Bullying Prevention Measures

The York Region District School Board (YRDSB) has launched a new web reporting tool that allows students, parents and community members to report bullying incidents as well as positive behaviours and events related to our students and learning environments. The online tool, called **Report It!**, is a web button on the YRDSB homepage (www.yrdsb.ca) that links to an online form where users report bullying or positive behaviours that are consistent with Character Matters.

The development of this tool is the result of student feedback from an anti-bullying conference held last spring. It is meant for reporting **non-emergencies only** and deals solely with **student** issues. Follow-up will be determined by the severity of the incident and may involve sharing information with authorities. Users may submit reports anonymously (although anonymity cannot be absolutely guaranteed).

4th in the Grade 12 contest. These are incredible results and our students and teachers are congratulated on their outstanding results.

Congratulations to this year's RHHS Mock Trial School Team who won 1st place in the York Region *Judges' Cup Mock Trial Competition* in April, after 6 long months of late meetings and preparation. The team then went on to capture 1st place at the *OBA- OJEN Central East*

Regional Mock Trial Competition at the Oshawa Courthouse. It was an exceptional year for our school with 4 of our 11 team members receiving individual awards for Tournament MVP, Top Advocacy or Best Witness Performance. Another year has come and gone, in a flash! Semester two was a flurry of activity in the Drama department and we are very proud of the work that students accomplished in all the grades. This semester's grade 12 students performed an evening of one act plays titled "Torn at the Seams". The first offering of the evening was a fantastical look at life and death, and the threads that bind families together. Act two began with a brutal comedy about 3 misfit teens who have rather shocking intentions. The evening ended with two raucous comedies, one that involved a regrettable tattoo and another which looked at office paranoia and romance. The crowds were huge, enthusiastic and supportive. The actors worked long hours to pull together and create a memorable evening of theatrical entertainment. No doubt it will be one of the key experiences they will remember when they think back to their time at R.H.H.S.

The grade 11 students wrote an original play called "Be True to You" about honouring yourself and your true spirit. It explored the consequences of giving away too much power to your peers. This meaningful offering with its important message was shared with the grade 7 and 8 students from 4 of our feeder schools. The experience benefitted the future raiders who got a chance to connect to high school students. Our grade 11 drama students loved the chance to visit their old elementary schools and share some sage advice about making positive choices in the future. The rich discussion that followed the presentations demonstrated that the message was well-received.

The grade 10 class bonded together and created some of the best work in mime, mask and tableau we have seen to date. However, it was the script writing that really set this group apart. Their original ideas and their ability to write authentic dialogue helped them to create compelling dramatic and side-splitting comedic short plays.

Finally, this semester's grade 9 classes pushed beyond boundaries and experienced breakthroughs when creating characters. Whether it was scene study, improvisation or movement, students proved that the best work involves creative risk taking, honesty and effective collaboration.

We'd like to thank all our drama students for a wonderful semester. Have a great summer!

English Department Update Summer 2017

As another eventful school year comes to its close, it is time to reflect on all of the wonderful opportunities we have had to celebrate student success.

First, we would like to offer a fond farewell to Ms. Koliviras and our student teacher Mr. Smiley; we would also like to congratulate Mr. Cimetta on winning the Teacher of the Year Award from <u>Teen Ink</u> Magazine. We would like to congratulate Amanda Oprisan for winning the Robert MacDonald Award for Excellence in English Literature and George Yun for winning the Marie Pick Award for Proficiency in English Writing. Continuing this tradition of excellence we would like to recognize Katelyn Wang for placing third out of ten thousand students across Canada, in the prestigious Turning Points Essay Competition. We also had our largest attendance ever for two internationally recognized Advanced Placement English exams, with over seventy students representing RHHS. The results will be published in the fall.

Students were engaged in numerous literacy initiatives this year including a visit from Sir Kenneth Branagh's world renowned "Shakespearience" interactive workshop. Our students had an opportunity to gain a new appreciation for <u>Hamlet</u> and to discuss the craft of professional acting in Canada with two very famous actors from the Stratford Festival: Zach Smadu and Marvin Karon. Some of our other Literacy initiatives for the year included the Turning Points Essay Contest, the Richmond Hill Public Library Short Story Contest, the Marion Drysdale Creative Writing Contest for Poetry and Short Fiction, the Canadian Poet's League Poetry Parade and the Hot Docs Festival.

