International Trips 2014-2015

This year's trip leaves for Italy on March 7.

Applications were submitted for a trip to France/Spain and a second trip to Costa Rica for March 2015. Trips are chaperoned by volunteer teachers. Students pay the cost of the trip.

Administration Report:

Staffing Update:

Five teachers are currently on leave. Hiring for the second semester is currently underway.

Exams and report cards:

Exams start on Friday. If buses are cancelled due to inclement weather, exams will be written on January 30th. Exam review day will be held on January 31st, 2014.

Transfer process:

Enrolment for next year has commenced. SLSS is closed to transfers for families outside of our boundaries. This decision is made at the board level, due to an anticipation of increased enrolment for students who are currently in Grade 7. Most other schools in the area are open to transfers. If families wish to transfer to a different high school, they may pick up a form in the guidance office.

Course Selection:

Parents are encouraged to click on the link for Career Cruising – this program supports students in the course selection process.

EQAO testing this year:

• Test accounts for 5% of the students' marks. Practice

sessions and strategies to help Applied Math students achieve greater success are offered.

• The Literacy test will take place on March 27, 2014.

Carry Forward from November meeting

A Defibrillator will be installed by March break near the gym. If funding permits, another will be located on the third floor. Six parents, received training along with school staff and students. Training included CPR and instruction on how to operate this life saving device.

Parents Reaching Out Grant:

- A grant of \$1000 was approved by the Ministry of Education and will be used to fund the project entitled, "Bridging the Generation Gap: Youth speaking to Parents.
- There will be a presentation from "Youthspeak" to engage parents by reaching out and speaking to the issues many youths face every day on April 24th, 2014.
- Students will attend the Youth Speak program on April 17.
- In the evening session, Youth Speak teens will present to parents about their experiences from bullying, to suicide risk, and signs and strategies to deal with stress.
- Emails and calls will be made to inform parents of this event closer to the date.

Parent Handbook:

Linda Behr spoke on behalf of parents involved in this project. They are currently in the process of deciding which information is most relevant. The plan is to revise and re-organize handbook so that key information is easy to find. One suggestion is to divide the handbook into 3 distinct sections: Academic; Social Responsibility; and Athletics/ Extra Curricula activities. Suggestions

- o one page upfront with important dates, contact numbers and email addresses.
- most important messages be translated into various languages. (Further research on this is needed, as the council was unsure this would be possible due to various constraints.)
- o include a glossary of terms at the back.

The target is to have revisions ready by the May council meeting.

Possible Future Presentations:

The purpose of these presentations is to boost attendance and participation at parent council meetings. Five topics were suggested and the council had an opportunity to vote for the two

topics that interested them the most.

Votes were as follows:

- 1. Pathways (Post Secondary Destination), i.e. College, University, etc. <u>6 Votes.</u>
- 2. Post-secondary scholarships & bursaries, **9 votes**
- 3. Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) program, 3 votes
- 4. Understanding Special Education Accommodations, **0 votes**
- 5. <u>Social Media</u> (presentation by local police on possible dangers and strategies to protect our kids) <u>3 votes</u>
- 6. Other ideas? Anyone with additional ideas for future council presentations is encouraged to mention them to Karina and/or Nicola.

Since "Post-secondary scholarships & bursaries" received the highest number of votes, this will be our topic for discussion at the next council meeting.

Other Business:

- York Catholic District School Board is hosting a one day conference for parents and educators, titled: The Neuroscience of Learning. The event takes place on Friday, March 28, 2014. Participants will learn effective, brain-based classroom strategies to motivate student learning. Cost is \$75 for one workshop; \$140 for both. Email: info@ldayr.org for more info.

One objective will be to demonstrate how relevant math is to their future careers, and how these skills and concepts from the curriculum can be incorporated in future roles.
