WINTER WEATHER



With the colder weather approaching, please ensure that your child(ren) comes to school dressed appropriately (hats, mitts/gloves, boots, winter coats, snow pants, etc.). 


Treaties Recognization Week: ReconciliACTION #3

ReconciliACTIONs are actions that seek to move us along on the path to reconciliation. Their goal is to bring Indigenous and non-Indigenous people together to create awareness, to share, and to learn. The hope is that these actions will bring about meaningful change, spark important conversations, and give each and every one of us the opportunity to make a difference.

During the week of November 1-7, Sixteenth Avenue Public School observed TREATY RECOGNITION WEEK as our ReconciliACTION #3. Each day on the morning announcements, we started with a reading of the Land Acknowledgement, followed by a tidbit of information about treaties, such as the importance of the wampum belt. Throughout the day, teachers had the opportunity to engage their students in grade levelled activities and virtual presentations, such as the puppet show *Rabbit and Bear Paws: Treaties, Environment and Land.* As a part of the week-long event, any classwork created was displayed in the hallway, allowing us to learn from each other. We are all Treaty People, after all! Treaty



Recognition Week allowed teachers to continue the conversations they had begun with Orange Shirt Day in September and Secret Path Week in October. We will keep the momentum going in December with ResonciliACTION #4.

YRDSB Land Acknowledgement

We affirm that we are all treaty people and acknowledge that the York Region District School Board is located on the lands of two treaties. These treaties have been signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the First Nations of the Williams Treaties, who are: the Mississaugas of Alderville, Curve Lake, Hiawatha, Scugog Island and the Chippewas of Beausoleil, Rama, and Georgina Island who is our closest neighbour and partner in education.

To honour this agreement we will take up our responsibility to be respectful of



their traditions, knowledge and inherent rights as sovereign nations. We will respect their relationship with these lands and recognize that our connection to this land is through the continued relationship with these First Nations, and we acknowledge our shared responsibility to respect and care for the land and waters for future generations.
