On May 30, 2024, the Ministry of Education announced that it would be launching consultations in fall 2024 with students, parents, job creators, educators and other stakeholders on the practical life skills students need to build a strong foundation for future success through modernized home economics education. To learn more visit Province Introduces New High School Graduation Requirements for a Stronger Ontario Diploma.

The Ministry has asked school boards to assist in the promotion and collection of feedback on the practical life skills that parents, students and educators think could be included or strengthened.

The anonymous <u>Ministry Survey: Launch of Life</u>
<u>Skills Consultation</u>, designed by the Ministry, will take approximately 10 minutes to complete and will remain open until September 24, 2024.

Caring and Safe Schools Start-Up Presentation

Dear Families,

As the new school year is beginning, students will be attending Caring and Safe Schools Start-Up Presentations. These presentations are designed to underscore behaviour expectations as we create a caring, safe and inclusive school environment. As families are critical partners, please continue discussions about school safety at home by asking your child what they have learned in the Start-Up Presentation.

Presentation topics include:

- Racism and types of discrimination;
- Bullying;
- Progressive discipline;
- Personal mobile devices such as cell phones, smart watches, and tablets;
- Vaping for grades 7 & 8; and
- Standing up for each other, including methods of reporting incidents of racism, discrimination and bullying.

Inappropriate Behaviour

In the Start-Up Presentation, students are learning about anti-Black racism, other forms of racism, discrimination, and bullying. This learning will continue throughout the school year. Instances of anti-Black racism, other forms of racism, discrimination and bullying are not acceptable and are addressed through progressive discipline. In some cases of racism and discrimination, York Regional Police may be involved.

Students will also be reminded about safe school behaviours, including what items must never be brought to school, such as peanut products, vape products/drug paraphernalia, weapons/replica weapons and knives/replica knives.

Reporting Behaviour

Standing up for one another and reporting when something does not feel safe is part of a caring and safe school environment. Students should report incidents that make them or others feel unsafe or uncomfortable, including acts of racism, discrimination and bullying. Students can report incidents by:

Telling a caring adult;

- Using the YRDSB's <u>"Report It Button"</u> (Located on our school's website, the online Report It button allows students and families to share information about inappropriate behaviour and incidents of hate or discrimination. Please see <u>this video</u> for additional information);
- Contacting Kids Help Phone (1-800-668-6868).



Mental Health

We will stress to students the importance of connection as we return to school. Students are learning about who they can talk to if they need support. In addition, positive mental health is closely tied to each individual's sense of identity and safety. As such, mental health initiatives are aligned with equity and safety in mind, which includes culturally specific supports. YRDSB student mental health services are delivered by Board social work and psychology staff. These services are accessible through the school principal. Mental health resources for families are also available on the Board website.

Student Discipline

We use a progressive discipline approach for inappropriate behaviour on and off school property. This means we consider various options to determine the most appropriate response to each situation to help students learn from their choices. In some cases, suspension or expulsion may be necessary. The Ontario Education Act and the Board's Caring and Safe Schools Policy (found on the Board's Caring and Safe School Page) outline situations where suspension and expulsion must be considered. These infractions are also outlined in the Guide to the School Year. In addition, when inappropriate behaviour occurs, information will be shared with the student(s) who were harmed and the families of the student(s) who were harmed to the extent that legislation allows.

Online Safety and Appropriate Use of Technology

Students are reminded about the Appropriate Use of Technology agreement, including the importance of using respectful language and making positive choices when using electronic communications and social media tools. This agreement is also included in the start-up package that all families receive at the beginning of the year.

Students are reminded that online threats and comments are taken seriously and may have consequences. Where there are concerns for the safety of students, staff, community members or Board property, the school board works with York Regional Police and appropriate actions are taken. The safety and well-being of students remain our top priority.

Safety Week

The York Region School Board is committed to ensuring the safety of students, staff, and visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As such, during Safety Week (September 23 to 27, 2024) and throughout the school year, schools in our Board practise various safety drills, including Fire Drills, Lockdown Drills, Hold and Secure Drills and the newly established Bomb Threat Drill. It is critical that all members of our school community become familiar with emergency protocols as they are designed to keep all of us safe at school. Practising drills may create some anxiety for some students. If you are concerned about how these situations might impact the mental health and well-being of your child, please contact school administrators, as we have school mental health professionals available to support your child.

Student Accident Insurance

The Board does not provide accident insurance coverage for student injuries that occur on school premises or during school extracurricular activities (e.g., athletics, clubs, field trips). Injuries can result in substantial expenses not covered by provincial health care or employer group insurance plans. Families may purchase voluntary student accident insurance through Insuremykids. Participation is voluntary but highly recommended, and the costs are to be paid by the parent/guardian.

School Parking



"The real penalty for not obeying traffic regulations is that you may risk the safety of children!"

Common Parking Violation Education

Drivers should be reminded to park in permitted areas only, which may include:

- The school parking lot in accordance with signs posted; or,
- Streets that do not have prohibited parking or prohibited stopping signs posted.

