A Message from the Administration

February was an exciting month of celebration at Stonebridge! Students received Term One Report Cards and families reviewed the goals and achievements in learning. The students demonstrated great pride in their learning, and explained how a Growth Mindset influences their success as they try new approaches and techniques. Staff continue with the Deep Learning in Math exploring new, innovative ways to integrate math inquiry into the instructional program. Students benefit from strategies they apply as they explore different ways to solve problems, make connections to real-world math, and articulate the process effectively to their peers and teachers. Our Math Journey continues to inspire creative thinking, collaboration and ownership for learning.

Students experienced many "hands on" learning experiences through the month of February. Grade Five students visited the McMichael Art Gallery to learn more about artists, symbolism and Indigenous Artists. We thank our Parent Volunteers for accompanying the students on this field trip. The Grade 5's travelled beyond the borders of the school for their learning adventure, while the Grade 7's remained at school, welcoming the "GUSH" facilitator to Stonebridge. Students participated in a series of "hands on" activities where they learned about clean sources of water, pollution, sources of clean water, and issues of clean water access in Canada. Students used critical inquiry to explore the issues of access to clean water for Indigenous communities across Ontario. We are proud to integrate this new learning to our understanding of the newly revised Land Acknowledgement Statement which adds "The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada Calls to Action (number 62 - 63) speak to the significance of education as the key to reconciliation and developing a shared understanding of how our collective past brought us to where we are today will help us walk together into a better future".

This month, Lunar New Year– Year of the Dog was celebrated with a Dragon Dance and a Parade through the school, with cheering students and staff participating in the festivities. The celebration continued through to the Heritage, History and Culture Assembly where students learned more about Lunar New Year and the Asian Culture. The Learning Commons became a virtual Showcase for Black and African Heritage, History and Culture. Classes visited the stations and learned about the Steel Pan, Iconic Leaders, The Tradition of Carnival, Art and Crafts. The Students culminated their learning by attending two assemblies showcasing "Carnival Spice" Performers, who entertained the audience by sharing "THE STORY OF DANCE" with everyone! This interactive session got everyone up and moving, learning about forms of dance, movement and drama. March will bring new learning opportunities for parents and their children. On March 7th, Author Michael Wade will be sharing his stories with Gr. 3 to Gr. 6.

Then on Thursday, March 22nd, the School Council is hosting the "Building Resiliency & Well-Being", a Family Event, starting at 6:30 pm through to 8:30 pm. We hope to see you at this interactive session for families. Registration forms will be sent on Friday, March 2nd. We wish all our families a very safe and happy March Break!





YRDSB Land Acknowledgement Statement-

NEWLY REVISED.....



The Land Acknowledgement Statement has been revised to include a new paragraph which helps us understand the importance of the TRUTH & RECONCILIATION CALLS TO ACTION—# 62 & 63

Treaties were negotiated at the beginning of relationships between the Indigenous peoples and early settlers.

Treaties are living agreements, which are recognized and respected today.

We would like to start by acknowledging that we are on the traditional territories of the Wendat, the Haudeno-saunee, and the Anishinaabe peoples, whose presence here continues to this day.

We also would like to acknowledge this is the treaty lands of the First Nations of the Williams Treaty and thank them and other Indigenous peoples for sharing this land with us.

We would like to acknowledge the Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation as our closest community and partners in education.


We acknowledge this land and the people because the first step to reconciliation is recognizing the existence of Indigenous people.

Love -Zaagidowin To truly love is to care for others unconditionally, knowing when people are weak is when they need it most.

Respect -Mnaadendimoowin To have honour for all of Creation. You must give respect if you wish to be respected.

Bravery -Aakide'ewin To be brave is to do something right even if you know it's going to hurt you.

Honesty -Gwekwaadiziwin Always be honest in word and action. Be honest first with yourself, and you will more easily be able to be honest with others.

Humility -Dibadendiziwin You are equal to others, but you are not better.

Truth -Debwewin To learn the truth, to live with truth and to walk with truth, to speak truth.

French Immersion Registration. For Sir John A McDonald P.S.

Grade 1 French Immersion registration will take place from January 19 - February 9, 2018

FI registration will begin January 19, 2018. In order to streamline the registration process, parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2018, and wishing to enroll in the FI Program, can visit or call their home school office (where your child currently attends) and request an Office Index Card - short version. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school, therefore the index card must be signed by Ms. Chan, Principal of Stonebridge P.S.

Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to your designated French Immersion school to register between January 19 and February 9, 2018.

Stonebridge Gr. 1 students attending French Immersion will attend the program at Sir John A. McDonald P.S.

School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following:

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be region-wide meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all
 municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional
 educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large
 attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to
 cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements
 to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If
 buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon.
 Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same
 transportation home.
