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
REMEMBRANCE DAY

- It helps all students but particularly low achievers. Thus it reduces the range of achievement while raising achievement overall (Black & William, 1998).

WHAT IS TRIANGULATION?

Triangulation is a process by which a teacher collects evidence about student learning; this evidence is collected from three different sources. These sources are conversations, observations, and products.

Conversation is used to talk with students in a less formal, less structured way; observations take place during class time, while students are involved in individual, pair or group work. The teacher will circulate around the room and observe student learning. Observations can be documented using a check list or anecdotal notes. Finally, products refer to the tangible materials, such as tests, tasks or projects, used to assess student learning. These products are used to demonstrate what the student is capable of doing after going through the learning process.

Boomerang Lunch Program

At the beginning the month of **December**, Le Club Vert has decided to start the daily **Boomerang lunch** program at Sir Wilfrid Laurier which will continue until the end of the year. We believe that engaging students and the school community in small environmental initiatives can have a big impact on our environment.

HOW IT WORKS:

- All materials in the lunch box that come to school go home!
- Uneaten food and waste material is returned home in your child's lunch bag
- Recyclable materials can be disposed of AT SCHOOL

BOOMERANG LUNCH GOALS:

- Reducing the amount of waste we create from school lunches
- Encouraging healthy and nutritious lunches (many pre-packaged lunch items contain significant amounts of sugar, sodium, preservatives and fat)
- Creating awareness around recycling and composting
- Encouraging and promoting the use of **reusable containers** and discouraging the use of disposable containers

• Providing Parents with information about what their child is or is not eating for snack and lunch.

WASTE FREE SNACK/ LUNCH TIPS:

- Use reusable lunch bags and containers.
- Use reusable drink bottles or a thermos.
- Use a cloth napkin and reusable utensils.
- Avoid using plastic wrap and "Ziploc" baggies.
- Get your children to help pack their snacks/lunches with healthy foods.
- Only pack as much food as your child will eat.
- Label all containers with an initial or special symbol.

Presentation name: Python Coding for Elementary Intermediate students

<u>Program Description:</u> How to apply math knowledge from the Grade 8 curriculum to a practical, engaging, motivating, enriching, authentic and forward thinking application by means of Python coding. This enrichment opportunity provided by means of an extracurricular activity serves as preparation for secondary school before students are exposed to Java in Grade 10. Coding is a great way for students to develop valuable skills such as logical thinking, creativity and problem solving. The end result will be helping more students achieve excellence in numeracy, which is the goal of the Ontario Renewed Math Strategy.

<u>Julian C. presentation:</u> There are many different code languages within the realm of computer science, all of which serve specific purpose and are useful in different circumstances. In this presentation Julian explained why python is the ideal programming language for teaching numeracy in elementary school, and why it is preferable to one of its largest competitors, Java, within our setting.

Dylan K. presentation: Dylan explained the steps of how to install Python fro


