Comprehensive Math Program

"In order for students to achieve excellence in an area like mathematics, there must be a balance between understanding basic math concepts, practicing skills and developing the thinking skills needed for advanced problems solving. These foundational skills remain a focus—and combined with creativity and critical thinking, innovative problem-solving, effective communication and collaboration, they lead to excellence."

Achieving Excellence: A Renewed Vision for Education in Ontario, April 2014.

During math, students are expected to learn how to **problem solve**, **reason and prove**, reflect, **connect**, **represent**, **communicate** and **select appropriate tools and computation strategies**. The **Comprehensive Math Program** consists of **minilessons**, **meaningful problems**, and **games and puzzles**. During **minilessons**, students are taught how to use procedures, explore relationships and make connections that will help them to solve **meaningful problems**. Meaningful problems are questions that are "open", which means that they allow for students to attempt the problem in many different ways, reflecting their current math understanding. The "answer" is not obvious and usually requires the flexible use of different math strategies. **Games and puzzles** are used to support the conceptual understanding of math, as well as to practice skills and procedures.

Parent's Corner: Mathematics

"I can't do it!" "You're doing it wrong!" Sound familiar? Here are some steps you can take to help your child solve math problems.

Model a growth mindset. People get better at things through hard work and practice. We can get better at math by trying different strategies and by practising.

Help your child read for meaning. If he/she says she doesn't understand the question, encourage him/her to use different strategies to help i.e., re-reading, underlining the question, underlining important information, drawing a math picture, chart or equation, using manipulatives.

Help your child use what he/she knows to work towards a reasonable solution.

Ask your child to re-read the question after each step to make sure he/she is answering the question.

Once finished, ask your child to check to make sure the answer makes sense.

Remember, there is more than one way to solve a meaningful problem.

Help your child find the way that makes sense at this point in his/her math development.

Valentine's Day Dance and Pay It Forward Event



Recess Reminder



The principal decides at the time of each recess whether students will remain inside, or go out for shortened or full period recess by keeping a close eye on weather conditions, including temperature, wind chill, sun/cloud conditions and wind velocity.

Send your child to school dressed and ready for outdoor play. Students will be supervised in their classroom during recess and lunch hour whenever an indoor recess is necessary.

French Immersion

Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at Keswick P.S. on January 15, 2015 at 7 p.m. FI registration will begin January 16, 2015. In order to streamline the registration process, parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2015, and wishing to enrol in the FI Program, can visit or call the school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to **Keswick P.S. to register between January 16 and February 13, 2015**. This eliminates the need to provide duplicate enrollment information or to pre-register.

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools. More information is available on the Board's website: www.yrdsb.ca. Please note: Some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision. Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108.

Kindergarten Registration for September 2015

Kindergarten registration will commence on **January 16, 2015** for the 2015-16 school year. Registration forms are available on YRDSB's website: www.yrdsb.ca. Children who turn four or five years old during 2015, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten. A kindergarten information session for parents is being planned for this spring. For more information please visit the YRDSB website or contact your local school.

Bullying, Cyberbullying or Intimidation

Every student has the right to learn in a safe, caring and supportive environment. Our schools are actively engaged in anti-bullying, including bullying awareness intervention and prevention.

What is bullying?

Bullying, cyberbullying and intimidation are combinations of power and aggression. They usually occur when a student maliciously oppresses, harasses or intimidates another student, verbally, physically or psychologically. Bullying also occurs through the use of technology.

What happens if a student bullies another student?

Instances of bullying, cyberbullying or intimidation are dealt with under Board Policy #668.0, Caring and Safe Schools, and its related procedures. You can find information on this policy in the section on Safety and on the Board website.

Misconduct carried out over the Internet may be subject to school discipline whether carried out at school, at home or elsewhere if it effects the culture of the school.

Who can I talk to if I am being bullied?

Students are encouraged to talk to a parent/guardian, school staff member or trusted friend about any incident of bullying, harassment or intimidation by other students. If there is severe violence or threat of harm, we recommend students or their parents/guardians contact the local police immediately for assistance.
