Morning and End of Day Procedures

Thank you to our families who continue to follow our guidelines around morning drop off and end of day pick up. We want to remind parents you <u>cannot park</u> in the Kiss'n'Rid or in front of the school. If you need to exit the driver's seat of your car to help your child, you should not be using the Kiss'n'Ride. If you need to help your child, please ensure you park your car in a designated parking space. Please give yourself sufficient time in the morning. Our doors open at 8:15am and there is usually no traffic at this time. Our staff continue to support Kiss'n'Ride each and every morning and end of day, and we appreciate your cooperation as they help give directions to cars. We thank you for your help in keeping our students and staff safe by always abiding by the speed limit, driving slowly and being mindful of pedestrians! Thank you for doing your part in helping us keep our school safe for all students and staff.

End of Day - Early Pick-Ups - We are asking for your help with this

Though we encourage families to make appointments and other engagements outside of our school hours, we understand that sometimes this is not possible. To limit disruptions to end of day routines in classrooms, we ask that any early pick-ups be **completed by 2:30pm**. The last 30min of the school day is a busy time for students and staff who are engaged in many end of day activities, and we would like to limit any additional disruptions to the learning of all of our students during this time. Term 1 Report Cards

Research shows that students need to learn more than just facts if they want to succeed in post-secondary education and the world of work. Ontario's students are also learning to take initiative, work independently, be self-reliant and work in a team. Schools are teaching critical thinking and problem solving skills in order to give your child the ability to seize every opportunity for jobs and growth in the changing economy.

The report card reflects this and emphasizes the importance of learning skills and work habits in your child's progress. When evaluating subject areas, as always, teachers look at assignments, tests, presentations, and projects for evidence that your child is learning the curriculum. This learning means more than just knowing the facts. Students must also show an understanding of what they are studying by communicating and applying what they have learned. Teachers do not simply calculate averages. As well as looking at tests or assignments, they also talk to and observe your child in the classroom to gather as much information as possible before making a decision on the final grade.

A report card is a checkpoint in your child's learning and should be understood as just that. There is always room to grow and opportunity to learn. The communication of achievement, next steps, and learning for your child is always a partnership between school and home. Set goals together and always ensure that your child is part of the conversation. Parents are encouraged to contact their child's teacher at any time throughout the year when there are questions or concerns.

Revised Language Curriculum

There is new information for families who would like to know more about the revised language curriculum for Grade 1-8 students and Early Reading Screening for year one and two Kindergarten students. You can find this information on the school board website. The information posted on the website is available in multiple languages using the translation tool drop down menu on the top right corner of the webpage. Reporting on the Revised Language Curriculum (Grade 1-8)

Starting September 2023, schools across Ontario began implementing the new Language curriculum. A <u>Parent's Guide to Language</u>, <u>Grade 1-8 (2023)</u> has been developed by the Ontario Ministry of Education to support families in learning more about the revised curriculum.

Student achievement in Language will now be reported as **one overall grade or mark** with supporting comments. In the past, the report card reflected a grade or mark in each of the four strands of Language (Oral Communication, Reading, Writing, and Media Literacy). Now, this revised report card grade or mark represents a student's achievement of the overall curriculum expectations, and considers the student's integrated learning across all four strands of the new Language curriculum:

- Literacy Connections and Applications
- Foundations of Language
- Comprehension: Understanding and Responding to Texts
- Composition: Expressing Ideas and Creating Texts

Student achievement in individual strands is reflected in comments related to their learning, strengths, and next steps.

Early Reading Screening (ERS)

A screening measure is a quick and informal evidence-based test that provides information about possible reading difficulties (Ontario Human Rights Commission, Right to Read Report). As outlined by the Ministry of Education, beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, the Kindergarten Communication of Learning and the Elementary Provincial Report Card, Grades 1-6 will include a new section titled "Early Reading Screening" (ERS).

On the report, there are checkboxes where results of early reading screening are recorded, along with the date of screening. Report cards will indicate if the student has completed the early reading screening and if the student has met the screening benchmark.

As implementation is voluntary at this time, for the 2023-2024 Term 1 and 2 reporting period, all students will have the NA box selected for ERS. In the coming months, training on a Ministry-approved screening tool will be offered to primary educators in advance of mandatory implementation in the fall.

Beginning in Fall 2024, students in Year Two Kindergarten to Grade Two will participate in Early Reading Screening.


Tips for Secondary School Course Selection

Grade 8 and secondary school students select courses in February for the following September.

Here are some tips and reminders for students and families planning their course selection.

- 1. You do not need to make decisions alone. Consult with your family. Teachers, guidance counselors, student success teachers, graduation coaches and other school staff are there to help you.
- 2. **Plan**. You can use My Pathway Planner to track your courses, find post-secondary pathway options and look up course descriptions and prerequisites. Learn how to create your plan.
- 3. **Explore your options.** There are many courses, programs and opportunities available at all YRDSB secondary schools that let you gain skills, experience, credits and certifications in the fields that interest you. You can now search for these opportunities by sector. There are also other ways to earn credits, including summer school, night school, online learning, Indigenous and International languages and more.
- 4. **Review <u>graduation requirements</u>**. You are responsible for ensuring you select courses that meet diploma requirements.
- 5. **Review course types.** Selecting courses that meet your needs is the first step to experiencing success in secondary school. Your guidance counselor will help you to choose appropriate courses throughout secondary school as students plan for their initial post-secondary destination.
- 6. **Be aware of course prerequisites.** This is a course that must be successfully completed before taking the course that follows. You can use My Pathway Planner to look up course descriptions and prerequisites.
- 7. **Know where to go if you have questions.** Speak with your guidance counselor or other staff members at the school. Talk to your family members. Learn more about <u>course selection</u>, <u>graduation requirements</u> and options available to you in <u>secondary school on the Board website</u>.