On April 19 Mr. Cimetta took his poetry slam team to the BE HEARD Spoken Word Festival, which brought together student writers from all corners of the school board to engage with internationally recognized spoken word poets in order to experience a morning of dynamic creative writing workshops. In the afternoon the 'Festival of Student Voices' students were invited to share their newly created poetry, alongside industry professionals, resulting in an experience that was both unifying and unique.

Participants were able to see, first hand, the emotional transformation that occurs when students feel engaged, supported, successful and listened to; BE HEARD purposefully curates spaces that are safe, and warmly welcomes students from our LGBTQ, FNMI, and At-Risk communities. The professional poets delighted students with performances of their works and shared their valuable insight with students on how to write and perform pieces for slam poetry competitions. The winners of our Slam Poetry competition represented Richmond Hill High School at the YRDSB Slam Poetry Finals on May 9, 2017. The 2017 RHHS Slam Poetry team of Nora Alganabi, Olivia Leung, Adam Linton, Kaitlyn Paglia, Aine Palmer, and Nikash Persaud all gave inspired performances, propelling the team to a third place finish. Students who are interested in joining the RHHS Slam Poetry Team can drop by the RHHS Slam Poetry Club every Friday after school in Room 1060 to sign up, or see Mr. Cimetta in the English Department office for more details.

The English department sponsored several field trips this year as extensions to our academic English program. Students visited the ROM to study the history and culture of Elizabethan England, while several classes attended animation workshops at the National Film Board of Canada, and some other classes traveled to the TIFF Centre for a day of film production workshops. We also took a trip to the Stratford Festival to see Romeo and Juliet on May 24. This provided students with an opportunity to view an authentic production of an Elizabethan play in an environment replicating London's Globe Theatre. The play was superb and we highly recommend it as a possible summer excursion.

Finally, the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test was held on Thursday, March 30, 2017. School and Board results will be published at the end of August. Congratulations to all of our amazing teachers, students, and parents for making literacy a priority in every subject area. Metro Green Apple Grant:

We were fortunate enough to receive a Metro Green Apple Grant of \$1000 to help bolster our Breakfast program. The Family Studies Department applied for the grant to allow our students additional opportunities to be in the kitchen with an authentic task, providing healthy breakfast opportunities for our learning community. Some of our more adventurous options, such as hummus and vegetables, were not as well received as the more traditional breakfast fare but we definitely got students talking about the importance of eating breakfast. Our egg muffins loaded with fresh vegetables were a big hit and the banana muffins of course.

Fresh from the Farm Fundraiser for our Breakfast Program:



We are excited to bring the Fresh From the Farm initiative to Richmond Hill High School in September. Our students will be able to purchase Bundle A \$13 (5 lb white potatoes, 3 lb carrots, 3 lb yellow onions, and 3 lbs sweet potatoes) and/or Bundle B \$15 (8 lb of Empire apples) on school cash net in September for delivery in November. We are supporting good nutrition and Ontario farmers in perfect alignment with our Family Studies food courses curriculum getting students to make their own food from scratch. Guest judges from around the school were wowed by the students' ingenuity and knowledge as the cupcakes were taste tested. As the icing on the cake, students were able to describe, in detail, the health benefits of the non-traditional baking ingredients that they incorporated into their cupcakes. AP Psychology in Gaya's Words:

I recently completed my first year of Health Studies at the University of Waterloo, but before I got here, during my time at Richmond Hill High, I took four AP exams: both English exams, one biology, and of course, the ever-important field of psychology. I passed all of them, thankfully, and was able to transfer my credits to Waterloo.

Unfortunately, most of these did not turn out to have been particularly useful. I got all the credits, but for three out of the four, I was just given a "1XX" credit, meaning I could not skip the required introductory courses in my first year. However, the fourth credit I received was PSYCH 101, or Introductory Psychology. Thanks to my taking AP Psychology and writing the exam, this course was the only one I was permitted to skip in first year.

It turned out to have been very convenient, because PSYCH 101 is a course that is required for a huge range of programs at Waterloo, including sciences, arts, and even some engineering. Class sizes get very large, and the material needs to be applicable to countless fields of study. Since I was spared this by taking it in high school, I decided to take a second year biopsychology class instead, which was more focused in an area I'm interested in.

Even if the credits don't transfer, though, I still feel like writing AP exams is an immeasurably valuable experience. The strategies I learned studying for those exams were really useful in preparing me for university, and I'm really glad I took all four of them.

Moreover, I'm really glad I took your class. Out of all the classes I took in grade 12, yours was one of the classes that prepared me the most for the pace and teaching style of university courses, and was by far the most interesting. I hope you're not going to forget me anytime soon, because I'm definitely never going to forget you.
