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A Message from the Administration

It has been a busy fall here at Stonebridge Public School. As a school, we have been involved in a variety of activities including International Walk to School Day, the Terry Fox Run and 8 members of the Me2We club were excited to attend We Day at the ACC in Toronto. Classes have enjoyed enhancements to their curriculum including swimming lessons, a field trip to the Royal Ontario Museum and a visit from Scientists in the School. Our grade 7s are at Kinark Outdoor Center this week participating in leadership and team building activities. In classes, students are hard at work on their grade level curricular expectations working individually or in small groups to go deeper with their knowledge and understanding of a topic, apply this understanding and use this knowledge to analyze and evaluate information. They are engaging in purposeful talk to share their thinking, develop their ideas and expand on each other's thinking.

On November 22nd, Stonebridge students will bring home their Progress Report Cards. Progress Reports are an opportunity for teachers to share the development of learning skills and work habits, as well as general progress in the subject areas with families, at this point in time. It gives families, teachers and students the opportunity to review their progress so far and to set goals for growth to ensure a successful term. Final marks for all subject areas will be recorded on the Term 1 Report Card which will go home February 19th. This year, all of our classes from SK to grade 8 will participate in Parent Teacher Interviews on the evening of Thursday, November 24th and the morning of Friday, November 25th.

Parent Teacher Interviews are one of the ways for you to participate in partnering with your child's teacher to support their learning. Before the interview, you may wish to review the progress report card and talk to your child about their learning experiences so far this year. Please see a Tips Sheet for Parent Teacher Interviews included in this newsletter. Parents and guardians of JK students will be invited to their child's classroom for a classroom observation. These observations will take place later in November.

We look forward to your involvement in this process and know that you will take the opportunity to recognize and celebrate your child's positive accomplishments from the first couple of months of school and help your child to set goals for the remainder of the term.




Math Moment

Halloween candy... a sticky topic for parents!

Parents are often left wondering how to help their children manage their Halloween treats as part of a healthy diet. The key is to provide structure. Here are some guidelines:

- 1. After trick or treating, let your children empty their candy bag, sort it and eat as much of it as they want. Let them do the same the next day.
- 2. On the third day, have them put the candy away and only allow a couple of pieces to be eaten during meals and/or snacks.
- Schedule meals and snacks at regular times. Keep the routine of letting your child have Halloween candy only at these times. This way, the candy will not spoil your child's diet.
- 4. Offer milk, fruit or vegetables with the candy to offer some nutrition.

Parent Teacher Interviews

Parent teacher-interviews are held two or three times a year at the end of each term when report cards are sent home. They are opportunities for parents and teachers to talk together about how to help each child succeed in school. They are very short – usually 10 or 15 minutes. It's important to prepare before the interview to make the best use of that short time. If you need more time, schedule another appointment.

Prepare

Read your child's report card.

Make notes about your questions and concerns.

Talk to your child about the report.

What do you want to ask the teacher? Make a list

2. Ask Questions

Arrive on time. Bring your list of questions. The teacher will review your child's report card or show you samples of his or her work.

Tell the teacher what your child likes and dislikes about school. Let the teacher know if you think there is too much or too little homework.

Parent-teacher interviews are strictly confidential. Share personal information that might be affecting your child's progress or behaviour at school (e.g., family illness, job search). This information will help the teacher understand your child better.

- What does my child do well?
- What skills does she or he still need to develop?
- Is my child getting extra help? In what subjects?
- What is your homework policy?
- How much time should my child be spending on homework?
- How does my child get along with the other students?
- How can I help my child at home?
- What is the best way to contact you if I have more questions?

Take notes so that you can share the comments with your child.

Follow Up

Talk to your child. Stress the positive things the teacher said. Talk about how you and the teacher are going to help with the things that need to be improved.