In addition to the most common parking violations listed below, drivers should ensure that they are not stopped or parked so as to block a fire hydrant, intersection, bus stop, private driveway, pathway, crosswalk, super mailbox or sidewalk as these are also violations.

Fire Route



These signs are posted to alert drivers that the area is a Fire Route. Fire Routes are the roads, laneways, or driveways that provide access to a building and may also include areas within a parking lot. A driver is in violation of this parking regulation if he/she is stopped or parked in a Fire Route even if their engine is running, hazard lights are flashing, or there is someone in the car.

When this sign is displayed, drivers are permitted to immediately drop off/pick up individuals – there cannot be a delay. For example, when a parent is dropping off their child to school, the child should get out of the vehicle and the parent should immediately drive away. Similarly, when a parent is engaged in picking up their child, the child should already be waiting at the curb for their parent. After the child gets into the vehicle, the parent must then immediately drive away. No waiting.

When this sign is displayed, drivers are not permitted to:

- 1. Sit and wait in the car for their child (even for a few minutes); or
- 2. Leave their vehicle (even to quickly drop off their child's lunch).

Prohibited Parking



These signs are posted to alert drivers that parking is prohibited. A driver is in violation of this parking regulation if he/she has stopped the vehicle but the engine is running, hazard lights are flashing, or there is someone in the car. These signs may indicate the times of day that a driver is not permitted to park their vehicle

When this sign is displayed, drivers are permitted to <u>immediately</u> drop off/pick up individuals – there cannot be a delay. For example, when a parent is dropping off their child to school, the child should get out of the vehicle and the parent should immediately drive away. Similarly, when a parent is engaged in picking up their child, the child should already be waiting at the curb for their parent. After the child gets into the vehicle, the parent must then immediately drive away. No waiting.

When this sign is displayed, drivers are not permitted to:

- Sit and wait in the car for their child (even for a few minutes); or,
- Leave their vehicle (even to quickly drop off their child's lunch).

Accessible Parking



These signs are posted to alert drivers that a parking spot is reserved for individuals with VALID Accessible Parking Permits only. Vehicles are not permitted to park, stop or turn around in these spots unless a person with a valid Accessible Parking Permit is IN THE VEHICLE. In addition, the permit must be properly displayed. The permit must be used by the person it was issued to. (Drivers transporting persons with accessible parking permits are subject to a tag if the permit holder is no longer in the vehicle.)

Prohibited Stopping



These signs are posted to alert drivers that stopping is prohibited. They are often posted on surrounding streets from schools and may indicate the times of day that a driver is not permitted to stop their vehicle - drivers must continue to drive with the flow of traffic.

When this sign is displayed, drivers are not permitted to:

- Stop their vehicle to let people in or out of their vehicle; or
- 2. Sit and wait for their child to get into the vehicle.

Frequently Asked Questions

- How close to the curb should drivers park?
 Drivers should park within 6 inches or 15 cm away from a curb
- How close to an intersection can drivers park?
 Drivers shall not park a motor vehicle: on a highway within 9 m (30ft) of any intersection including T intersections; on a highway within 15m (49 ft) of any signalized intersection
- How far should drivers park away from a fire hydrant?
 When parking their vehicle near a fire hydrant, drivers should maintain a distance of 10 feet or 3 metres away from the fire hydrant.

Common Parking Definitions

Below you will find some of our common definitions from the City's Parking Control By-law # 2005-188. The complete Parking Control By-law can be found online at the City's website, www.markham.ca

"Fire Route" means any roadway, driveway, lane, ramp or other means of vehicular access to or from a designated building which is designated as a fire access route by the City's Fire Department and shall include any part of a parking lot set aside by visible markings or markers for the purpose of vehicular movement.

"Park" or "Parking" means the halting of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except when halting temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading goods or passengers.

"Stop" or "Stopping" means the halting or leaving of a motor vehicle, even momentarily, whether occupied or not, except when necessary to avoid conflict or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or of a traffic control sign or signal.

How can parents help?

In particular, traffic congestion during school drop off/pick up times present unique challenges for enforcement.

Mailing penalty notices allows officers to address most of the illegally parked vehicles and not just the one or two vehicles "in the back".

Observe and obey all traffic/parking signs

Do not leave your car unattended

Do not make U turns in a school zone

Give yourself extra time so that you are not rushed

Plan ahead-dress appropriately for the weather Rain, snow or shine!

Respect other drivers. Be patient!

Do not use private driveways in the area as alternate pick up/drop off points. Please respect other homeowners/private business properties.

Encourage active transportation (biking or walking).

If you have to drive, park legally and walk a block or two!

Recognize that safety precedes "convenience"

What to do when I receive a ticket?

It is important to note that Officers are encouraged to educate the public but are advised to avoid potentially confrontational situations.

Individuals that receive a penalty notice (either in person, to the vehicle, or by mail) are advised to follow the directions provided on the back of the penalty notice. It is the responsibility of the driver to respond in a timely manner.

Verbal and/or physical threats against a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer will not be tolerated. Furthermore, all officers are expected to report ALL of these incidents with York Regional Police.
