under, regardless of family income.

Under OHIP+, over four million Ontario children and youth will have access to over 4,400 medications and other drug products. This will help many families access medications their children need to stay healthy at no cost – no co-payment or annual deductible.

Enrollment in OHIP+ will be automatic, based on age. There are no upfront costs for eligible medications. Those who are eligible for OHIP+ will only need their health card number and a valid prescription from their doctor or nurse practitioner when they visit their pharmacist.

SCHOOLS REMAIN OPEN

During an Inclement Weather Day, the school is open and alternate programming may be provided depending on the number of students in attendance on this day.

PIZZA LUNCH & LUNCH LADY

If Pizza Lunches are scheduled on an Inclement Weather Day they will be cancelled and rescheduled.

All Lunch Lady orders will be delivered, unless cancelled by phone or email **before 8:00AM** on the day of delivery.

DROP OFF/PICK UP

Students who come to school on a Snow Day may be dropped off and picked up through the parking lot loop. Please pick up students by 3:45 pm.

School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to
 and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not
 operate in the afternoon. Therefore, students transported to school by parents will require the same
 transportation home.
