


"Every storm runs out of rain, just like every dark night turns into day." by Gary Allan

When children face a big emotion like disappointment, anger, or grief, it feels like their whole world is coming down on them. They think they will always feel this way and use words like " I will never...."


The good news is that we can teach them that every storm eventually passes, and before it passes they can "weather the storm" by using helpful coping strategies. There is a poster we can use that teaches children their emotions are like clouds,

In April, we often talk about how April showers bring May flowers. This idea can be used to help us understand children's emotions and support their mental health. Just like seasons and the weather, our emotions change. Learning how to respond to those changing emotions is important for children as they grow and develop. It's also important for us as adults to understand how we can support our child(ren) with their, and our own, ever changing emotions.

Learning mindful strategies to cope with these changing emotions is very important. Some mindful strategies that can be used are:



- Belly breathing (deep breaths)
- Counting to 10

- Take a drink of water

Finding ways to regulate and weather storms is how we can help children learn to deal with challenging and changing emotions. Finding what works best for each individual requires trial and error. 

Class Placement Information

As the final term continues, we will be making decisions later this spring regarding class placements for next year. When organizing classes, we take into account many important factors to provide an optimum learning environment. These include class size, student performance levels, gender and special needs.

The following criteria will be used to determine student placement:

<u>Academic Ability:</u> To ensure that all classes contain a balance of students with varying abilities.

<u>Learning Styles</u>: To ensure that specific student needs (learning styles, organizational skills, work habits and behaviour) are addressed.

<u>Special Education Needs:</u> To ensure that placement maximizes support and opportunities for success.

<u>Peer Groupings:</u> Students, where possible, will be placed to maintain positive peer support.

Should you have information that we are currently unaware of, and that you believe is relevant to your child's placement next year, please put this in writing to Mrs. Grossinger (<u>Kerry.grossinger@yrdsb.ca</u>) by Friday, April 23rd. Requests after this date may not be accepted. We will not accept specific requests for a staff member. We will consider all information but provide no guarantees as class placement is a very complex process. All final decisions regarding student placements remain the responsibility of the principal, in collaboration with school staff. Student class placement may also change in late September due to Ministry of Education requirements related to Primary Class Size reduction.

Registration and Class Placement

As you may be aware our planning for the 2021-2022 school year is underway. At this time, if you are aware of any family, friends or neighbours who have children born in 2017, please remind them to register their child for Kindergarten as soon as possible. Please let us know if you are planning a move. This information helps us immensely when planning for next year. If you have borrowed technology for virtual learning and are moving out of the YRDSB, please make arrangements to return the technology to Regency Acres prior to your move.


