Dress code

The student dress code supports respect for the learning environment. Respect for self and others is evident when students dress in a suitable and proper manner for all school activities. Indoor shoes are required for all students, and appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoors should be provided according to the weather conditions.

Also clothing that portrays the following is NOT permitted:

- clothing that reveal undergarments
- short shorts, short tops, low riding pants, see through clothing
- alcohol, tobacco or harmful substances or products through symbols or mascots;
- profanity or sexually explicit words or pictures (implied or obvious);
- pictures, symbols or words that directly demean the ethnicity, race, culture, religion, national origin, gender or disability of an individual or group;
- overt symbols or references to gangs or gang language.

Students who do not comply with the Dress Code will:

- be reminded by a staff member and referred to the office if needed;
- have parents contacted to arrange to have appropriate clothing brought to school and/or be sent home to change;
- be provided with an appropriate clothing item by a school staff member if parents/guardians are unable to be contacted.

Being Prepared for School

In efforts to reduce traffic in and out of our school, we are asking parents to **not drop-off items to the office**. This is a great exercise in organization for students to practice coming prepared to school every day (remember your lunch, agenda, homework and library books!) It is also a good habit to check the weather in the morning and dress children appropriately (dress in layers)!

Early Pick-Ups

Though we encourage families to make appointments and other engagements outside of our school hours, we understand that sometimes this is not possible. To limit disruptions to end of day routines in classrooms, we ask that any early pick-ups to be <u>completed by 2:30pm</u>. The last 30min of the school day is a busy time for students and staff who are engaged in many end of day activities, and we would like to limit any additional disruptions to the learning of all of our students during this time.
