experiential learning.

# **Caring and Safe Schools**

It is important to us that we provide a caring, safe and inclusive environment in our school that supports the academic achieve-

ment and well-being of all students. This week has been safety week and we have had announcements each morning about different topics such as fire safety, bicycle safety, bus safety, and online safety. Last week, we held virtual divisional assemblies to talk about some of the important elements of a caring and safe school. Each assembly was adjusted to make the content age appropriate. You may want to have a conversation with your child about what they learned and discussed. Topics covered include:

#### Positive Behaviour

Students are encouraged to demonstrate positive character attributes (such as empathy, courage and respect for human rights and inclusivity). We also discussed standing up for each other in bullying situations and the importance of reporting incidents of bullying, including:

- Telling a caring adult
- Using the YRDSB's "Report It Button" (located on our school website)
- Contacting Kids Help Phone (1-800-668-6868)

#### Student Discipline

We use a progressive discipline approach when inappropriate behaviour occurs. This means we consider a range of options to determine the most appropriate response to each situation to help students learn from their choices. In some cases, suspension or expulsion may be necessary. The Ontario Education Act and our Board Caring and Safe Schools Policy outline the situations in which suspension and expulsion must be considered. These infractions are also outlined in the Guide to the School Year. When inappropriate behaviour occurs, information will be shared with the victim and parents/quardians of the victim to the extent that legislation allows.

#### Tobacco/Alcohol/Drug-Free Environment

The use of tobacco, electronic products (such as vaping, electronic cigarettes and cigars and related products) and/or student possession of alcohol/illegal and restricted drugs, including cannabis, are prohibited on school property or within 20 meters of school boundaries. This also applies during Board or school-sponsored events and activities. This is in compliance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, which is enforced locally by York Region Community and Health Services and the Tobacco and Smoke-Free Environment Policy and Procedure. A progressive form of discipline, including suspension from school and fines (up to \$5,000), is in place for students who break the law. In accordance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act (SFOA), exceptions are made for the traditional use of tobacco that forms part of Indigenous culture and spirituality.

We also discussed the potential harms associated with vaping and e-cigarettes, including that e-cigarettes can contain nicotine, formaldehyde and other harmful chemicals, and are being used to inhale other harmful substances such as marijuana, weight loss supplements and other drugs. <u>Partnership for Drug Free Kids also provides a resource on how to talk to your kids about vaping</u>.

Appropriate Use of Technology Students were reminded about the Appropriate Use of Technology agreement, including the importance of using respectful language and making positive choices when using electronic communications and social media tools. Students were reminded that threats made online are taken seriously and may have serious consequences, including potential criminal charges. Where there are concerns for the safety of students, staff, community members or Board property, the school board works closely with York Regional Police and appropriate actions are taken. The safety and well-being of students remains our top priority.

# **Terry Fox 2020**



Regency will host our Terry Fox run between October 5th and October 23rd to raise funds for cancer research. This is the 40th Anniversary of his run so Regency has decided to complete the run as a collaborative effort, in honour of this occasion. Since Terry Fox ran from St. John's, Newfoundland to Thunder Bay, Ontario which is a total of 5 373 km, Regency has decided to run the distance by collaborating over the course of 3 weeks. Each class will be responsible to complete a total of 335 kms (a km lap will be modified for our Junior and Primary classes). It works out to about 16 laps/student. Laps will be run on school property and teachers will review safety protocols with students around physical distancing and mask wearing. Teachers will keep track of the laps they run and they will be added to our school totals.

A map will be displayed in Regency where students can see how far we travelled and how far we need to go.

We hope to reach Thunder Bay by October 23rd! Families are encouraged to support our run by donating to the Terry Fox Foundation.

#### **2SLGBTQ**

The month of October commemorates the impact that Two Spirit, lesbian, gay, bisexual transgender, queer, questioning, and individuals with related identities have had in our local communities, nationally and internationally. It is an opportunity to build awareness of the contributions the 2SLGBTQ+ community has made in Canada and abroad.
