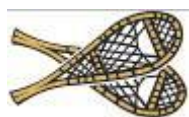

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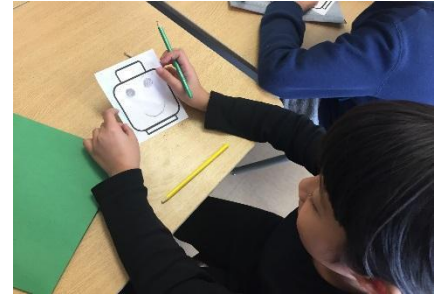
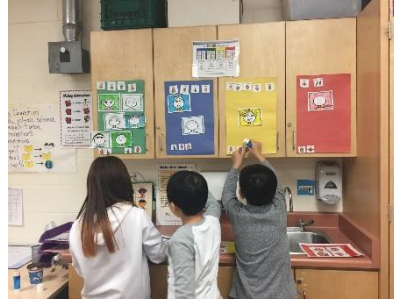
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Green means GO, and We are Ready to Learn!



We are continuing our work with the Zones of Regulation and students are engaging in many activities to learn to express their emotions through four colored zones. Mrs. Dawn has been working with various classes to discuss different perspectives, expected and unexpected behaviours, reading facial and body clues which relate to our emotions and examining the size of the problem.

The size of my REACTION should match the size of the PROBLEM!

If you find your child needs help solving problems that they encounter within their day, try asking them "What is the size of the problem?"

Examples of these problems may be feeling tired, working on homework or experiencing a conflict with friends or siblings.

By sizing the problem, your child can frame the situation on a scale of 1-5 and focus on how the reaction should match the size of the problem. This can also help to identify the possible ways to solve the problem whether it requires a quick fix, talking about it or may involve other people to help.

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Health Connections Social-Emotional Learning for Children

What we choose to say, how we say it and even how we play with words and language — create the kind of pleasant and welcoming environment that makes family dinner worthwhile. Here are some tips for choosing and using words for fun and conversation that will make everyone want seconds.

1. Food Poetry – take a bite of food and have your child give the most descriptive words that comes to mind – think about texture, taste, smell, etc.

2. Story by Sentence -- One family member begins a story and talks for no more than a minute. The story then moves on to the next family member, who continues the story. Some ground rules: Story themes must be about the choices people make, everyone participates, no one goes on for too long.

SCHOOLS REMAIN OPEN

During an Inclement Weather Day, the school is open and alternate programming may be provided depending on the number of students in attendance on this day.

PIZZA LUNCH & LUNCH LADY

If Pizza Lunches are scheduled on an Inclement Weather Day they will be **cancelled and rescheduled**.

All Lunch Lady orders will be delivered, unless cancelled by phone or email **before 8:00AM** on the day of delivery.

DROP OFF/PICK UP

Students who come to school on a Snow Day may be dropped off and picked up through the parking lot loop. Please pick up students by 3:45 pm.

School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- **School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all municipalities in York Region.** Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. **If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore, students transported to school by parents will require the same transportation home.**

SNAP® BACK

“ADAPTING THE SNAP® PROGRAM FOR BLACK AND AFRICAN CANADIAN KIDS,,

WHAT IS THE SNAP® PROGRAM?

The SNAP® Program is a gender-sensitive, evidence-based early intervention program that teaches children with disruptive behaviour problems, and their parents, how to stop and think before they act and make better choices “in the moment”. Developed by the Child Development Institute (CDI), the Program helps children between the ages of 6 and 11 to learn self-regulation, self-control and problem-solving skills. Children who enter the program may have engaged in aggressive, anti-social behaviour, and / or have come into contact with authority figures at school or in the community. SNAP® is a multi-faceted program designed to assist middle years children and their families, including working with their school and community to help keep kids in school and out of trouble. SNAP® is not recommended for children on the Autism Spectrum or with significant developmental delays.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

Service providers, advocates, educators, social workers, parents and anyone else who has had experience with Black children aged 6 to 11 who have demonstrated or experienced challenges with self-regulation and/or disruptive behaviour.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN?

We will share an overview of the SNAP® Program. You will share your experience and knowledge about Black children age 6 to 11 and provide your input into how the program materials could be adapted from a cultural identity and anti-Black racism lens. Dinner will be provided.
