We wish you all a safe, healthy and enjoyable long weekend.



Social Connection and the Power of a Listening Ear

A year later, we continue to experience uncertainty with lockdowns and social distancing; we long for social interaction with peers, friends, and families beyond our immediate social circles. This month's newsletter will focus on the importance of maintaining and expanding our social connections by offering a listening ear while following Public Health guidelines.

Restrictions limiting in-person interactions have left many parents and students feeling a sense of isolation, sadness, anxiousness, and frustration, among other feelings. The importance of offering a listening ear could not be more pronounced as many feel disconnected and alone. According to CMHA, 'really listening' is the key to a meaningful connection. Active listening is a part of effective communication skills that can support building a real connection with other people. It can take some getting used to, especially when behind a mask and distanced six feet apart or even behind a virtual screen.

The importance of offering a listening ear to understand what a person might be experiencing is a small act that can make a meaningful difference. Leon F. Seltzer Ph.D. explains why feeling understood is essential to our wellbeing and how it connects us to others, allowing us to feel welcomed.

Included below are some tips to build connection safely by offering a sympathetic ear:

- Reach out in a manner that feels safe and follows Public Health guidelines i.e., phone call, zoom, text, and other creative ways.
- Take the time to let the other person know you are there for them. "I am here for you. I am listening. Tell me what's on your mind..."
- Show empathy and understanding by validating what is being said. "I hear you, and it makes sense why you would feel this way."
- • Acknowledge their feelings.
- • Be present in the moment with the person.
- Listen to understand and take the necessary time to absorb the information.
- Ask questions when appropriate. The questions should be curious, open-ended, and ones that do not contain an answer. "Can you tell me more about what that was like for you?"
- • Pay attention to body language by facing the person to show you are listening.
- • Avoid advice-giving, interrupting, making assumptions, or judgments.
- Let the conversation flow.
- • Be honest about how much time you can offer to connect.

Following these tips should help you get started on building meaningful connections through the act of listening.

Filmed in Canada, Iran, and the United States, *Secrets of the Surface: The Mathematical Vision of Maryam Mirzakhani* examines the life and mathematical work of Maryam Mirzakhani, an Iranian immigrant to the United States who became a superstar in her field. In 2014, she was both the first woman and the first Iranian to be honored by mathematics' highest prize, the Fields Medal.

Mirzakhani's contributions are explained in the film by leading mathematicians and illustrated by animated sequences. Her mathematical colleagues from around the world, as well as former teachers, classmates, and students in Iran today, convey the deep impact of her achievements. The path of her education, success on Iran's Math Olympiad team, and her brilliant work, make Mirzakhani an ideal role model for girls looking toward careers in science and mathematics.





1 Genocide Remembrance, Condemnation and Prevention Month (Canada) In Canada, April is Genocide Remembrance, Condemnation and Prevention Month and is an opportunity to reflect on the root causes of these tragedies, so that we may prevent them from happening again.

When is Genocide against the Tutsi Memorial Day?

On April 7th, Rwanda memorialises victims of the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi. Unlike other official holidays in Rwanda, this holiday is always observed on the same date, even if it falls on a weekend.

Judaism 3 Seventh Day of Pesah

(Last observed day for Reform Jews.) Pesah commemorates the departure of the Israelites from Egypt. It is the first of the three major festivals with both historical and agricultural significance (the other two are Shavuot and Sukkot).

In Israel and among Reform Jews, Pesah is celebrated for seven days: eve + the first day + the seventh (last) day are non-working. For Orthodox and Conservative Jews outside Israel, Pesa is celebrated for eight days: eve + first and second days + seventh (second last) and eighth (last) days are nonworking.

4 Eighth (Last) Day of Pesah (Last observed day for Orthodox and Conservative Jews.) Pesah commemorates the departure of the Israelites from Egypt. It is the first of the three major festivals with both historical and agricultural significance (the other two are Shavuot and Sukkot).

For Orthodox and Conservative Jews outside Israel. Pesah is celebrated for eight days: eve + first and second days + seventh (second last) and eighth (last) days are non-working. (Note: In Israel and among Reform Jews, Pesah is celebrated for seven days: eve + the first day + the seventh (last) day are non-working.)





Buddhism 8 Buddha's Birth date Anniversary of the historical Buddha's birth. (Mahāyāna) (Japan, North America)



Bahá'í Faith 8 Jalál Jalál (Glory) is the second Bahá'í month.

Indigenous Spirituality 1 Thundering Moon (local Oneida) Thunder renews the earth in the spring and keeps the big dangerous animals (e.g. dinosaurs, snakes) underground. Also thunder controls the wind so it does not get too strong and destroy homes...as told by Oneida of the Thames Elders.



Christianity 1 Maundy (Holy) Thursday (W) Celebrates the institution of the Lord's Supper by Jesus.

2 Holy (Good) Friday (W) Commemorates the Passion of Jesus Christ, i.e., his submission to death by crucifixion.



Christianity 3 Holy Saturday (W)

The final day of Lent, of Holy Week and the Sacred Triduum - Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. It is a day of vigil in preparation for Easter. The day culminates with the Easter Vigil in many Churches during which the Easter Candle, the Light of Christ, leads a congregation through song and prayer to celebrate the Resurrection.





4 Easter (W)

Celebrates the resurrection of Jesus. It initiates the fifty-day period culminating in Pentecost.
