



WHAT DO I NEED TO GRADUATE?

19 Compulsory Credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

- 4 credits in English"
- 3 credits in mathematics 2 credits in science
- 1 credit in the arts
- credit in Canadian history 1 credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 1 credit in technological education 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

1 additional credit in English, or French as a Second Language, or a Native Language, or an International Language, or Social Science and the Humanities or Canadian and World Studies, or Guidance and Career Education, or Co-operative Education,

1 additional credit in Health and Physical Education, or the Arts, or Business Studies or French as a Second Language or Co-operative

Group 3

1 additional credit in Science or Computer Studies or Technological Education or French as a Second Language or Co-operative Education.

GRADE 9 COURSE TYPES

DE-STREAMED: De-streamed courses prepare students for the apprenticeship, college, university and workplace pathway. Destreamed courses are science, math and English. French and geography are offered at the academic level only.

OPEN: Open courses are designed to prepare students for further study in a subject and to enrich their education. Open courses are available in the arts, business, family studies, French, health and physical education and

LOCALLY DEVELOPED: Locally developed courses support the needs of students who have been receiving significantly modified programming in Grade 8. Locally Developed courses are available in English, Math and Science, (Grade 8 teacher recommendation required),

Students must earn 11 optional credits across their 4 years of high school. Optional credits allow students to explore areas of interest and enrichment Grade 9 options are listed on the back of this viewbook.

Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test

In grade ten, all students write the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test. This is a requirement for graduation. The test includes several reading and writing tasks. At Stouffville District Secondary School we prepare our students by having them practice literacy activities, participate in after school programs, and complete targeted specific skill development through various grade ten classes.

Community Involvement

All Grade 9 - 12 students must complete a minimum of 40 hours of community involvement activities as part of the requirements for an Ontario Secondary School Diploma. A helpful hint is to encourage your child to complete at least 10 hours per year which will work towards completing the 40 hours necessary to graduate. Hours may begin to accumulate during the summer after grade 8.

Online Learning Requirement

Students are now required to earn two asynohronous Online Learning credits to graduate from secondary school. Student can opt out without penalty on My Pathway Planner beginning in grade 11.

HONOURING ALL PATHWAYS

Students will learn about these post-secondary pathway options:

APPRENTICESHIP: hands-on training for those who want to work in a skilled trade: approximately 80% of training occurs on the job and 20% in a

COLLEGE: students may earn a certificate, diploma, advanced diploma or a bachelor's degree: combines theoretical knowledge and practical

UNIVERSITY: students earn a bachelor's degree; theoretical academic

WORKPLACE: Jobs for students who have completed high school; training is unique to each circumstance

Selecting Your Courses

Step 1— Select Compulsory Courses

In Grade 9 all students must take:

- English
- Math
- Science
- French
- Health and Physical Education

Step 2—Select Elective Courses

Students must select 2 electives and 2 alternates from the courses below. Please know that alternates are used when electives cannot be timetabled. It is highly recommended that students select either an ARTS or TECHNOLOGY course in grade 9.

ADA101 - Drama *ARTS

This course provides opportunities for students to explore dramatic forms and techniques, using material from a wide range of sources and cultures. Students will use the elements of drama to examine situations and issues that are relevant to their lives. Students will create, perform, discuss, and analyze drama, and then reflect on the experiences to develop an understanding of themselves, the art form, and the world around them.

AMU101 - Music *ARTS

This course emphasizes the creation and performance of music at a level consistent with previous experience and is aimed at developing technique, sensitivity, and imagination. Students will develop musical literacy skills by using the creative and critical analysis processes in composition, performance, and a range of reflective and analytical activities. Students will develop an understanding of the conventions and elements of music and of safe practices related to music, and will develop a variety of skills transferable to other areas

AMR101 - Repertoire ARTS

This course emphasizes the performance of music at a level that strikes a balance between challenge and skill and is aimed at developing technique. sensitivity, and imagination. Students will participate in creative activities that teach them to listen with understanding. They will also learn correct musical terminology and its appropriate use.

AVI101 - Visual Arts *ARTS

This course is exploratory in nature, offering an overview of visual arts as a foundation for further study. Students will become familiar with the elements and principles of design and the expressive qualities of various materials by using a range of media, processes, techniques, and styles. Students will use the creative and critical analysis processes and will interpret art within a personal, contemporary, and historical context.

BTT101 — Information and Communication Technology in Business This course introduces students to information and communication technology

in a business environment and builds a foundation of digital literacy skills necessary for success in a technologically driven society. Students will develop word processing, spreadsheet, database, desktop publishing, presentation software, and website design skills. Throughout the course there is an emphasis on digital literacy, effective electronic research and communication skills, and current issues related to the impact of information and communication technology.

HFN101- Food and Nutrition

This course focuses on guidelines for making nutritious food choices. Students will investigate factors that influence food choices, including beliefs, attitudes, current trends, traditional eating patterns, food marketing strategies, and individual needs. Students will also explore the environmental impact of a variety of food choices at the local and global level. The course provides students with opportunities to develop food preparation skills and introduces them to the use of social science research methods in the area of food and

TIJ101 — Exploring Technologies *TECHNOLOGY

This course enables students to further explore and develop technological knowledge and skills introduced in the elementary science and technology program. Students will be given the opportunity to design and create products and/or provide services related to the various technological areas or industries, working with a variety of tools, equipment, and software commonly used in industry. Students will develop an awareness of environmental and societal issues, and will begin to explore secondary and postsecondary education and training pathways leading to careers in technology-related

TXJ101— Exploring Hairstyling and Aesthetics *TECHNOLOGY

This exploratory course introduces students to concepts and skills related to hairstyling and aesthetics, including hair, nall, and skin care applications. Students will develop an awareness of related environmental and societal issues and will begin to explore secondary and postsecondary pathways



Group 2: ONE additional credit in Health and Physical Education, or Business Studies, or the Arts (music, visual arts, drama), or French as a Second Language, or Co-op Education *

Group 3: ONE additional credit in Science (grades 11 or 12), or Technological Education (grades 9-12), or Computer Studies or French as a Second Language, or Co-op Education *

- a maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits;
- French as a second language can count as a Group 2 or Group 3, not both



NEW Technological Education Requirement

- As announced in March 2023, the Ontario government is implementing a new high school graduation requirement
- Students entering Grade 9 in September 2024 will now be required to earn a Grade 9 or 10 Technical Education credit as part of their OSSD.
- No additional information has been provided since the announcement
- We have 10 Grade 9 or 10 Technological Education course options at SDSS:
 - **Grade 9** Exploring Technologies, Hairstyling & Aesthetics
 - Grade 10 Construction Technology, Technological Design, Computer Engineering Technology, Hospitality & Tourism, Communications Technology, Transportation Technology, Hairstyling & Aesthetics


