Bullying Prevention Measures

The York Region District School Board (YRDSB) has launched a new web reporting tool that allows students, parents and community members to report bullying incidents as well as positive behaviours and events related to our students and learning environments. The online tool, called **Report It!**, is a web button on the YRSB homepage (<u>www.yrdsb.ca</u>) that links to an online form where users report bullying or positive behaviours that are consistent with Character Matters.

The development of this tool is the result of student feedback from an anti-bullying conference held last spring. It is meant for reporting **non-emergencies only** and deals solely with **student** issues. Follow-up will be determined by the severity of the incident and may involve sharing information with authorities. Users may submit reports anonymously (although anonymity cannot be absolutely guaranteed).

YRDSB is also asking students, parents, teachers and community members to "Take the Pledge" against bullying. To learn more, click on "The Pledge" image on the YRDSB website or go to <u>www.ctvbarrie.ca</u>.



In October, the Business Department hosted an interactive financial presentation seminar *Funny Money*, featuring James Cunningham. Our grade 11 and 12 students were both entertained and empowered with the knowledge they need to make good financial decisions about budgeting, organizing debt and investing.

DRAMA

Drama Department

The drama department was full of activity this semester. Ms. MacKay's grade 12 class performed their one act plays entitled "More than Meets the Eye" on December 8th and 9th, 2016. This production consisted of three plays that spanned the emotional continuum from dark and sinister to hilarious. The evening began with "The Face is the Place", a hard-hitting drama that explores the world of girl gangs in a high school. "Dinner with the MacGuffins" is a play about a typical 1950's American family with a secret. Finally the evening ended with "Controlling Interest" which explores the battle of the sexes from the perspective of eight-year-old boys. One of most remarkable highlights of the rehearsal process was the frequent contact the director and the students had with all three playwrights. The communication with these artists enriched the experience for all involved. The students performed to capacity crowds and the result was a thought-provoking and entertaining evening at the theatre.

The grade 11 drama class developed an original play about transitioning to high school and performed it for the grade 8 students from our feeder schools in early November. "Get Schooled" was a light-hearted comedy with a weighty message. The play explored key topics which relate to success in high school, including the importance of getting involved, strategies for studying, and healthy choices. The students enjoyed the chance to perform for these future "Raiders" and the grade 8s and their teachers expressed appreciation for the warm and funny look at high school life.

The grade 9 and 10 drama students spent the last four weeks of semester honing their collaboration skills by writing original scripts and rehearsing and performing these works for one another. While writing by committee is a challenge, the final products proved that the creative imaginations of our drama students are rich and that "stories about the human condition" make compelling entertainment. Thanks to all our drama students for a wonderful semester of fun and hard work!

RHHS English Department Newsletter—Winter 2017

The first semester of the 2016-17 school year has been a very successful one with numerous activities and awards in our English program. We offer a warm welcome to our newest department member Ms. Koliviras; we would also like to congratulate Mr. Cimetta on winning the Teacher of the Year Award from <u>Teen Ink</u> Magazine. In addition, there are numerous student achievements that we would like to acknowledge. First, we would like to congratulate Alina Sewani for winning the Robert MacDonald Award for Excellence in English Literature and Gaya Bin Noon for winning the Marie Pick Award for Proficiency in English Writing. Continuing this tradition of excellence we also would like to recognize Emily Xu for placing first out of ten thousand students across Canada, in the prestigious Turning Points Essay Competition. The results from the 2016 AP English exams were fantastic: nearly fifty per cent of participating students received perfect scores on two separate internationally recognized AP English exams. Six students received the distinction of AP National Scholar, while twelve received the honour of AP scholar.

In November we kicked off our literacy month celebrations by participating in numerous literacy initiatives including the Turning Points Essay Contest, the Richmond Hill Public Library Short Story Contest, the Marion Drysdale Creative Writing Contest for Poetry and Short Fiction, and the Canadian Poet's League Poetry Parade. Sir Kenneth Branagh's world renowned "Shakespearience" interactive workshop also made a stop at Richmond Hill High School. Our students had the opportunity to gain a new appreciation for <u>Hamlet</u> and to discuss the craft of professional acting in Canada with two very famous actors from the Stratford Festival, Zach Smadu and Marvin Karon.

During the second semester Canadian author, poet, and spoken word artist Dwayne Morgan will be leading an amazing interactive slam poetry workshop for students at Richmond Hill High School. Mr. Morgan, the 2012 Canadian Festival of Spoken Word Slam Poetry Champion, will delight students with performances of several of his works and share his valuable insight with students on how to write and perform pieces for slam poetry competitions. The winners of our Slam Poetry competition will represent Richmond Hill High School at the YRDSB Slam Poetry Semi-Finals on February 7, 2017, and if successful, at the YRDSB Slam Poetry Finals this coming April. The 2016 RHHS Slam Poetry team of Nora Alganabi, Zaynab Dhalla, Olivia Leung, Jathusha Mahenthirajan, and Alina Sewani all gave inspired performances, propelling the team to a second place finish. Students who are interested in joining the RHHS Slam Poetry Team can drop by the RHHS Slam Poetry Club every Friday after school in Room 1060 to sign up, or see Mr. Cimetta in the English Department office for more details.

Last semester the English department sponsored several field trips as extensions to our academic English program. Students visited the ROM to study the history and culture of Elizabethan England, while several other classes attended animation workshops at the National Film Board of Canada or traveled to the TIFF Centre for a day of film production workshops. We also have a field trip scheduled to visit the Stratford Festival in May: forty-four students will have a chance to watch <u>Romeo and Juliet</u> on Wednesday, May 24. This will provide students with an opportunity to view an authentic production of an Elizabethan play in an environment replicating London's Globe Theatre.

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test will be held on Thursday, March 30, 2017 and students have been preparing for it in their grades nine and ten classes throughout both semesters. This year we are anticipating the largest AP English enrolment ever in York Region (over 150 students) and we hope to continue our tradition of literary success on the two international AP English exams to be written in May. During the month of January, Guidance counsellors made presentations to discuss the course selection process for next year and educational pathways. We encourage students to make informed decisions about their course selections and to consult with teachers, counsellors and parents/guardians. We have sent all instructions, handouts and presentations about course selection to students through their board gapps email account. In order access this email account student will use their student number@gapps.yrdsb.ca. (ex. 123456789@gapps.yrdsb.ca)

Course selections must be submitted to our school electronically by the student through Career Cruising. Once students have finalized their course selection they must lock in and submit their course selections by hitting the "submit" button on any one of the following dates: <u>February 13-24</u>. Students who require additional support with course selection can come to the library on <u>February 16, 2017</u> during any period of the day that they have a lunch or spare. A paper copy of student course selections must also be printed from Career Cruising and submitted along with a parent's signature to semester 2 homeroom teachers on or before <u>February 27, 2017</u>.

Students who wish to request a timetable change for semester two are to go to their gapps email account and follow the instructions provided.


Music Awards Banquet










Grade 10 hand cast mixed media sculpture


